

ALIEN INFLUENCES IN SCHOOLS RAPPED

Destruction of Democracy Aim of Some Teachers, Convention Told.

SALT LAKE CITY, May 18 — (AP) — Into the staid congress of parents and teachers an elderly statesman and church leader hurled today a charge that subversive influences were seeking to use the schools to destroy democracy.

Employed as a screen for the attempted undermining of democratic principles, said J. Reuben Clark Jr., former ambassador to Mexico, are the democratic liberties—freedom of speech and thought.

"Some of our schools and colleges, both state and privately endowed, and including among them some of those of widest reputation," he asserted, "are become hotbeds for the propagation of un-American theories of government and for the ridicule and undermining of our constitution."

"We must be on our constant guard lest we be destroyed by those who, cloaking themselves in the immunities which this nation's blessing give them and wearing the disguise of a deep anxiety for our welfare, plot to set up over us non-Christian and pagan forms of society and government after the pattern that now threatens the very life of Europe."

"When existence is threatened—whether it be our civic, political, moral, physical or spiritual existence—we may not wisely be over-sensitive about the criticism and whispering of those who seek our destruction."

Clark is first counselor in the first presidency of the Latter Day Saints church.

Parents Lose Control

Clark, warning that "the teacher may not take the place of the parent," complained that parents had too little to say in regard to modern teaching methods.

"We parents," he said, "have not only lost all control as to what our own flesh and blood are taught and to be taught, but further, we are not even consulted about these matters. Surely we who pay the costs and furnish the students might have some voice in what they whom we pay shall teach to those students."

Denying, in his prepared address, that he was treading upon the rights of free speech and free thought, the churchman continued:

License Abuse Scored

"I insist that he (the teacher) shall have all the personal freedom he can carry. But I am not willing to extend that full freedom into a gross license and then pay him to abuse that license to distort and debase the minds and hearts and bodies of those who belong to me."

"In my view no single principle of our governmental system is wiser than that which forbids the teaching of religious dogma and cult in our public schools. But the control of the teaching of any alien political or moral creed is no more an infringement upon academic freedom than is the control over religious teaching."

"As to the teaching of religion in schools, there is to that rule a corollary, too often overlooked, that no anti-religion dogmas or beliefs or theories should be taught in the schools either. He who abuses this principle has no place teaching our youth."

**RAIL LOANS AWAIT
WAGE SLASH PROBE**

WASHINGTON, May 18 — (AP) — The senate banking committee decided today to hear representatives of labor, who have objected to proposed 15 per cent wage cuts, as well as representatives of railroads, before acting finally on a bill to liberalize the terms of RFC railroad loans.

Chairman Wagner (D-NY) said statements by several senators that they would oppose the legislation if the railroads persisted in cutting pay were discussed by the committee.

MILK CONTROL ACT OF OREGON UPHELD

SALEM, May 18 — (AP)—Circuit Judge Leavelle Monday upheld constitutionality of the legislative act creating the milk control board and validity of an order under the act which had been attacked in the case of W. E. Savage and Bruce Fox against Governor Martin and others including members of the milk control board named as E. W. Smith, Glen Marsh and A. E. Engbreton. While Savage and Fox were specifically named as plaintiffs the suit affected 21 producer-distributors of milk in the Salem milk shed, claimed by plaintiffs to represent approximately 40 per cent of the production in this area.

Attack on the order was because of payments required under the order into a pool to equalize and stabilize prices to the producer. The order of the board was attacked on the grounds that the pooling provisions of the milk control board statute are in violation of the privileges and immunities clause of the federal constitution, that it takes property of the plaintiffs without due process of law and that the statute unlawfully delegated legislative functions to the control board.

Some of these questions had come up in a preceding case of the milk control board against L. R. Oldenburg decided by Judge Leavelle in the same court, the board requiring Oldenburg to take

out a license and follow provisions of the law. Judge Leavelle upheld the powers of the board in that case and in the present decision says that he has had no reason to change his decision and states that in regard to the contention of unlawful delegation of powers to the control board he had passed on the question in the Oldenburg case.

Misunderstanding

LUCKY LAGER
THE ORIGINAL
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LAND DIVISION PLAN IS EXTENDED

WASHINGTON, May 18 — (AP) — The agriculture department today allocated \$84,313 for the acquisition of additional area for four land utilization projects in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

The authorizations included \$33,476 for the central Oregon project in Jefferson county and \$10,000 for the western Oregon project in Tillamook, Lane, Lincoln and Yamhill counties, Oregon.

All four are part of the \$10,000,000 national program for the diversion of submarginal crop land to other uses. In the Pacific northwest areas damaged by timbercutting, over-grazing and erosion also are being acquired for development.

The department estimated the additional funds would permit the purchase of between 7,000 and 8,000 acres more for the central Oregon and between 1,000 and 1,500 acres for the western Oregon; 2,000 acres for the Washington and between 3,500 and 4,000 acres for the Idaho projects.

POLICE REPORT ON LAW VIOLATORS

SALEM, May 18 — (AP)—State police arrested 666 persons and warned 7,745 others during April for violating motor vehicle laws, fines and sentences totaling \$5,743 and 1,888 days.

The department's general law enforcement duties, including crimes against person and property, saw the arrest of 214 persons, who were fined \$832 and sentenced to a total of 93 years.

The 161 persons arrested for game code violations paid \$2,566 in fines and were sentenced to a total of three years.
