PARIS CALLS IT "MODERN"

PARIS—While every dress creator seems to have indulged in whimsy and produced some sort of period gown, the more modern, streamlined dress is still very much in evidence in every collection. It is going to prove a refreshing alternative to the slightly sugary sweetness of kerchiefs, crinolines and bustles, which after all seem more at home at state occasions and their attendant formality.

The gowns in the "modern" category are audacious, to say the least. This is expressed in terms of sheer-like sheaths, in bold color combinations or designs, in scant draperies stressing the 1938 version of the hourglass silhouette. Decolleté are bold, leaving the back entirely nude and the front extremely low. Skirts are often slit to the knees or end in short, flattail trains, with paillette or bead trim

emphasizing a drape of décolleté. While many of these gowns are belted at the normal waistline, there are also many "princess" dresses, and the newer juniper-bodice molding the hips and sometimes extending to mid-thighs. Lanvin's new silhouette, with long-waisted effect underlined by a ribbon or trimming in a contrasting color seems to point the way to a dropped waistline, while Piguet's corset-top dresses caused a great sensation, especially as these were expressed in gleaming satin with the skirts in a clinging sheer fabric, usually tightly pleated.

Printed silks with bold designs and many-colored effects are much favored for these slender gowns. Field flowers in wide bands, sash-like allover floral designs, large-sized ostrich feather and algrette patterns or again, leaves of all descriptions appear among the novel-

ty prints. Molyneux's "capital" prints with New York's skyscrapers, the monuments of Paris and well-known London sites in bold black or white lines on contrasting backgrounds are used to great effect both for day and evening wear.

Elaborate Panel Effects. Long, on the other hand, takes a "wrought iron" design in black and white for a simple sheath gown but veils it with a loose wrap in organza showing alternate panels in pink, green, yellow and blue attached to a yoke of featherweight black wool and repeats the colors in the algrette evening coiffure.

Tremendous "corsages" of flowers, massed at the décolletage or trailing from the waistline, often repeating the same blooms and colors of the print itself or else supplying the color contrast to this type.
