

MUNGO JOINS DEAN IN SLUMP CLASS

Former Super Hurler Now
Unable to Win, Spoiling
Trade for Medwick.

The boys had a deal all worked out. Van Mungo's arm was going to St. Louis and Ducky Medwick's bat would move to Brooklyn. Then something happened—it was Van's arm.

Yesterday Van dropped his third straight decision, losing a 10-5 affair to the come-backing Cincinnati Reds. He gave up eight runs in his four-inning trick on the mound.

From what he has shown this season, Mungo, like Dean, can no longer be ranked with Carl Hubbell on the pitching "big three." In four starts, Van has gone the route only once. He has yet to win his first game. He has been clubbed for 30 hits and 16 runs in 24 innings. True, he has had little fielding support behind him, but that hasn't made the temperamental tatar look any better.

Since his limbo act, Medwick has been moving right along with the big stick, although he had a comparatively poor day yesterday. However, his rookie teammate, Slaughter, made up for it by whacking a triple that drove home the run that gave the Cardinals a 4-3 decision over the Phillies.

Giants Down Pirates
The New York Giants found their Pittsburgh stooges the same obliging outfit as ever, and waltzed away with an 11-7 win over the Bucs as Melton pitched his fifth straight victory. The Chicago Cubs won, too, knocking off the Reds, 13-9, in a comedy of Boston errors that laid 'em in the alder in Wrigley field and left the Giants still 2½ games in front in the league race.

Cleveland's Indians picked up half a game on their American League lead by flogging the Athletics, 4-1, on Rookie Keltner's fifth homer. The second place Yankees and the Detroit Tigers were rained out.

Old Jimmy Dykes, who's been forced back to the wars because of his second base problem, collected four hits in six chances, but his White Sox couldn't hold out and dropped a 4-2 decision to Washington in 12 innings. It was the Sox's second 13th-inning win of the week.

Newsom's undefeated pitching record was broken by the Boston Red Sox who clubbed him and the St. Louis Browns for a 7-3 win.

semi-relief activities would need \$750,000,000, Hopkins' aides said the administrator was including in this figure proposed public works administration grants, and allotments for the farm security administration and the national youth administration.

"I know," he said, "that the number of families in the United States getting relief benefits of any kind is over 6,000,000, including about 20,000,000 people. I know at one time there were 27,000,000 people who were getting aid."

Hopkins said expenditure of federal funds alone would not "provide the total increase in private employment which is essential in our economy."

"For my own part, I do not believe that the expenditure of large sums of public money, in and by itself, will do the trick," he said.

"However, we are in a situation where private funds simply are not moving, where employment is at a low level, where people are put on part time, where the national income has dropped in a relatively few months from a rate of \$68,000,000,000 to \$56,000,000,000."

Hopkins viewed pessimistically the possibility that private industry would be able, eventually, to absorb all the nation's employable persons.

"Do you think that the situation will ever correct itself automatically?" Ludlow asked.

"I do not think it will ever be entirely corrected," Hopkins replied. "We have a constant increase in the working population. Since 1925, we have had an increase of over 1,000,000 and there is a not increase every year of 500,000 workers."

SAYS NAZI MONEY BUSY IN AMERICA

PORTLAND, Ore., May 6.—(AP)—Dr. Jacob R. Marcus, author and professor of history at Hebrew Union college, Cincinnati, Ohio, charged in an interview yesterday that Adolf Hitler "is now spending hundreds of thousands of dollars in the United States and in South America to stimulate anti-Semitic and pro-Nazi activities."

German Nazis want to "get rid of the Jews," Dr. Marcus declared. "But, remember this," he added, "if they get the Jews out of the country, they will be nobody upon whom they can pour out Hitler's whipping boy."

Dr. Marcus asserted Jews in Germany will survive if they are not physically massacred or forcibly expelled, "no matter what legislation is enacted against them."

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3 TEAMS TIED FOR COAST LEAGUE LEAD

Padres' 7th Straight Win
Places Them in Bracket
With Beavers, Stars.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 7.—(AP)—San Diego's winning streak, now stretched to seven straight games, put the Padres up with Hollywood and Portland in a three-way tie for the coast league leadership today.

The Padres made it seven in a row as they defeated Portland 7 to 5 yesterday, with Morrissey, Beaver second baseman, performing juggling acts that made him the goat of the game.

Morrissey's two errors in the second inning helped the Padres to their fourth win in that frame. Hebert, though he was replaced by Craghead when Portland threatened the Padres' lead in the eighth, got credit for the victory. The defeat was charged to Darrow, driven to the showers by the second-inning fireworks.

San Francisco's Seals nosed out Hollywood 12 to 11 in a wild affair that produced 34 hits. The Seals batted out 22 of the hits and won the game with a three-run rally in the ninth inning.

In the tightest of last night's games, husky young Fred Hutchinson of Seattle again proved his worth by emerging victorious 1 to 0 in a great pitching duel with Schmidt of Sacramento. Hutchinson allowed but 4 hits to Schmidt's five. The single run came in the fifth inning when Spindel, who got on base because of Sturgeon's bad throw to first, came home on two infield outs.

Saving Effectuated

The present situation results from the fact that the city has carried the project considerably further than had originally been contemplated for the present year. This was done because it was possible to obtain materials at a much lower cost by securing in large quantities, and while the city's funds set aside for this work are exhausted at the present time, the eventual cost will be much lower than originally outlined, it is believed.

It had been planned to build only sufficient concrete pipe for the first unit, which includes the installation on the east side of the South Umpqua river. Instead, however, enough pipe was manufactured to take care of the entire project, as well as for connections required to tie in the existing sewers. This greatly increased the city's expenditures for the present, but the pipe was secured at a much lower price thereby and will result in a saving on the finished job.

The city also bought manhole covers for the entire project, thereby saving several hundred dollars over the price quoted for buying in two installments. Numerous other such acts have resulted in spending more money than had been contemplated for the first unit, but in the final analysis, it is claimed, will show material savings.

The funds for the first unit were obtained by transferring to the special account the money derived from pinball licenses, together with appropriations from the emergency fund and a transfer from the street department budget.

It is estimated that an additional \$2,500 will permit the work to continue until next year's budget is adopted, at which time it is planned to include sufficient funds to complete the sewer construction.

Back Taxes Expected
The city is being operated on a cash basis at present and has no authority, it is claimed, to exceed budgetary allowances.

However, more than \$80,000 is due the city in delinquent taxes and some of this amount, it is expected will be paid during the next few months.

Consequently, the court will be asked to grant the city authority to issue deficiency warrants and to pledge collections from delinquent taxes to pay off the indebtedness.

Condemnation Suit Filed
As additional action in connection with the sewer project, the council last night authorized filing of condemnation proceedings against Viola Thurston to procure right of way across her property. This is the first condemnation suit to be filed. The committee reported it had been unable to agree with the property holder on the amount of damages.

Property owners also were given assurance that there would be no assessments against their property in connection with the sewer construction, when an ordinance was adopted providing that all costs of the project should be paid from the general and special funds, and that no assessments or liens should be imposed.

When the project first was initiated, it provided for a service

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charge to meet the city's cost, but this was eliminated when the work was initiated under the WPA instead of the PWA.

ERRING WOMEN BEING RECLAIMED

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., May 7.—(AP)—Cookstoves and sewing machines—instead of arms and bars—are keeping the gunman's moll, the narcotic addict and other feminine lawbreakers inside one of the most unusual prisons in the world.

It is the federal industrial institution for women at Alderson, W. Va. Its warden, motherly Dr. Mary Harris, described it here today at a conference of officials of the nation's 22 federal prisons and reformatories.

"Few of the women know how to cook when they come to the institution," she said. "Still fewer know how to sew. But most of them really enjoy those and other things associated with home making, once they learn."

Dr. Harris' 500 women inmates are housed in neat cottage type buildings which look like a girls' college, and would be easy to escape from.

But guards, arms, steel gates, marching prison feet all are missing.

Nearly 50 per cent of the inmates are narcotic addicts. Another 20 per cent have broken liquor laws.

Many are released into squalid surroundings. Yet, Dr. Harris said, their training in domestic or industrial arts is so effective that few become repeaters. Only 21 of the 861 paroled in 11 years have violated their probation.

"The average woman," said Dr. Harris, "goes back into the world able to earn a living and make a home for herself."

6 AMERICAN NAZIS FACING CHARGES

ISLIP, N. Y., May 7.—(AP)—Warrants charging six men and the German-American Settlement League, Inc., operator of a camp at Yaphank, with violation of the New York state civil rights law were issued here by Justice of the Peace Blake.

The warrants, sworn by Roy P. Monahan, state commander of Disabled War Veterans, charged failure of the organization to file names and addresses of its members with the secretary of state in Albany to comply with a 1923 law.

Sheriff Dwyer of Suffolk county said he would seek the arrest at once of the accused men.

The law invoked specifically provides any organization demanding an oath as a requisite of membership must file a membership roster yearly. A fine of \$1,000 to \$5,000 and imprisonment up to one year are penalties provided.

G. W. Kunze, director of public relations for the German-American Bund, said the charge "won't hold water," denying that the bund or the settlement league requires its members to take any oath.

Camp Siegfried, where the Settlement League holds its gatherings, is on the site of old Camp Upton, used as a training camp for American soldiers in the World War. An amusement park, boys' summer camp, bungalow colony and open air theater capable of caring for a crowd of 50,000 are provided by the league.
