

IT'S CIRCUS DAY FOR ROSEBURG FOLK

Al Barnes and Sells-Floto Shows Perform on West Side Grounds.

Today is circus day. The young stars of Roseburg went to bed last night and dreamed of clowns with funny faces, giraffes with necks that reached up into the clouds, elephants with long trunks, pretty girls in pink tights and fluffy skirts, cavorting on the backs of dappled horses—and goodness knows what else.

And, today, their dreams came true, for the great Al G. Barnes and Sells-Floto Combined circus arrived at dawn this morning. Large crowds gathered at the Southern Pacific railroad yards to see the circus train pull in with its brightly colored wagons, horses, elephants and performers. Hardly had the train come to a stop before a crew of several hundred men started the work of unloading and transferring of the wagon equipment to Bellows field, west Roseburg.

Inside of two hours the big top, the menagerie and the side show tents were up and nearly ready for the two performances today—2 and 8 p. m.

Many new features have been added to the 1938 program, making it the greatest performance offered by the Al G. Barnes and Sells-Floto circus during the thirty years that it has successfully traveled the United States.

Following the magnificent opening pageant, the performance moves swiftly into the famous Roffenach family of riders, with Clarence Bruce, the world's foremost riding comedian, Mabel Stark, the queen of the jungles, the only woman to handle a mixed group of twenty-five jungle beasts; Janet May, the unrivaled aerial gymnast; Anna Merkle, the human fly, Frank Phillips, fearless wild animal tamer; Walter McClain and his three herds of performing elephants; Jack Joyce, presenting thirty perfectly trained horses; the Yom Kams, Oriental acrobats; the Flying Loringes and over sixty merry clowns. Reserved seats and general admission tickets are on sale all day at Chapman's Drug store, 103 N. Jackson, as well as on the show grounds. Doors for the evening performance will open at 7 p. m. to allow time to visit the menagerie. Following this evening's performance, the circus will move on to Salem.

LIBEL SUIT AGAINST TOWNSEND SETTLED

SAN FRANCISCO, May 12.—(AP)—The \$150,000 libel suit brought by Edward J. Margrett against Dr. F. E. Townsend, originator of the old age pension plan, was settled out of court yesterday just after a jury assembled to try it in federal court. Attorneys declined to reveal the monetary consideration of the agreement but it was reported to be between \$7,500 and \$10,000. Margrett also charged Dr. Townsend with accusing him of misappropriating funds for his own use.
