SWIFT AND CO. HIT BY FEDERAL ORDER

WASHINGTON, June 3.—(AP)—Secretary Wallace today ordered Swift and company, Chicago packing concern, to cease using credit, discount and weight practices which Wallace ruled were discriminatory in the sale of its products.

The order was issued on the basis of extended hearings on a complaint that the company had employed "unfair, unjustly discriminatory and deceptive practices" in selling its products in New England states, New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.
