POPPY DAY DATES ARE ANNOUNCED FOR MAY 20TH AND 21ST

Poppy day will be observed in Douglas county this year on Friday and Saturday, May 20, 21, Mrs. V. J. Miceil, chairman of the poppy committee of Umpqua unit of the American Legion auxiliary, has announced. Extensive preparations for the observance of the day are being made by the auxiliary women.

Memorial poppies, to be worn in honor of the World War dead and to raise funds for the welfare of the disabled veterans and needy families of the dead and disabled, will be distributed throughout the city. Organization of corps of "poppy girls" to offer the flowers to everyone on the streets during the day and to receive contributions for the Legion and auxiliary welfare funds. The flowers have been ordered from Roseburg Veterans' Administration facility, where they have been made by disabled veterans.

"Poppy day is the day of personal tribute to the men who gave their lives in the nation's defense," explained Mrs. Miceil. On that day everyone can show that they still remember and honor the sacrifice of those who lost their lives in the war. The poppy is their flower, made in their memory by their disabled comrades.

"The American Legion auxiliary will ask no set price for its poppies. We want everyone to wear a poppy and to contribute as he is able for the flower. All contributions will be used for the work of the Legion and auxiliary among the men who lost health and strength in the war, and among the children whose fathers are dead or disabled. The bulk of the money will be expended right here in Douglas county for the work of the auxiliary in constantly going among needy families of veterans here."

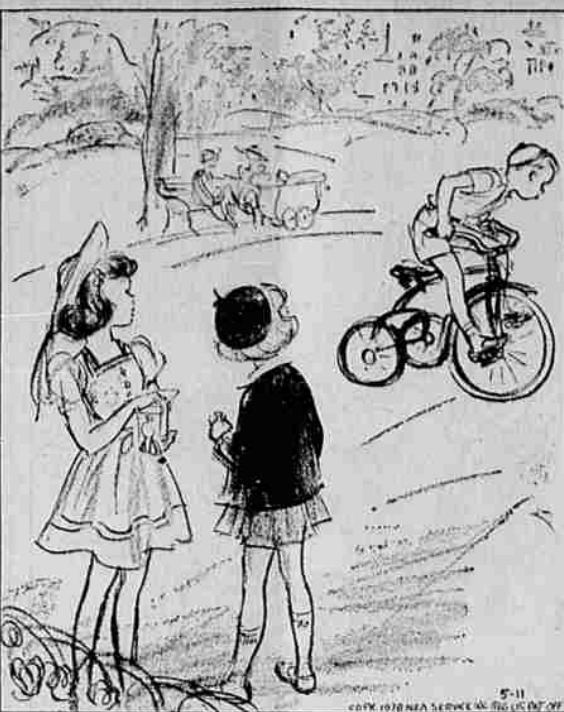
