**Tennessee Utility VOTES TO SELL OUT**  
NEW YORK, May 20.—(AP)—Directors of National Power & Light Co., affiliated with Electric Bond & Share Co., voted yesterday to recommend to stockholders acceptance of the proposal of the city of Knoxville and T. V. A. for purchase of the electric properties of the Tennessee Public Service Co., a subsidiary at a price of \$7,900,000. The decision of the directors followed the action of the city of Knoxville and the T. V. A. in increasing by \$400,000 their original offer price for the property.

**KNOXVILLE, Tenn., May 19.—**(AP)—Mayor Walter M. Myratt said Knoxville would agree to the \$7,900,000 figure proposed in New York today for the city's purchase of Tennessee Public Service Co. Myratt said the figure also was satisfactory to David Lillenthal, TVA director who has aided in the negotiations. "So far as I know," Myratt said, "the deal will go through if the board accepts the figure."

Six of those indicted were arrested by federal bureau of investigation agents at Hot Springs early today. The seventh, a woman, was arrested by FBI agents at St. Louis.

ALBANY, Ore., May 19.—(AP)—The Willamette valley chapter of the American Legion, composed of 12 posts, requested in a resolution yesterday that President Roosevelt dismiss Madame Frances Perkins as secretary of labor. The secretary's attitude toward unions was criticized in the resolution, which alleged the appointment of legislation, discriminatory against American citizens.

**CANYON CITY FIRE COURAGE REWARDED**  
SAN FRANCISCO, May 19.—(AP)—Devotion to duty in the face of a sweeping fire at Canyon City, Ore., a year ago won bronze gall medals for two Canyon City employees of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company today. The company's award committee announced Hilda Valade, operator, and Sanders L. Overstreet, manager, would receive honors commemorating ideals promulgated by Theodore N. Vail as Bell system chief. Mrs. Valade was credited with calling aid from other towns, with reducing hazards to life by carrying medicine to the fire, and with staying at her post until the flames broke through the windows of her office.

**SALMON ASCEND AT BONNEVILLE**  
WASHINGTON, May 19.—(AP)—Secretary Roper said today that the Bonneville dam fish ladders have proven a "complete success" in enabling the Columbia river salmon to reach the 78-foot high dam on their way upriver to spawning grounds. "Chinooks were finding the ladder entrances readily and ascending at the rate of 100 an hour on the first day of operation of the counting station," Roper said. "Fishery biologists who are observing conditions at Bonneville report that there is not the slightest indication of congestion or delay below the dam." The ladders are composed of 15

## BABY'S REMAINING EYE MAY BE SAVED

**CHICAGO, May 19.—(AP)—**Daily X-ray treatments were prescribed today for Baby Helaine Coonan in an effort to save her remaining eye. The baby was taken to her parents' home last night from the hospital where she was born seven weeks ago. Her left eye was removed May 9 because of glaucoma, a cancerous growth, threatened to spread along the optic nerve to the brain and cause death. Medical experts said X-ray treatments might preserve the impaired vision in the right eye. A spokesman for the parents, Dr. and Mrs. Herman Coonan, said they would sanction the removal of the eye if the child's life depended upon such a course.
