

SCHOOLBOY ROWE SHIFTED TO MINORS

Pitcher's Failure in Come-Back Try Hurts Tigers' Pennant Chances.

They said so long to Schoolboy Rowe today. The Detroit Tigers sent him back to Beaumont from where he skyrocketed to the top in 1933. They hope the warm, sunny climate of the southwest may restore life and zip to the salary whelp.

And in Rowe you have, largely, the picture of the disappearing chances of Mickey Cochrane and his Detroit dynamite in this year's American league war. If the Schoolboy had come back there's no telling what might have happened. With Vernon Kennedy and Rowe, Mickey might have gone places.

But with Kennedy alone — and there isn't another top flight, grade-A flinger on the staff — it's strictly a long shot. That was the fault yesterday. The Tigers had shown their first consistent winning effort of the season when they headed east with their first stop Yankee stadium, where pitching the No. 1 need of every visiting outfit. With Kennedy up, they finished in front in the series opener Wednesday.

Others Fail to Deliver
But yesterday Mickey sent Poffenberger and Auker to the post and neither had it. The Yankees won both ends of a doubleheader, 5-4, with Chandler turning in a six-hit effort and Rolfe whacking a homer, and 5-2 with Pearson hurling his best game of the season, a five-hitter, and Henrich and Knickerbocker supplying the home-run production.

That left the Tigers with a less-than-500 average for the season again, and boosted the Yankees to within 2½ games of the American league leading Cleveland Indians. The Tribe outlasted the Athletics in a battle of home runs in Philadelphia and posted a 10-5 victory.

Idle Giants Gain
The pace-setting Giants in the National league were rained out in Pittsburgh, but picked up half a game anyway as the second-place Chicago Cubs took a dose of Boston's pitching magic and lost a 6-2 affair to the Bees. Lanning, relieving Shoffner in the second inning, hurled shutout ball the rest of the way.

Homers by Ernie Koy and Cookie Lavagetto featured an 11-4 win for Brooklyn over the Cincinnati Reds. Ducky Medwick collected four hits, three of them doubles, to pace the Cardinals to a 12-5 victory over the Phillies.

Leonard pitched a six-hitter as the Senators swamped the Chicago White Sox, 7-1, and Nagby duplicated that effort in hurling the Red Sox to a 6-1 win over the St. Louis Browns.

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SALVO'S WINNING STREAK SNAPPED

Sacto Bats Defeat Strike- Out Leader; Portland Drops Two Games.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 3.—(AP)—Salvo, San Diego's ace pitcher, got at least a little satisfaction out of losing to the Pacific coast baseball league leading Sacramento Solons.

The Senators snapped Salvo's winning streak at night games by beating him 6 to 3 last night, but in losing Salvo struck out six Solons and became the circuit's leading strikeout pitcher. He has fanned 70 since the season started, four more than his nearest competitor, Lillard, Los Angeles' reformed third baseman. Altogether this season Salvo has won nine games and lost 3.

After an impressive start, in which he fanned five in the first two innings, Salvo weakened and was replaced in the sixth after the Solons had nicked him for four runs. The Solons got the rest of their talies off Chaplin.

Beavers Drop Two

Seattle changed places with the Portland Beavers in the standings by beating them twice, 6 to 3 and 5 to 0. Seattle is now in fourth place and Portland fifth. Powerful hitting by Seattle was too much for the Beavers. In the first game they nicked three Portland pitchers for 13 hits and in the second got nine hits while Gregory limited Portland to two.

A walk and a fly to the outfield gave Los Angeles a 7 to 6 decision over the San Francisco Seals in eleven innings. The Seals outlasted the Angels, 17 to 12, but the Angels made their hits pay off.

The effort of Jack Lindell, pitcher turned right fielder for a night, in knocking a home run with two aboard in the ninth inning wasn't good enough and the dismal Oakland A's lost their third straight to the Hollywood Stars, 9 to 4.

Lindell was sent into the outfield after umpire Falls banished Rightfielder Ted Corbett and the Oaks' Manager Dutch Zwilling for taking too much time in beefing over a third called strike.
