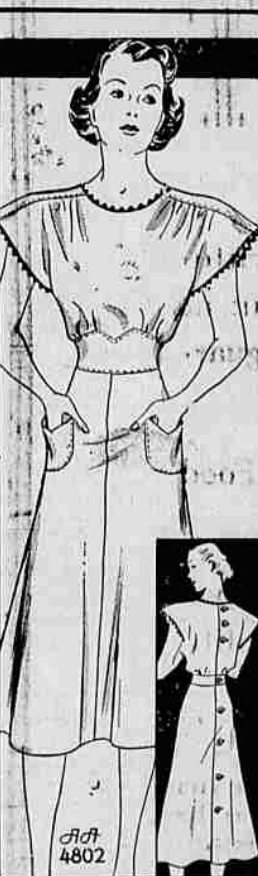

VOLUNTEER WORKERS TO DISTRIBUTE POPPIES

Enthusiastic response to the American Legion auxiliary's appeal for poppy day workers is reported by Mrs. V. J. Miceli, poppy chairman of the Umpqua auxiliary unit. Enrollment of women to distribute memorial poppies throughout the city on poppy days, May 20-21, is practically complete and assures complete coverage of the city of Roseburg.

All of the auxiliary's poppy day workers will serve as unpaid volunteers, giving their time to bring the memorial flowers to the city and to permit every penny of the contributions made for the poppies to go to the welfare of needy victims of the war. The funds raised will help support the work of the legion and auxiliary for disabled veterans, their families and the families of deceased veterans during the coming year.

All members of the auxiliary are able to serve have volunteered to distribute the memorial poppies. In addition, members of other women's and girls' organizations will aid. Junior auxiliary members will take an active part in the work.
