

NEW YORK YANKS REACH TOP PLACE

Cleveland Victims of 7th
Straight Win; Detroit
Downs Washington.

With the Yankees in first place in the American league pennant parade as the result of their 4-1 win over Cleveland's collapse Indians yesterday, the whole situation looks like things are on the way toward monopoly for New York, despite the fact the calendar shows only May 12.

It took a lot of pitching to whip the St. Louis Cardinals yesterday, but Belton had it and the New York Giants won out 5-3 for their fifth in a row.

The Yankees, meantime, climaxed their long uphill climb with their seventh straight win, on the strength of their extra-base power and a fine nine-hit pitching effort by Chandler. Henrich and Rolfe whacked homers in the Yanks' 10th attack that was good for 19 bases.

Since the Washington Senators were having their seven-game streak ruined, 4-1, by Kennedy and the rest of the Detroit Tigers, the Yanks pulled themselves back to front by a few percentage points, and the Nats dropped to second.

Lefty Grove made it five in a row and tossed the Boston Red Sox to a 4-2 decision over the White Sox, thereby boosting Tom Yawkey's gold-plated millionaires into a third-place deadlock with Cleveland.

The Chicago Cubs came apart with a bang that must have been heard in Slam, as Munger got back to the war with his fireball, a neat curve and control, and won his first game of the year, 7-0, for the Dodgers over the Cubs. It was Munger's first shutout since he whitewashed those same Cubs back in September of 1935, and it raised the Brooklyn to sixth place.

The St. Louis Browns, buried in the American league cellar, worked a triple play and went on to a 3-5 win over the fumbling Athletics, who made only five errors.

**RECORD K. O. SCORED
IN ELEVEN SECONDS**

**4 COAST TEAMS IN
SECOND PLACE TIE**

A wild throw to the plate by Seattle's centerfielder, Lawrence, in the last of the ninth inning which allowed Luby to score gave the last place Oakland A's their 14th victory of the season by a 2 to 1 score.
