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Get Airmail Minded

DRONING through the sky day
and night over 52,000 miles of
scheduled courses every 24 hours,
the airmail planes of the United
States mail service render a de-
pendable service to the nation.
They have been doing it for 20
years. The service has expanded
rapidly keeping pace with public
demand for a faster and faster mail
service. More than 20,000,000
pounds of airmail will be carried
during this year—and that figure
represents a lot of important let-
ters.

Though quietly appreciated,
there has never been much recog-
nition or public acclaim. But next
week has been designated "Air
Mail Week" and the post office de-
partment is sponsoring a nation-
wide celebration. Special cancella-
tion stamps are being used by
most postoffices. Special service
flights are being planned. Public
attention will be attracted to the
airmail as never before.

As a part of the observance of
airmail week the first direct airmail
service from Roseburg will be
given by a special mail plane which
will start at the Modford airport
and pick up airmail at Grants Pass,
Roseburg, Cottage Grove and val-
ley points. Though this flight is
but a one-day service—May 19, a
week from tomorrow—it may be a
forerunner of such service on a
regular basis in the fu-
ture. The Roseburg postoffice has
prepared a special cachet which
will be placed on all airmail during
the week. A special greeting of
the mail plane at the Roseburg
airport at 11:20 Thursday morning
is being planned. People are urged
to be on hand at the airport at
that time and greet the plane and
give the first official airmail flight

from Roseburg a good send-off.
So, let's send our mail via AIR-
MAIL—and show the postoffice de-
partment that this community is
airmail minded.

CIRCUS COMING TO ROSEBURG THURSDAY

Site Being Prepared While
Advance Man Arranges
for Food Delivery.

The curious who happen to pass
Bellows' field in West Roseburg
today may wonder what men are
doing there with tapelines and
stakes. It is the 24-hour man and
his aides of the A. G. Barnes and
Sells Floto Combined circus, which
will exhibit at the field tomorrow.
No time can be lost in the morn-
ing when the circus arrives, so
this gentleman, known in the cir-
cus world as the 24-hour man, is
in town today making final ar-
rangements. The grounds must be
laid out to designate where the
many tents will be placed, the sid-
ing at the Southern Pacific rail-
road yard must be cleared, the lo-
cal firms who will supply the food
for more than 500 circus employes
and a thousand animals must be
prepared to make early delivery.
In fact, every detail must be at-
tended to before the long circus
trains roll into town at dawn to-
morrow.

The A. G. Barnes and Sells-
Floto Combined circus is rightly
proud of its 1938 program, which
introduces many new and startling
features. Among them are the Rie-
fench family of bareback riders,
featuring Clarence Bruce, the
greatest of comedy riders; Mabel
Stark, the Queen of the Jungle,
the only woman trainer to enter
the arena with twenty-five fer-
ocious jungle beasts; Janet May,
the celebrated gymnast; Anna
Merkle, who walks upside down on
a cello hanging at the very top of
the big tent; Frank Phillips, the
fearless wild animal trainer; Jack
Joyce, presenting 30 perfectly
trained horses; Walter McClain
and his three herds of performing
elephants; the Yom Kams, Ori-
ental acrobatic family; the Flying
