Wildlife Preservation Depends Largely On Cooperation From Nation's Farmers

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 26.—What the farmer does this summer will have an important effect on next season's supply of game birds and animals.

The future of many of the smaller species of wildlife depends upon the measure of cooperation extended by those who till and manage the soil, according to The American Wildlife Institute.

Pointing out that the farmer may profit by considering wildlife as a crop, just as oats, wheat or corn, the institute quotes Jay N. Darling, the noted wildlife authority. Darling states: "The conservationist will encourage game management and the hunter will pay for it and besides it is sensible practice for the farmer. It is in effect simply good land management by means of which a game crop is added to the crops already produced on the farm."

The unnecessary burning of swales and marshes every spring is a great hindrance to the development of wildlife, according to the institute. Such swales and marshes are not fit for raising crops, make excellent nesting places for birds, which destroy harmful insects. The department of agriculture estimates the value of insect-eating birds to the country's farmers at \$350,000,000 a year.

Some Hawks Useful
Farmers are urged not to shoot all hawks. The red-tail, for instance, is very helpful in insect and rodent control. More than half the diet of a red-tail is rats and mice, and more than 10 per cent of the food of this particular species is insects. He takes very few rabbits, birds or poultry, and on the whole does the farmer much more good alive than dead. The little blue darters, sharp shins, Cooper's hawks and Goshawks are the ones that do the damage, says the institute. They fly fast and low along hedges and such and are more difficult to shoot than the helpful varieties, which usually soar high in the air.

Leave Unplowed Strips
The leaving of unplowed strips of ground near fences is urged to provide food and cover for birds. A strip around all four sides of a field is considered ideal as this allows the birds to move about under cover to all portions of the cultivated plot.

In fields already "plowed clean" the institute urges that no planting be done near the fences, to allow native vegetation to come up for cover and food for the birds.

Scientists at the nine cooperative wildlife research, demonstration and management units sponsored by The American Wildlife Institute have studied the problem of food and cover very carefully. They have learned that if enough natural food and cover is left for the birds they will be able to fight their own battles against natural enemies.
