BOSTON, May 27.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "Interest in wool continues at low ebb and prices are slightly softer. In the west, more or less of a stalemate exists, with buying small and scattered, at prices barely steady."

"Foreign markets are a bit easy, also. The East India sales are down about 5 per cent over last sales. European markets are dull and heavy. Australia alone keeps firm, on fine wools."

"In the piecegoods market little inquiry is reported, although top-makers report fair shipping instructions against orders placed a month or more ago."

"Mohair is rather slow and about steady."

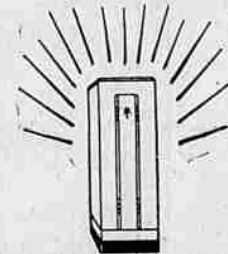
