GRASSES TESTED IN COUNTY NURSERIES

Best Results Are Shown on Farm of George Hall Near Oakland.

Investigational work to determine the best and most adaptable grasses for the improvement of pasture and range lands in the county is being continued with the establishment of a grass nursery on the farm of George Hall of Oakland. In establishing grass nurseries in various sections of the county, fall seeding has been a common practice, according to County Agent J. Roland Parker. The nursery of the George Hall farm was planted on May 16 in order to determine the spring planting was advisable on land which could be plowed and good seed A... available. The soil upon which the nursery was planted has a tendency to be moist until late spring. Seeding included tall fescue, superior canary, chewing fescue, tall oat, meadow fescue, orchard grass, Astoria bent, Seaside bent, and red top. Red clover and Alsike clover were also seeded in certain sections of the nursery with the grass to determine if grass seeded with legumes proved superior in straight seedings of grass. The grasses in the George Hall nursery have shown the most promise of all the different grasses seeded in other nurseries, including the grass nurseries of C. D. Glenn, Glide; Clyde Beckley farm, Elkton; A. C. Marsters, Roseburg, and E. L. Thompson ranch, Umpqua. Field day will be held early in June for farmers and livestock men to observe the various grasses growing in the nurseries.

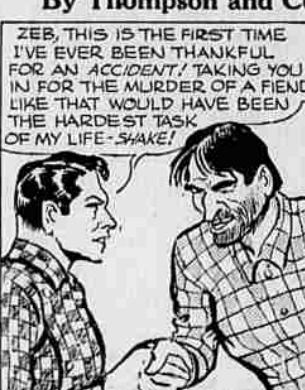
