MR. AND MRS. BRAND ATTEND OPENING OF NASH LIBRARY COLLECTION

Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Brand were guests at the John Henry Nash library collection luncheon given Tuesday in Eugene by Mr. and Mrs. Bert Brown Barker in honor of Mr. Nash, member of University of Oregon faculty, and Dr. Eric, now president of U. of O. The John Henry Nash library of printing has been deposited by Dr. Nash in the University of Oregon library as a loan collection. Following the luncheon the guests visited the library, following the public opening held later in the afternoon.

John Henry Nash, printer, scholar and artist, maker of noble books, collector of state volumes, worthy successor of Jensen, Aldus and Morris, combining in a western land a love of learning, devotion to beauty and fervor of honest craftsmanship, founder on the Pacific coast of a press that is famous wherever fine books are treasured, apostle of excellence to the craft of printers, ennobler of the art that preserves all knowledge.

The Nash library made by Dr. Nash, who has based his work on the books produced by the master printers of other days and places, has completed his library loaned to U. of O. It is one to be found in unsurpassed examples of the work of the greatest printers of all time. Among the more notable items are: The Hypnerotomachia Poliphili, printed by Aldus in Venice in 1499; a Philippe Pigouchet Book of Hours, printed in 1498 at Paris; Thielman Kerver's Book of Hours, printed in 1520 at Paris; several priceless Raitold items; Geoffrey Tory's Champfleury, printed in 1529; and representative volumes of the best work of Plantin, the Elzevirs, Bodoni and Baskerville.

Especially notable are the following, all of which are choice copies in their original bindings: Koburger's Nurnberg Chronical, printed in 1393; the Eusebius edition, by Nicholas Jenson, printed in Venice in 1470; and the Aldus Virgil, of 1501, in addition to a facsimile copy of the Gutenberg Bible, there is an original leaf of this first printed book containing the twentieth chapter and a part of the twenty-first chapter of the Book of Numbers.

The work of the modern printers is well represented with examples from the Kelmscott, Ashendene, Doves, Essex House, Vale and other English presses; the Grabhorn brothers, D. B. Updike, William E. Rudge, Bruno Rogers, Frederick Ward and Frederic Goudy. The complete set of the books issued by the Limited Editions Club is of especial interest since several of these books were printed by Dr. Nash.

One of the most interesting features of the collection is the presence of the only existing complete set of all the work produced by Dr. Nash, including brochures and the brochures, as well as the books. The importance of this part of the collection is increased by the inclusion of the proof sheets and other material relating to the production of several of his books.

Another section of the library contains an unusually complete collection of books about printing, bookmaking, and the history of the typographic art. The collection includes his collection of statuary, oil paintings and medals, all dealing with great figures in history of the typographic art. Twenty-one pieces of fine oak furniture, especially designed to display the collection, are also furnished by Dr. Nash. The medieval cover of exquisite wrought iron workmanship with its exceedingly fine leather binding, which contains the most valuable books, is itself a museum piece.

Following the meeting a delightful program was presented, at which time Ruth Anne Ruhl presented a ballet dance.
