Judiciary Recommendations

ALTHOUGH the election tomorrow is a primary election so far as party candidates are concerned it is more than a primary as a non-partisan judiciary election. Any candidate on the judiciary ballot who receives a majority of the votes cast for those for the position he seeks is declared elected.

Three supreme court positions are to be filled. If no clear majority is polled by any of the candidates the two receiving the highest number of votes in each of the three races will be voted upon again in November. In that sense the election tomorrow is a primary. However, for position number three only two candidates are running so one of them will be elected without further balloting. J. B. Bailey, present incumbent is opposed by B. S. Martin of Benton county. A vote for Judge Bailey is recommended.

Position number two on the supreme court is held by Judge Henry J. Bean. Four candidates oppose him on tomorrow's ballot. Doubtless all of the four opponents are good men but Judge Bean has a good record and has performed his work well so he may as well be retained on the bench.

Position number five, now held by Hall S. Lusk is sought also by James T. Chinnock of Grants Pass and by I. H. Van Winkle who is now attorney general for the state of Oregon. The race in this group is admittedly between Lusk and Van Winkle. Hall Lusk is an able man, has made an excellent judge whereas Van Winkle has not made a very good record as attorney general. For position number five on the judiciary ballot a vote for Hall S. Lusk is recommended.

Confusing Influences

INFLUENCES being brought to bear upon the voters in tomorrow's primary election run the gamut of "isms." Strangely little emphasis is being placed by the candidates or their supporters on ability and past performance.

Now dualism, free power, Townsendism and boasts of being "friends of the taxpayer," without any real evidence of that fact, are offered as reasons for deserving votes by various candidates.

There is every reason why voters tomorrow may be confused. It seems to be a general rule in choosing a candidate that the fellow who promises the most before election delivers the least after he obtains an office. Conversely some of the best public servants we have ever had in this state were elected without making a lot of wild promises or without espousing "causes" that were convenient vehicles.

Several Douglas county candidates are still riding on the Townsend band wagon. Without any reference whatever to the plan itself, this newspaper believes that for a candidate for local office to ride on a plan and hang himself onto an organization that has as its object the passage of federal legislation is out and out demagoguery. It is obvious that whether or not a man believes in the Townsend plan has no bearing whatever upon his ability to be a good county officer.

HERE are the mathematics of it: The Republican party of Oregon, purged of job-hunters, relief-seekers and bandwagon riders, is a compact body of conservative thinkers who will NOT vote for the radical-backed Hess. With all

this purging, the Republicans are still in the majority in Oregon registrations.

If Martin is defeated on Friday, his followers will not support the soon-applauding Hess, but will come over into the camp of the clear-thinking, fair-minded but basically conservative Sprague.

The combination of the two will be ample to elect Sprague in November.

IN any event, the big shot New Dealers, who are trying to dictate Oregon politics, are riding for a fall.

If Martin wins, after their desperate, last-minute attempt to dynamite him in the primary, the Democrats of Oregon will have slapped them in the face. If Hess wins the Democratic nomination and is defeated by Sprague in November (as will almost certainly happen if Hess wins) the people of Oregon will have kicked them in the pants and in addition they will have contributed to a Democratic defeat and a Republican victory.

THIS writer, who believes that the purged and severely disciplined remnant of the Republican party represents the best and most constructive political thought in Oregon today, would normally be pleased by such a Democratic debacle as the nomination of the soon-backed Hess this spring and his overwhelming defeat by Sprague in the fall.

But there remains the able, fearless, patriotic service rendered by Governor Martin during his present term in office. We CAN NOT disregard and refuse to reward such service if we are to have good government.

FEELING as he does on this point, this writer (a registered Republican) will vote for Sprague in the primary—for it seems to smack just a little of political chicaneury to change party registration in the primary to vote for one man, if Martin is nominated, this writer will vote for Martin in November.

IF Sprague is nominated by the Republicans (as now seems certain) and Hess is nominated by the Democrats, it will be a pleasure to vote for and support Sprague, who is an able, fearless and competent citizen in his own right.

It will be a DOUBLE pleasure to discomfit the New Deal big shots who have butted into the Oregon primary with the determination to rule or ruin.

PRESS COMMENT

CHOOSING A SENATOR

The best qualified candidate seeking nomination for the United States senate in Oregon on either ticket is former Senator Robert N. Stanford, qualified by previous legislative experience and the results accomplished. Mr. Stanford served three terms in the Oregon legislature, one of them as speaker and six years in the senate. None of the other candidates has had any legislative experience.

Mr. Stanford secured the passage of the O. & C. grant land tax refund, the greatest relief measure ever enacted for Oregon. He proposes the extension of this principle which has already refunded \$7,750,000 to 18 Oregon counties, providing an annual tax payment exceeding \$500,000, to insure compensation for tax loss imposed by federal reserves. He has many other constructive measures to his credit.

Rufus Holman, who is running as his opponent in the republican primary, has such an excellent record as state treasurer, with over half of his term yet to serve, that Oregon cannot afford to lose his services in his present capacity. He is needed where he is.

The Capital Journal regards Willis Mahoney, who seeks the democratic nomination, as the state's outstanding example of a demagogue, a perpetual office-seeker, ready as his record shows, to advocate any cause that means a vote. Carl Donaghy, his opponent, has made good as federal district attorney, with at least three years more to serve, but is without legislative training or experience.

It results at Washington are wanted, together with the record shows, like Stanford, should be sent there. — Salem Capital Journal.

TOMORROW is primary election day. I suspect it will be surprising to note how many people, instead of visiting their polling booths, will go fishing instead, or play golf, or stay at home and cultivate the corn ground, or a sharp pen the mower sickles.

I've talked to a number of folks the past year who are all steamed up "over the way the country is going to pot, what with the men who get into office, and the legislation they pass"—yet who hadn't taken the trouble to vote at the previous election.

They don't stay away (here in our part of the country at any rate) because they aren't well informed concerning political matters, or that they haven't the intelligence to know how they would vote. They are inveterate readers of newspapers and magazines, and listen extensively to the radio—absorbing vast quantities of political material.

Too lazy? I hardly think so. More likely, they assume that "George" will do it well enough. If they don't, "George" usually does it, too; but often he surprises us, in his method—he votes his way, not ours, sometimes, and leaves us holding the sack.

Really it's not much trouble to vote; and when we have done so, a virtuous feeling is our immediate reward. We've done our duty as American citizens, we have fulfilled an obligation to our conscience.

The result of an election may not be to our liking; but with a 100% turnout of eligible voters, we can have the satisfaction at least of knowing that their expression represents the desire of a majority of the people. Which, after all, is what we need to know, really to respect the result.

I may be alone in the feeling—and could be wrong too, of course; but I am becoming a bit fed up with the attitude of mind which allows a man slumped punch-drunk by the administration, to continue to say apologetically: "Oh, the President is all right. He didn't do this to me—it was those pesky lieutenants of his; they're the rats responsible for it all!"

Do you suppose for a minute that if the President of the United States and Commander-in-Chief of all its armed forces didn't either direct, or sympathize with his lieutenants' actions, there would be allowed to continue?

John W. McCulloch

The following is the radio address given Wed. eve over KRNR in behalf of Mr. McCulloch's candidacy:

RADIO ADDRESS
Voters of the State of Oregon: This is R. R. Masterson speaking in behalf of John W. McCulloch, candidate for Judge of the Supreme Court of the State of Oregon, Position No. 2. This position has been held by Henry J. Bean for five terms, and he is now a candidate for a sixth term.

Believing that Judge Bean has arrived at such an age that he should now retire, Mr. McCulloch has become a candidate against him.

By reason of the fact that some newspapers and organizations are recommending that the present incumbent be re-elected for another six years. I am forced to tell you something that these supporters will not tell you, but are attempting to conceal from you. That is, that Judge Bean is now 84 years of age. If he is re-elected, he will be 85 years old before he begins his term, and will be 91 years of age before the end of his term.

It is for you to say, after considering these facts, whether or not the present incumbent should be re-elected for another six years. Having announced his candidacy, I believe you are entitled to know Mr. McCulloch's qualifications, and this information I am pleased to give you. He has practiced law in Oregon for forty years, during which time he has had extensive experience in every branch of the law. He has served in the Oregon Legislature as a member from Marion County. For eight years Mr. McCulloch was District Attorney for Grant, Harney and Malheur Counties.

He was Chief Assistant under United States Attorney George Neuner. When Carl C. Donaghy became United States Attorney, he retained Mr. McCulloch as his Chief Assistant until 1934, when Attorney General Homer S. Cummings appointed Mr. McCulloch as Special Assistant to the Attorney General of the United States. This appointment ceased May 9th of this year.

During the four years he was Assistant to the Attorney General of the United States, he was assigned to the legal work of the Bonneville Project. I am very proud to tell you that this work has been completed in a very satisfactory manner to the Government and to all concerned.

In handling this work, among other things, he wrote more than five hundred legal opinions—based upon which the Government has paid out millions of dollars.

The Government of the United States, under a Republican Administration, and also under a Democratic Administration, has had great confidence in Mr. McCulloch and in his honesty, legal ability, and good judgment. The work done by Mr. McCulloch, and the confidence imposed in him, are worthy of your consideration when you select a successor to Judge Bean.
