HURT IN WRECK
SUTHERLIN, May 5.—What might have been a very serious accident occurred Sunday morning on the highway between Reedsport and Scottsburg, when the new car driven by E. F. Simpson skidded in the loose gravel, crashing into a bank. All of the occupants, Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Simpson, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Graham and Clyde Henderson, suffered shock and numerous cuts and bruises. Mrs. Simpson received a cut in the leg that had to have several stitches to close it. Mr. Simpson suffered a cut and bruised hand. The others suffered minor bruises and cuts. The party, including two cars, had started for Smith River to visit the grange and the accident occurred en route. Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Hartley, Mrs. Hazel Scruggs and W. O. Gildersleeve in the Hartley car which was ahead, noticed that the Simpson car was not following so turned back to find the wreck. Mr. and Mrs. Simpson received medical aid in Reedsport before returning to their home in the Hartley car. The wrecker from Oakland brought the Simpson car home.

The car was a present recently from their daughters to Mr. and Mrs. Simpson. It is estimated that it was damaged to the extent of about \$200. On the opposite side of the highway was a steep bank down to the river which bystanders say was 40 feet deep at that point.

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As ordered by Mike Babke, councilman. Through the skillful buying of the pipe by the council, through Mr. Babke, the city saved over \$900 on the deal, and has a very good seamless pipe well suited to the purpose. At a meeting held here Monday night, contracts for laying the pipe were asked for by the council. This new extension will accommodate about twenty-five families heretofore being without a water supply. Permission has been granted by property owners for the laying of the pipe.

Another matter taken up at the meeting by the council was the matter of the power district of the Bonneville power output. The council decided that the matter should rest in the hands of the people of the community rather than the council. They appointed a committee, however, to represent this value to attend the meeting to be held at Roseburg May 6 for the purpose of investigation of the project. This committee includes J. W. Culver, Sr., Vern Holgate, Clyde Henderson, Charles Hartley, Horton Thompson and W. J. Ladd.

At this meeting the matter of securing federal aid for reopening a cannery, cheese plant and other depleted businesses in Sutherlin will be discussed.

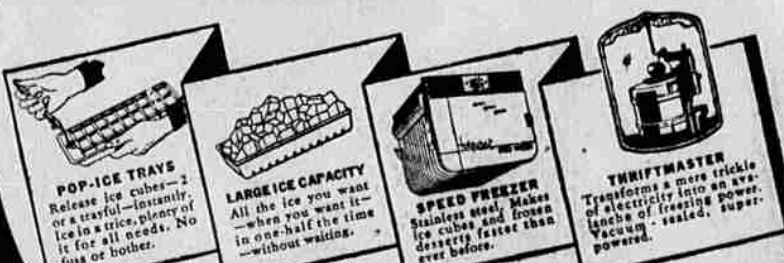
