The last social affair of the club year for the Business and Professional Woman's club will be held at the Riverside grange hall Monday evening, May 23rd.

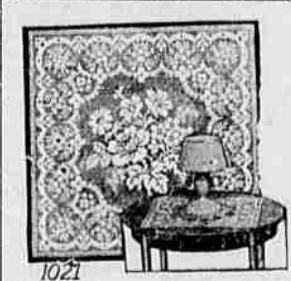

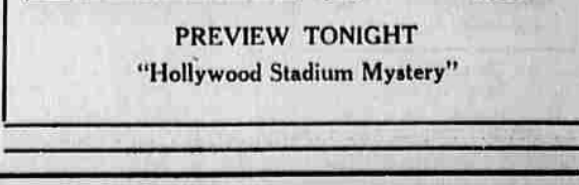
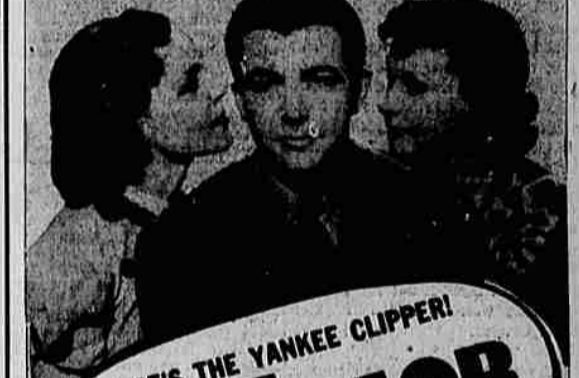
