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Two Good Men

HOW can a candidate for public office hope to be elected now, days if he does not promise anything and everything—without even the slightest notion of fulfilling such promises after election? The question is asked in all sincerity because it arises from a condition brought on by the people themselves. Time after time the voters have shown by their ballots that they like to be thus fooled.

In Oregon this time we have at least two who are ignoring the time tried and proven method for getting votes. One is Governor Charles H. Martin who is so forthright that he would not understand such a method, let alone use it. He seeks the democratic nomination for re-election to the governorship. The other is Charles A. Sprague, seeking the republican nomination for the same office. Sprague, accustomed to dealing with facts in his daily work as a newspaper publisher, is equally incapable of resorting to demagoguery. He is campaigning for a principle—to rebuild the republic can party in Oregon.

It is not the intention to say here that there are no other such candidates on the ballot. There may be. The burden of this discussion is that there is ample evidence that Sprague and Martin are entirely sincere. Will the voters appreciate that fact?

If these two men are nominated and if one of them is elected in November, Oregon will have a good governor for the next four years.

ON Tuesday Senator Pepper, coat-tail New Dealer, is decisively renominated in Florida, getting twice as many votes as his nearest anti-New Deal opponent.

On Friday the New Deal wages and hours bill is brought out of the house rules committee, where it had been kept in cold storage for months. Formerly reluctant congressman trip over each other's heels in their haste to sign the petition to bring the bill to a vote. This effect follows cause.

ALL that congressmen want to know is which way the vote cat is going to jump. In the Florida primary, they think they see a hint. But they won't KNOW until next November.

HOOPER, speaking in Oklahoma City, calls for 11 practical steps to improve conditions in this country. These steps include:

"Putting an end to spending, inflation and pump-priming, tax revision, a one-third reduction in relief expenditures through decentralization (reduction of overhead), a drive to balance the national budget, the same rights for employer and employee before the labor board and a stop to indiscriminate defamations of business and the creation of class hate."
