

HUTCHINSON HANDS BLANK TO PORTLAND

18-Year-Old Star Hurler
of Seattle Also Bats
Four for Four.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 2.—(AP)—Cy Slapnicka, general manager of the American League Cleveland Indians, realized today that the Indians' young Bob Feller has some juvenile competition in the Pacific coast league worthy of attention. Slapnicka sat in the stands at Portland last night and watched 18-year-old Freddie Hutchinson, Seattle's hurling marvel, put handcuffs on the Portland Beavers and shut them out 6 to 0 for his eighth win of the season. He has lost three games.

Young Freddie, who received a \$3,000 bonus to sign with Seattle after turning down a big league offer "because the terms weren't right," did other things besides limit the Beavers to four hits and strike out nine. He had a perfect night at the plate. He got four for four, including a two-bagger. He scored two runs, drove in another and galloped from first to third on a hit-and-run play.

Player Steals Home.
Two hits and two San Diego errors in the eighth inning gave the league leading Sacramento Solons a 4 to 1 win. The Padres made their only run when Shortstop Griffith stole home while Oregon, the Solons' shortstop, wiped off the ball.

Back from three weeks on the road, second place San Francisco Seals ganged up on an old teammate, Lillard, last night, for eleven hits to beat Los Angeles 8 to 5. Bullou, veteran Seals' relief hurler, stepped into the breach in the ninth inning when the Angels got Foster for two hits and three runs. Until the ninth Frazier had limited Los Angeles to four hits.

Two hits, one of them with the bases loaded, and a pair of walks gave the Hollywood Stars a 4 to 3 win over the Oakland Aces. The spurge gave the Stars all their runs.
