STATE SCHOOL HEAD TALKS IN ROSEBURG

The demands upon the American public in providing education increased 85 times in the past 60 years, although population has increased only three times in the same period, Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, told the Roseburg Kiwanis club at its regular Tuesday luncheon meeting. Mr. Putnam, O. D. Adams of Salem and Ben Nichols of Riddle were guests of the club.

Discussing the strides taken in education, Mr. Putnam said that in 1870 there were 70,000 students in the entire United States, while in 1936, 60 years later, this number had increased to six million, 85 times the original number, although the population of the country had increased only three times.

He spoke briefly on the changing methods in elementary and high school educational methods, which are found expedient in order to meet changing conditions. He called attention to the recognized desirability of a high school education as attested by the importance attached to it by employers when interviewing an applicant for work.

Members of the Kiwanis-Grange entertainment troupe were given special honors and recognition at the meeting for their work in carrying programs to each part of the county.

President Walter Fisher urged all Kiwanis members to assemble at the airport Thursday to witness Roseburg's first airmail flight.
