

BASEBALL HISTORY WRITTEN BY GROVE

Great Left-Handed Hurler, Nearly 40, Still Going Strong in Majors.

CHICAGO, May 19.—(AP)—Robert Moses "Lefty" Grove, with his left arm, is writing another brilliant chapter in a story which already ranks as one of the greatest in baseball's 100-year-old collection of diamond romances. 'Ol Moses is almost 40 years old. His gray hair is streaked with gray. Long since, it would seem, has the elasticity of youth departed from his spindly legs, and no longer does that lean left arm fire the fast ball which once made batters flinch. Yet today, Grove is very much a part of baseball's annual picture. In seven game appearances, he has won six victories and lost no games. He has pitched 60 innings, allowed an average of only two earned runs per game, granted only 21 bases on balls and struck out 38 batters. 'Ol Moses is giving the veterans time to rest. Grove won his 26th triumph in 14 years in the majors the other day and should he never win another game he'll go down as one of the greatest left handed pitchers in the sport's history. In 1925 he came to the Philadelphia Athletics from Baltimore, bearing a \$100,000 price tag—and since then he's made that price tag look like a bargain counter snapp. For seven straight years, 1929 through 1931, he led the league in strikeouts. For eight years he paced every pitcher in earned runs. He won 21 and lost five in 1930 and fanned 211 batters, the greatest strikeout feat of his career. Four times he took the win and lost crown and his mark of 31 wins and four defeats in 1931 stands as an all-time major league high for efficiency in percentage. Eight times he has won 20 or more games in one season and in 1933 he won 24 and lost only eight games for the Maekens. He pitched the Athletics to three straight flags in 1929, 1930 and 1931 and to a pair of world titles.

BEAVERS INCREASE COAST LEAGUE LEAD

(By The Associated Press) The Pacific Coast baseball league picked up momentum today as the Portland Beavers increased their circuit leadership. Hollywood and San Diego tied for the runner-up spot and Seattle moved into fourth place. The Beavers won their second straight game from San Francisco's Seals by a 3 to 1 score last night by bunting hits in the fourth inning and taking advantage of two walks and a single in the sixth. Four hits in the fourth netted two runs. They put their other run over in the sixth. Five hits, a walk and a pair of stolen bases gave the Sacramento Solons five runs and a 6 to 2 win over the Hollywood Stars. The Solons were trailing 2 to 1 when they staged their uprising. San Diego had an easy time beating the Oakland Aces 7 to 1, after trailing 1 to 0 going into the sixth inning. Seattle, which started the week in seventh place, moved into the first division by defeating Los Angeles 12 to 4. The defeat pushed the Los Angeles team into seventh place. The Seattle team blasted three Los Angeles pitchers for 13 hits, including a homer in the first inning by Muller with two on base. Muller paced Seattle with his homer, a double and two singles in four times at bat. He scored four runs and batted in three more.

YANKS WIN WITH 2 DIMAGGIO HOMERS

Medwick's Bat Factor in Cards' Victory; French Outhurls Hubbell.

News is good a time as any for big league pitchers to start pulling in their ears and heading for the storm cellars. Joe DiMaggio and Ducky Medwick are on the warpath again. Each is a complete dose of pitcher's poison: wrapped up and ready to go. From the looks of things, they've picked up right where they left off last year. Somehow, it seems natural to see each leading his league in batting. DiMag with a neat .421 mark, and Ducky with a just-as-classy .326. And just like last year, you never can tell when either one of them is going to pick the next pitch to break up a ball game. Take yesterday, for instance. The Yankees were having a tough time of it with the St. Louis Browns. Then along came DiMaggio in the fifth frame, knocked one of Newsum's pet pitches out of the lot, and the Yanks were away in front. But Gomez and Murphy couldn't hold the Browns. So DiMag came up there again in the eighth, helped himself to another one of Buck's high hand ones, with two mates on base, and parked it among the paying customers in the bleachers—and there was your ball game. Result: Yankees 11, Browns 7. Newsum, however, had a lot of fun while it lasted, fanning six members of Murderer's Row in order, to equal an American league record. Medwick was going to work in Brooklyn. He contributed a homer and scored four of the runs that gave the Gas Housers a 12-4 decision for their fourth straight win. This boosted the Cardinals into the 500 class for the first time this season, deadlocking them with the idle Cincinnati Reds, who were rained out in Philadelphia, and the Boston Bees, whose Turner raved up a measly five hits in 14 innings to win a long distance 2-1 decision over the Pittsburgh Pirates. The Pirates were dropped to third place by this setback, and the Chicago Cubs climbed back to second by topping the Giants, 4-2. Hubbell and Larry French hooked up in a tight pitching duel with the eighth, when Ott made a two-base error to allow Gabby Hartnett score all the way from second. It was Hubbell's first setback of the year. Cleveland Bobby Feller slipped a six-hitter across on the Athletics and the Indians clicked to a 7-2 victory. Feller not only pitched eight ball, but batted out a homer to pay the Senators to a 4-1 victory over the tottering Tigers. The Red Sox and White Sox were rained out in Chicago.
