

UTILITIES BOW TO HOLDING CO. LAW

NEW YORK, May 11.—(AP)—Cooperation between big business in the utility field and the government was announced yesterday by executives of fourteen of the country's largest public utility holding companies.

A letter to W. O. Douglas, chairman of the securities exchange commission, indicating their intention to cooperate, was made public here today.

The fourteen companies have created a committee of five to sit down amicably with the commission in Washington to work out programs for compliance with the "death sentence" clause of the public utility act of 1935.

Subsection "B" of this clause provides that a holding company's scope must be restricted to a single integrated system and to such other operations only as are allied with the major business.

Section "E" authorizes a holding company, beginning last January 1, to submit voluntarily to the SEC a plan of compliance.

The "constructive" purpose of the present committee is to work out such a plan with the SEC, under conditions of mutual cooperation.

The committee, however, despite an attitude of compromise, will urge "proper protection for capital now invested in and hereafter required" by the holding companies and their subsidiaries.

The committee in so doing will put forward the belief of executives of the fourteen companies that "the fundamental principle of diversity of investment, which is represented here by both geographic location of operating properties and character of business served by them, is a very important factor in the raising of additional capital," the letter said.

\$2,500,000 PAID TO OREGON JOBLESS

SALEM, Ore., May 11.—Four months' administration of the unemployment compensation law distributed two and one-half million dollars to eligible jobless workers in Oregon, and claims handled by the Roseburg office brought \$35,392 to this section.

Processing of claims and benefit payments are reaching current status rapidly. Checks now are going out at the rate of 20,000 per week and 73 per cent of the more than 65,000 claims filed have passed for payment. Many unemployed workers are receiving their 15th checks this week. Average per check is \$11.82.

Less than 7 per cent of the total claims received are either incomplete or in the computing process. The other 20 per cent have been denied due to labor disputes, seasonality, insufficient earnings in base year or because earnings in the base year were in occupations not covered by the law.

GOMEZ SETTLES HIS WIFE'S SUIT

NEW YORK, May 11.—(AP)—June O'Dea, actress wife of Vernon (Lefty) Gomez, Yankee pitcher, withdrew her separation suit against him yesterday.

She received, said her attorney, a "lump cash settlement," the amount of which was not announced.

Mrs. Gomez also withdrew a counter claim for separation. She accused the baseball star of cruelty and desertion.

She had been receiving \$75 a week temporary alimony. The attorneys would not discuss the plans of the couple or any possible change in the alimony arrangement.

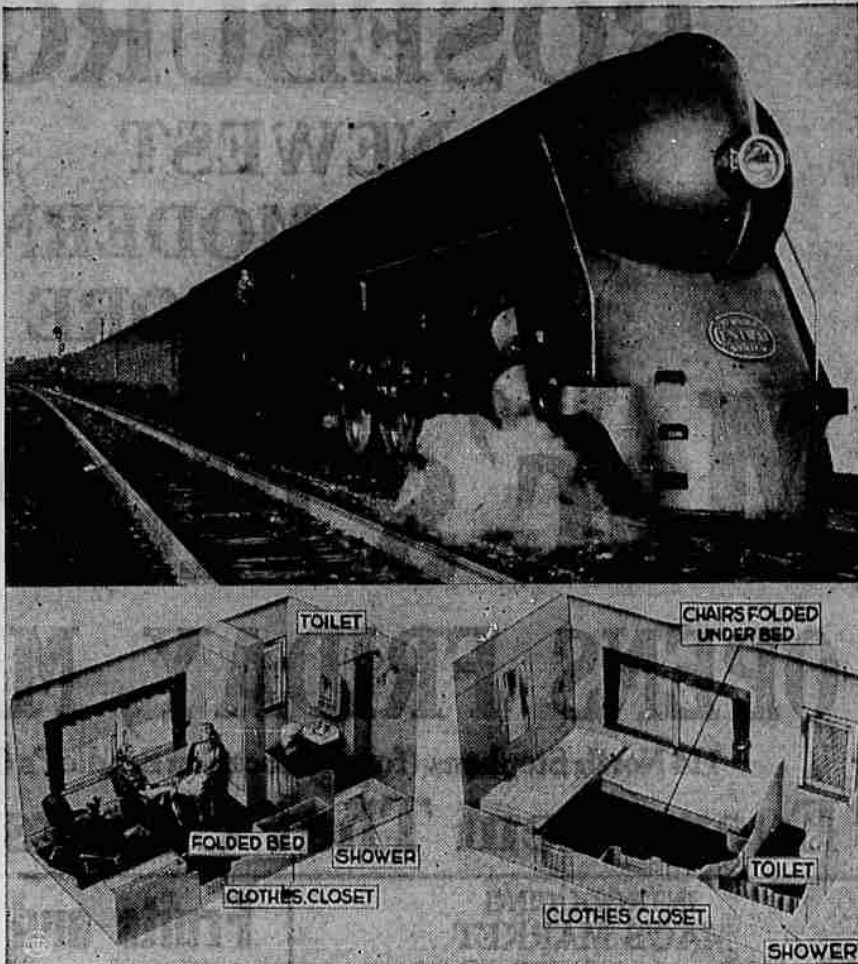

Steam Streamliner Latest in Travel Luxury



Streamlined speed and luxury will ride the rails of two great railroad systems—the New York Central and the Pennsylvania—after the inauguration June 15 of 16-hour-runs between New York and Chicago. In the top photo the New York Central's new "Twentieth Century," powered by steam, flashes down the track in a test run near Elkhart, Ind. The lower photos show interior views of the master bedroom, displacing the old Pullman berth. In the day time, as shown at the left, beds are folded away, allowing ample lounging space. The cutaway view at right shows the same room made ready for sleeping with each bed accommodating two people. Both roads will use equipment of this type.

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WASSERMAN TEST MARRIAGE BAN HIT

WORCESTER, Mass., May 11.—(AP)—State laws which forbid persons with positive Wasserman tests from marrying are "doing an injustice to the individual and the community," Dr. Paul A. Leary, head of the dermatology section of Mayo hospital, Rochester, Minn., believes.

The Wasserman test "has not proved adequate," he said.

He declared some states have been "too zealous" in attempting to stem the spread of syphilis.

"Many persons with a positive Wasserman test years after year," he said, "are no danger to their family, their children, nor the community, whereas many with a persistently negative reaction are menaces."

He added "only the most careful medical study reveals these differences and no law can be written, on the basis of present medical knowledge, which would attain the goal sought."

He said that one third of those contracting the disease are "cured spontaneously" often without medical aid, through defense body mechanisms. Another third, he said, get "only a mild reaction." The remainder, he said, are "those suffering all the horrible effects."

ONE EYE REMOVED FROM AILING BABY

CHICAGO, May 11.—(AP)—Hope that medical skill would save Baby Haimine Colan from complete blindness cheered the infant's anxious mother today.

Samuel A. Hoffman, attorney for the family of the 5½ week old child, announced that Dr. Robert H. Good, who removed the tiny girl's left eye yesterday to halt spread of a cancerous growth, had decided there was a chance to preserve the vision of the right eye although it also had been affected by glaucoma.

The baby was "bright and alert" in her crib at the Garfield Park community hospital. Her cry of hunger was regarded as a "very cheering" sign after the serious operation.

PRINTER NASH NOT MOVING TO EUGENE

SAN FRANCISCO, May 11.—(AP)—John Henry Nash, noted San Francisco printer and collector of fine books, denied yesterday that he would move his plant to Eugene, Ore.

"I plan to stay in San Francisco as long as I live," Nash who was returning from a trip to Oregon, said in denying recent reports.

The printer confirmed sale of his famous library of 240 volumes to the University of Oregon, located at Eugene.
