

WOODRING'S TALK ROILS FASCISTS

an announcement of aggression, have become now the most secure means of peace and of right."

(Woodring spoke of the danger of widespread war in "continued aggression" by authoritarian powers.)

Hints at Ulterior Motive

In the editorial devoted to Woodring alone, Gayda, who often reflects the views of the fascist regime, wrote:

"We do not see what interests the United States has in assuming this fatal and heavy responsibility for the order of the world and for its own prosperity and internal peace."

"But in the existing state of facts and disclosures it may be asked, if, as a sequel to the great rearmament now in progress, with the pretext of defensive necessity, it may not be the intention of some North American circles to resume penetration by force or more or less masked conquest in the direction of Central and South America."

Accounts of the Woodring speech were printed briefly in Italian morning newspapers. Il Popolo Di Roma headlined its account: "Unheard of speech by war minister." Individual fascists characterized the address as "meddling."

Resentment Heightens

Excerpts from Woodring's speech, added to resentment against what fascists consider "hostile manifestations" toward Italy in the United States. On April 29 Gayda demanded in an editorial whether the American people desire "war" with Italy.

He cited a congressman's proposal that violators of the Kellogg pact be identified as "aggressors," an article by Ernest Hemingway held to reflect on the valor of Italian soldiers in Spain, speeches by Interior Secretary Icken and William E. Dodd, former ambassador to Germany, and statements by Admiral William D. Leahy on Italian and German ambitions in South America.

Informed sources said Britain also would make overtures in Warsaw to sound out Poland's attitude toward the Polish minority in Czechoslovakia.

CHAMBERLAIN GOVERNMENT LOSES ANOTHER SEAT
LONDON, May 6. (AP)—The national government of Prime Minister Chamberlain today lost another by-election to the labor party despite the fact that cabinet ministers for the first time in six years were permitted to make speeches in support of the government candidate.

C. G. Poole, 35-year-old railway clerk, was elected to the house of commons from the Lichfield constituency, near Birmingham, over G. B. Craddock, government candidate, by a majority of 826.

Poole said he was elected "because the people have no faith in the foreign policy of the government."

"No longer can Mr. Chamberlain say the people of Britain share his childlike faith in dictators," he declared.

It was the third such defeat for the government in recent weeks, and jubilant laborites hailed it as another decisive victory following the election of labor candidates in by-elections in west Fulham and Ipswich.

Govt. Still Controls

The Lichfield by-election was the ninth since the 1935 general election in which labor has taken a seat from the government. The government also has lost one seat to an independent conservative, while in 34 other by-elections since 1935 political representation has been unchanged.

Despite this setback the government retains an overwhelming majority in the house of commons, with 415 seats to 195 for the opposition. Three more by-elections are pending. Two Irish nationalists have declined to take their seats. The house totals 615 seats.

ing Pengpu, important center on the Tientsin-Pukow railway south of Suchow. An ammunition depot was blown up and three Japanese planes destroyed.

In south Hanchow and north Honan provinces, Chinese continued occupation of territory previously taken by Japanese in their advance to the Yellow river. They said they had reclaimed ten towns.

Fighting was heaviest about Tancheng. Outnumbered Japanese had been pushed back almost to Szechuchon, 18 miles north of Pihaiien. Japanese almost reached the latter town a few days ago before the full force of a counter-offensive by 800,000 Chinese had made itself felt.

Tancheng was surrounded, Chinese field commanders said, and 100 Japanese lorries bringing reinforcements and supplies from Lini captured.

sive two-hour parade was the prominence given to artillery, from machine guns and anti-aircraft pieces to heavy cannon. It duce seemed determined to show his German guests he was not lacking in the gruesome implements of war.

Children Included

How seriously Mussolini is thinking of future war as "totalitarian" may be judged by the fact that his review included not only regular army units — infantry, cavalry, artillery and colonials — but also small boys, girls in black uniforms, teenagers on horseback, military units of university students and various fascist formations, including the colonial fascist police.

Nor did he hesitate to incorporate spade-carrying labor camp conscripts in the parade. The spectacle of six-year-old Benito boys executing the "Passo Romano" — the Italian version of the German goosestep — brought a smile to Hitler's face early in the parade.

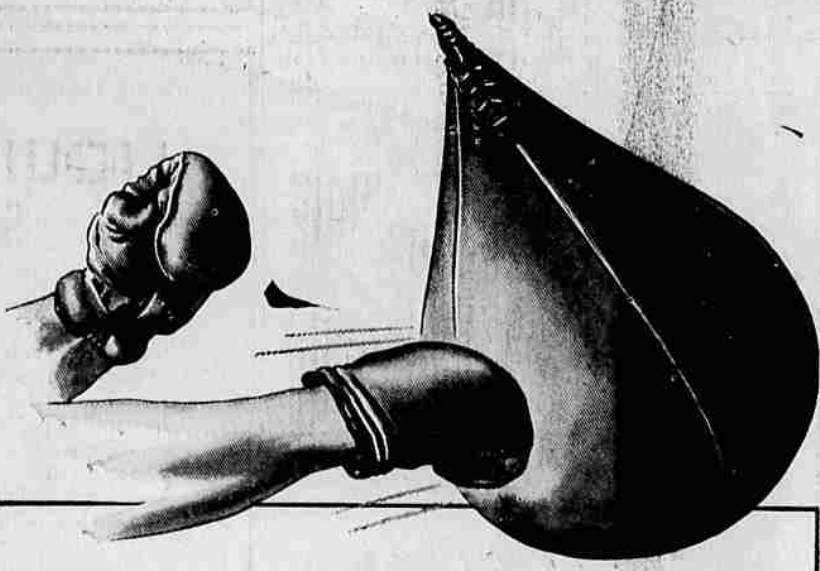
