TWO MORE "GOONS" GET JAIL TERMS

PORTLAND, June 2.—(AP)—Ernest Kell and Orville Hart, former AFL, teamster union members, were sentenced yesterday by circuit court to terms of nine months in the county jail on pleas of guilty to assault and battery.

Arrested in the winter roundup of alleged labor terrorists, Kell and Hart were accused of beating up two drivers. Kell was charged with assaulting the driver of an automobile company involved in a labor dispute while Hart was accused of beating a driver for a dry cleaning shop which was subsequently bombed.

They were the 34th and 35th men to be sentenced in the terrorism drive.

RAILWAYS' PLIGHT STRESSED BY BUDD

PORTLAND, June 2.—(AP)—More trying times than the depression of 1932 and 1933 confront American railroads and it is a question if they can "weather the storm," Ralph H. Budd, president of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy line, said in an interview here last night.

He said the railroads would run despite their difficulties but "perhaps under governmental control." The executive asserted costs had increased so rapidly there was no profit in operation. He predicted there would be no boost in earnings until a readjustment in rates or relief from payroll and tax expenditures.

Of federal control he said "the government would have to raise rates, cut wages or pay a big deficit out of taxes."

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FAMOUS DESIGNER OF YACHTS PASSES

PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 2.—(AP)—Captain Nathaniel Greene Herreshoff, 90, known in the yachting world as "The Wizard of Bristol" for his designing and building of America's cup defenders, died today at his Bristol home.

"Nat" Herreshoff, one of seven brothers, three of whom were blinded in youth, designed and built every America's cup defender from 1893 to 1920. The firm also built the defenders of 1930 and 1934, Enterprise and Rainbow, although the designing was done by W. Starling Burgess.

His blind brother, John, was the "hands" of the firm, and Nat was the "eyes." They worked together for years, and gave the world not only fin-keeled racing boats and other revolutionary designs in sail, but they developed a coil boiler in connection with a marine engine that turned up unprecedented horsepower.
