

CONSCRIPTION BY LOTTERY PROPOSED

Officers Devise Plan for Raising Army for U. S. in Event of War.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 10.—(AP)—Details of a national lottery plan for conscripting citizens into the armed forces of the United States in wartime, were worked out here today by U. S. war department officials and army officers.

Thirteen million men between 21 and 31 years of age would be summoned in the first draft, military officials disclosed.

Colonel V. J. O'Kellher and Major Lewis B. Hershey, both of the army general staff in Washington, headed a group of army authorities and army reserve specialists who met here yesterday for a four-day conference. Their visit was to perfect in the ten western states the far-flung mechanism of the selective service plan for the next war.

Major Hershey said the draft would be conducted by an independent government agency, permitting the armed forces to concern themselves entirely with the enemy.

"We had to look for our men in the last war," he said. "But the program has been changed. In the future, war will be fought by an organized nation, with the army looking to the civilian population for men, money and material."

The major said the project called for the setting up of a selective service board headquarters in Washington with division offices in the states and subdivisions in counties. A total of 6,000 draft board officers were contemplated.

Future conscripts, he said, would be divided into four classifications: Those ready to go, those with a reasonable reason for delay, those with dependents, and those unfit or ranked as office holders.

When the men were registered, it was explained, each would be given a number, identical in each of the 6,000 offices, to constitute a "class."

Lottery procedure will be followed, with numbers being drawn from a drum in Washington to determine the order of the draft. Army officials estimated that 1 million men could be summoned to arms the first month. Thereafter, men would be called at the rate of 330,000 the second month, 260,000 the third month, and 300,000 the fourth month. Military needs would determine the rate of conscription thereafter.

Compulsion Needed
War department officials have prepared a blanket bill to be presented to congress to authorize such a conscription agency.

"Past wars have shown compulsory service is necessary," declared Major Hershey. "It's our job to see that when and if the need is there, we will have the technical details as nearly up-to-date as possible."

The states represented at the conference were California, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, Idaho, Colorado, Montana, Wyoming, Utah, and Texas. Arizona sent no representative.

BOB PASTOR PUTS FINISH ON RAMAGE

LOS ANGELES, May 11.—(AP)—Lee Ramage of San Diego, once one of the country's top ranking heavyweights, virtually bowed out of the fight game today following a ninth round technical knockout loss last night to Bob Pastor of New York.

Beaten severely from the opening going, but never put off his feet, Ramage was taking punishment in the ninth when Pop Foster, his manager, threw in a towel to end the bout, scheduled for ten rounds.

The New Yorker waged an aggressive fight, bounced glove after glove off Ramage's head and wore him down with blows to the stomach in the early rounds, but the Californian several times brought bows from the 6,000 customers in the Olympic auditorium by rocking Pastor with right slams to the jaw.

The abrupt ending apparently meant the termination of Ramage's ring career. Willie Ritchie, California's chief boxing inspector, said he would not approve of another Ramage appearance.

Pastor, who is signed to meet Lou Nova of Oakland, Calif., June 3 in Hollywood, weighed 183 last night. Ramage scaled 197.

JUDGE LUSK TALKS ON COURT HISTORY

A most interesting address on the history and rise of importance of law courts was given before the Roseburg Kiwanis club at the regular Tuesday luncheon meeting by Hall S. Lusk, justice of the Oregon supreme court.

Judge Lusk told of the development of courts of law from the time of their separation from governmental dominance in England, during the 17th century, to the present time. He included a summary of the organization of the state and federal courts of the United States and Oregon in particular, calling attention to the high standard of integrity maintained in general by judges who have held office through appointment or election under this system.
