TWO SHIP COLLIDE OFF SAN PEDRO

SAN PEDRO, Calif., May 24 (AP)—The collision of two freighters outside the harbor breakwater, with damage estimated at \$105,000, was blamed today on fog and misunderstood signals. A gaping 30-foot hole was torn in the Mitsui company's Arimasan Maru when she was rammed by the Walter A. Luckenbach last night.

The new 500-foot steel liner, bound for Yokohama, limped to an outer harbor berth, although one hold was ripped open from the bulwark to below the water line. Damage of \$100,000 was reported. Four stem plates of the Luckenbach freighter were stove in with damage of about \$5000. No injuries were reported on either ship.

WHITE HOUSE MAIL PILFERING CHARGED

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—William Buckley, a file clerk in the white house mail room, was arrested today on a charge of stealing \$3 from a white house letter. District Attorney Pine said Buckley was caught in the act of taking three dollar bills out of an envelope and that the investigation was proceeding further. The case, a charge of petty larceny, was set for trial tomorrow.

Official placings of the Hoards' dairyman cow judging contest have been received by the county club agent and a committee will score all the placings as submitted by the Douglas county 4-H livestock club members.

The Douglas National bank is sponsoring this as a county-wide contest and is awarding a summer school scholarship to the winner. Placings are as follows: Jersey A B C D, Holstein B C D A, Ayre-shire A C B D, Guernsey A B C D, and Brown Swiss A C D.

All the plantings of hybrid corn made by 4-H club members are now up. The germination of the seed has been exceptionally fine and thinning will have to be done in order to have the same number of stalks per hill, as in the open pollination varieties.

These tests are under the auspices of the U. S. National bank, Roseburg branch, which institution is sponsoring the 4-H corn growing program, in Douglas county this year. This program will be climaxed with a corn show in the lobby of the bank again this year.
