RAIL LINES GIVE PAY SLASH NOTICE

WASHINGTON, May 12.—(AP)—The management of the principal railroads of the country notified employees today it intends to reduce basic wages 15 per cent on July 1.

"This action," the statement said, "is compelled by conditions now confronting the railroad industry. We wish the public and the railroad employees to know what those conditions are...

The railroads now employ slightly fewer than a million workers. It has been estimated a 15 per cent reduction would amount to \$250,000,000 annually.

The carriers' joint conference committee said the railroad industry "faces a crisis more difficult than in 1932."

"This crisis is not due to failure of railroad service, because service is better than ever before," the committee's statement said.

Mayor Joseph Carson of Portland telegraphed from the east that LaGuardia "hopes negotiations will be resumed as Oregon is too important to be omitted."
