ANOTHER PORTLAND "GOON" CONVICTED

PORTLAND, May 9.—(AP)—A circuit court jury convicted James Leroy Gresham, 20-year-old former AFL teamster, on two charges of window breaking and acquitted him of the alleged burning of a fuel company truck here Saturday. Circuit Judge Crawford will pass sentence tomorrow. At Hillsboro, Circuit Judge Peters postponed passing sentence on Ellis Burr Russell, who pleaded guilty to charges of throwing rocks at a diner in Deaverton. Russell was instructed to abstain from liquor, keep out of union controversies, turn over his pay check to his wife and report twice each month to District Attorney Morgan. 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DONATION OF GOOD EYE STILL SOUGHT

PORTLAND, May 10.—(AP)—The Rev. U. E. Harding, seeking to prevent blindness through transplantation to his eye of a healthy cornea from a condemned criminal at San Quentin prison, returned yesterday from San Francisco where he underwent a preparatory operation. The plea to men in the death house was made recently by Harding, who said several offers had been made but none accepted. He expressed hope the healthy tissue could be obtained from "a prisoner or from some California medical school."
