SLATTERY, AIDE OF ICKES, PROMOTED

WASHINGTON, May 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt nominated Harry Slattery of South Carolina today to be undersecretary of the interior succeeding Charles West, resigned.

Slattery has been an assistant to Ickes since 1933. He also was a personal assistant to a previous interior department head, the late Franklin K. Lane, in 1918.

From 1909 to 1912, he was secretary to Gifford Pinchot when the latter was chief United States forester, and for six years was secretary and counsel for the National Conservation association. He is a lawyer.

Stephen T. Early, a white house secretary, said the president was looking around for a new post for West, former democratic congressman from Ohio, but as yet had not selected one for him.

Interior Secretary Ickes several months ago discharged West's assistant, a relative of the undersecretary and otherwise reduced West's office staff.

Interior department officials said Ickes considered the office useless. The secretary himself observed that "I like to see that the people of my department earn their salaries."

GOLD STAR MOTHERS STRIKE AT ALIENS

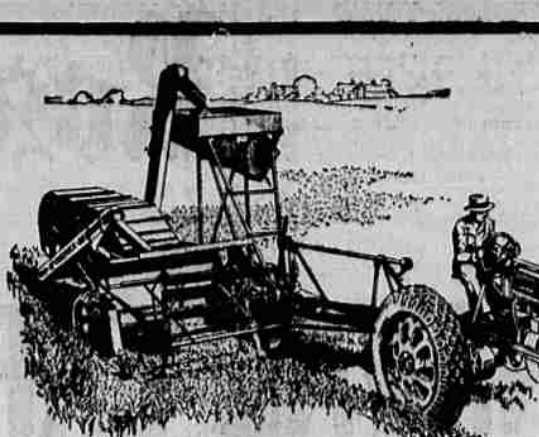
PHILADELPHIA, May 12.—(AP)—Deportation of aliens swearing allegiance to a foreign country's dictatorship was urged in a resolution passed today by the Gold Star Mothers at their national convention.

Another resolution endorsed "any legislation pertaining to restricted immigration, mandatory deportation and prohibiting employment of aliens in the federal government."

Mrs. Bess Duncan Wells, Portland, Ore., was elected president. She succeeded Mrs. Horace B. Blake, of Philadelphia.

Other officers chosen included Mrs. Elizabeth Lambert Wood, Portland, Ore., committeeman. Mayor Joseph K. Carson of Portland, Ore., commended the mothers for their "opposition to all isms."
