## M'CARTHY APPEAL HEARING DEFERRED

SALEM, June 3.—(AP)—The state supreme court probably will not hear the appeal of Leroy Herschel McCarthy from a first degree murder until next fall, supreme court attaches said today. McCarthy was to have died last January 7 in the state's new lethal gas chamber. He was convicted of killing a Portland service station operator after a holdup. McCarthy filed his appeal with the high court May 21. The law sets July 10 as the deadline for filing of all briefs, but there is a little likelihood that the case could be heard before the court convenes in mid-July until September. Extensions of time which might be granted by the court could extend the deadline for briefs into August. McCarthy now is in the state penitentiary here. The gas chamber which replaced the gallows, was approved by the 1937 legislature. It was installed early this year and has never been used. McCarthy is the only person in the state under a death sentence.

## 4 NEARLY PERISH IN COLUMBIA RIVER

PORTLAND, June 3.—(AP)—The swollen Columbia river nearly claimed the lives of four men near Astoria last night. The muddy current, with debris for the bridge, caused a salibot and hurtled an outboard motor against the abutment of a railroad bridge. Two men and a third man sighted. Henry Johnson of Portland clinging to the edge of an overturned flat-bottom boat. The rescuers, towing the disabled craft with the motor bucking the current, were carried against the bridge. A. L. Kunz of Portland hauled two of the victims into his speedboat and removed Johnson from the flat-bottom. Kunz had difficulty in reaching his boat against the abutment to take off the fourth man.

## CULINARY STRIKE IN PORTLAND AVERTED

PORTLAND, June 3.—(AP)—Three thousand culinary workers, who were to have taken a strike vote today, cancelled plans when the Associated Restaurants of Portland, Inc., agreed last night to arbitrate differences with union employees. The association, representing larger restaurants, had sought to return wages to 1935 levels, despite a setting business was poor. The cut would have amounted to approximately 20 per cent and workers would have been returned to

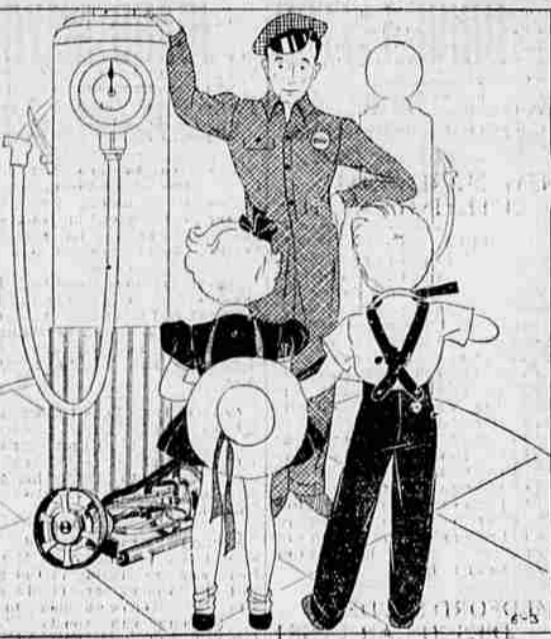

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## OREGON NOW HAS PRICE CUTTING BAN

### Sale of Any Food Article Below Cost, Including Overhead, Illegal.

SALEM, June 3.—(AP)—The 1937 legislature's bill to end price discrimination in the food industry has been in effect two weeks, but Mrs. Oregon Housewife, who probably hasn't even heard of the law, has not yet felt the effects of it. State officials are in doubt as to how far-reaching the law will be, but they agree that it will force prices upward, its main blow to be struck at chain stores.

The principal point of the law is a provision that wholesalers and retailers cannot sell any article below cost, included in the cost of a article are all expenses, including overhead.

This would prevent the sale of "loss leaders," articles sold at less than cost to attract people to stores to buy other articles.

This does not apply to retailers or wholesalers closing out their stocks in good faith, to retailers who sell below cost to meet legal competition, or to sale of damaged goods.

Everybody Affected.

The terms of the law are general, the act applying to all persons doing business in food commerce. This would imply that every person from the first producer to the consumer would be affected.

A wholesaler must have the same prices for all his customers. For instance, a wholesaler cannot sell 10 boxes of candy to one store for \$10 and to another for \$9. But he can give discounts for buying in quantity.

The person who is injured must bring proceedings. If a retailer is injured by unfair competition of another retailer, the first seeks a court order enjoining the second retailer from violating the law. If the injunction is granted, the first retailer would get three times the amount he was damaged plus the
