

BLUE, GRAY TO GET EQUAL TREATMENT

Mason-Dixon Line Taboo
at Gettysburg Reunion
This Summer.

GETTYSBURG, Pa., May 18 — (AP)—There will be no "Mason and Dixon line" to divide the Blues and Grays at their final reunion on the battlefield of Gettysburg.

"There will be no embarrassing moments for any veteran," proclaimed Chairman John S. Rice of the anniversary commission today.

"Our sole objective is peace and harmony within the United States. There shall never again be a Mason and Dixon line."

Rice explained his statement was prompted by queries from several hundreds of veterans—northern and southern—about "equalization and treatment of veterans."

Approximately 2,500 veterans are expected to attend the 75th anniversary of the Civil War battle, June 29 to July 4.

A bill authorizing appropriation of money for expenses of the celebration was signed yesterday by President Roosevelt.

Dr. Overton H. Mennet of Los Angeles, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, and General James M. Claypool of St. Louis, commander-in-chief of the United Confederate Veterans, have both accepted the "last round-up call."

Arrangements are being made for them to speak over a nation-wide hookup.

While the campfires for the veterans neared completion, federal officials assigned to aid Pennsylvania in the observance dispatched more than 8,000 invitations to Blue and Gray survivors throughout the nation.

Traveling expenses and food and lodging costs during the week's encampment will be paid by the government.

Approximately 600 state police and 500 national guardsmen have been detailed to duty at the historic battle site during the celebration.

DRIVING OREGON HIGHWAYS

What precautions should I take when changing a tire?

Perhaps changing a tire seems remote from any considerations of safety, but this is not the case. Many a hand has been crushed, many an arm broken and occasionally a life has been lost because an automobile was improperly jacked up and blocked.

Make sure first that your jack is firmly seated on a solid base, that the upper cradle is fitted against an axle or other solid member, and that the jack will hold vertically. Make sure also that the brakes are set and the wheels blocked, if necessary, so that the car cannot move in either direction.

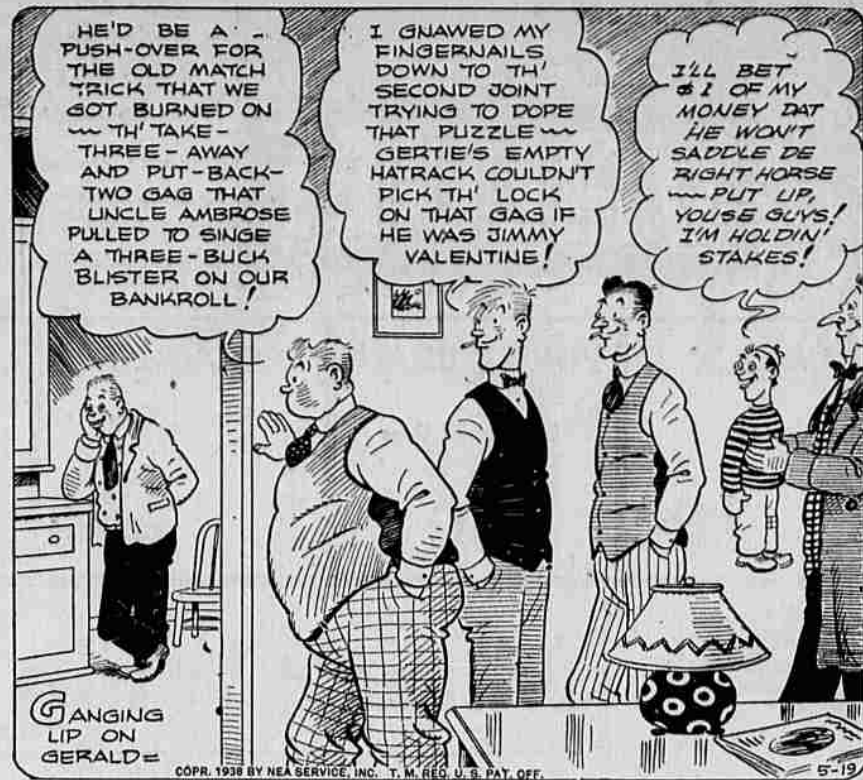
Avoid crawling under the car while it is supported by nothing but the jack and avoid placing your hands under the wheel you are removing. In this way you can save yourself possible injury or death.

Is it lawful for two drivers to see who can drive over a given stretch of road faster?

This is strictly illegal. The state law not only forbids contests of speed on public streets and highways, but also forbids the publication or advertising of speed attained or time consumed for a given distance over the highway, where such speed would be a violation of other provisions of the law.
