

DOUGLAS RESIDENTS PASS 25,000 MARK

Residents from other sections of the United States, many attracted by accounts of Oregon as an attractive place in which to live and work, and others driven westward by economic forces, have added an estimated total of 2,575 people to the population of Douglas county from 1930 to January 1, 1937, according to a report, "Migration Into Oregon, 1930-37," recently prepared by the state planning board. This net gain is the estimated difference between persons coming into the county and those moving out.

Natural increase, or excess of births over deaths, amounted to 459 persons during these seven years, making an estimated total population for the county on January 1, 1937, of 25,266. This increase was 13.6 per cent of the 1930 population compared with an increase of 3 per cent during the decade 1920-1930.

All types of workers are included in the list of occupations of these newcomers, with craftsmen and physical laborers leading. The majority of these immigrants are in the most active age range, 20-45 years. On the average more than 80 per cent were less than 45 years old at the time they migrated into Oregon.

ADDRESSES MADE TO FARADAY CLUB

SENATORS OPPOSE RAIL WAGE SLASH

WASHINGTON, May 16.—(AP)—Senator La Follette (D., Wis.) told the senate today that if the railroads persisted in their efforts to bring about wage reductions, he would oppose legislation making \$300,000,000 in RFC loans available to them.

The railroads have proposed a 15

per cent cut in wages, effective July 1.

La Follette said he thought "it is not justice" for the railroads to ask employees to give up \$250,000,000 yearly pay while congress was being asked to "prop up their tottering financial structure."

Senator Truman (D., Mo.), said that if the railroads had informed the senate banking committee they intended to ask for pay cuts, the R. F. C. lending bill would never have been approved by that group.

Support for La Follette's stand came also from Senators Hatch (D., N. M.), Maloney (D., Conn.), McCarran (D., Nev.), and Shipstead (D., Minn.).

News of 4-H CLUBS

The last local leaders' meeting for the summer was held Monday evening at the home of County Club Agent E. A. Britton with 50 local leaders in attendance. The business was quickly disposed of and refreshments which were cooked under grand were served. While around the camp fire, several leaders stated that although the projects were completed they intend to hold regular club meetings throughout the entire summer in order to do some demonstration and judging work and to have some picnic and social meetings. This practice, according to County Club Agent E. A. Britton, seems to be spreading among clubs all over the county. It is thought that most clubs will be organized as permanent clubs rather than for just time enough to complete projects.

Cleveland school held its achievement program Wednesday on the school grounds. This school is taught by Miss Marguerite Poust who has encouraged club work throughout the two years she has been teaching there. County Club Agent E. A. Britton has received moving pictures from the Oregon state game commission dealing with china pheasants and the raising of those birds. Mr. Britton has already shown these pictures to club members raising pheasants at Myrtle Creek and will show them to all other china pheasant members during the first part of this week.

Club members have received so far this season six cases or 1728 china pheasant eggs which are now under hens for hatching. There will probably be one or two more cases received before the setting season is ended. Douglas county club members have made a good reputation in raising the pheasants and intend to not only keep that reputation but make it even better.

An achievement program was held in connection with the 4th grade graduation program at Loon Lake on Sunday. All clubs, including the livestock clubs, had exhibits on hand for scoring. Each club also gave a skit as its share of the program. The work at Loon Lake this year has been of very high quality and in good quantity. A basket dinner was served at noon with about 100 partaking. County Agent J. R. Parker and County Club Agent E. A. Britton attended the meeting.

An achievement program is being held today at the Azalea school taught by Miss Margaret Ward. County Club Agent E. A. Britton is attending the meeting and will take part in the program.

4-H club members and leaders of Sutherlin are preparing to hold their achievement program in the Arts building in Sutherlin at 10:30 a. m. Wednesday. All club members

have their exhibits ready and expect to make a fine showing of this program which will be their first.

Garden Valley clubs will hold their achievement program this coming Thursday at 3 o'clock in the afternoon at the Garden Valley school.

There are to be four achievement programs next Friday. Ten-mile school has its program set for 10 o'clock Friday morning; Hayhurst school will have theirs at noon; Sunnydale at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and Oakland school will hold theirs during the evening. The Oakland achievement program will be followed by a school circus Friday evening.

Nuggett school up South Myrtle creek will hold its achievement program Saturday morning.

The U. S. National bank, Roseburg branch, is again sponsoring a corn growing program for 4-H club members of Douglas county this year.

Several club members are experimenting with hybrid corns this season and will be able to make a complete report at harvest time this fall. Lyle Spore of Days Creek has one-fourth acre of one kind of hybrid corn and three-fourths acre of another kind. Don Harmon of Garden Valley is experimenting with four different kinds of hybrids. Walter Marks of Riversdale is experimenting with 11 different kinds of corn and Labri Ritchie of Garden Valley has planted 11 different kinds of corn. All the above have their corn planted. George Marsh of Lookingglass is planting at least four different kinds of hybrid corn today or tomorrow.

This corn is to be treated exactly as the regular open pollinated varieties and at harvest time will be weighed out and acreage production determined. Moisture tests will also be made. Reports of these hybrid corns will be made and exhibits made this fall in the lobby of the U. S. National bank at the corn show so that results, good or bad, may be noted.

County Club Agent E. A. Britton reports that it looks as though there will be about 70 Douglas county club members going to summer school again this year. They will leave Sunday noon, June 5, and be on hand for the opening of summer school the following morning. The school will close so that all members will return home Friday, June 17. Business men of Oakland came through with quite a surprise and reported that they had made up a scholarship fund which would send 8 club members to summer school. Three others from Oakland will go and pay their own way and one is attending on a state fair scholarship which makes a total of 12 from that town.

Mr. Britton states that there is a lot of interest throughout the county among the organizations on the matter of summer school and that he expects visitors from several of these organizations at the school session. Full instructions will be sent to each club member who is to attend summer school some time this week.
