NEW DEAL AT ISSUE IN IOWA PRIMARY VOTE

Senator Gillette, Foe of Court Bill, Opposed by Wearin, Blessed by Administration.

(By the Associated Press.)
Unqualified support of Roosevelt policies was a major issue in Iowa's democratic senatorial primary today.
Senator Guy Gillette contended administration forces had marked him for defeat because he opposed the president's court bill. In his final appeal for renomination he declared he would not be a "rubber stamp member of congress."
Representative Otto Wearin, his principal challenger, claimed administration backing because of his endorsement by WPA Administrator Harry Hopkins and James Roosevelt's reference to him as "my friend."
"The fate of the new deal is in the hands of the people of Iowa," Wearin said.
Light Vote Cast
Only a comparatively light vote had been cast at noon today in the election despite the last-minute rapid fire campaign contest for the democratic senatorial nomination.
Twenty of 22 representative cities and counties throughout the state reported exceptionally light voting up to midday.

Replenishment of Douglas Streams With Abundance of Fish Assured by Expansion of Rock Creek Hatchery

Propagative Capacity Increased Fivefold Since 1935, and Further Improvements Are Under Way; Utah Rainbow Trout Added to Caretaking Program; 550,000 Steelheads to Be Released in Fall.

If scientific and efficient methods of fish propagation can improve the wild life resources of a stream, the rivers and creeks of Douglas county should within a few years show marked replenishment as a result of recent expansion of the game commission's trout hatchery at Rock Creek.
Since 1935 the Rock Creek hatchery has been increased from a capacity of less than a half million to provisions for two and a half million fish.
Connected with the enlargement of the hatchery is the introduction of many features to make the plant one of the most efficient in the state, embodying many unique ideas which are attracting wide attention.
The hatchery, now fourth in size in the state, is the only one of its kind in which all handling of fish is eliminated, except once a year, when the brood fish are stripped of their eggs. In this manner losses from bruising are practically eliminated. Facilities also are arranged so that each hatching, feeding and brood pond has its own water supply and may be closed off and treated separately in cases of disease.
Fish Easily Trapped
Another unique feature is the fish trap, in which brood fish are

WAGE-HOUR COMPROMISE SEEMS NEAR

Proposal to Create Boards For Each Industry to Fix Pay Standards Meets Favor.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(AP)—Senate members of a congressional committee drafting a compromise wage-hour bill said today they had about agreed to support a proposal for individual wage standard boards within each industry.
Two members coming out of a separate session of the senate conference said sentiment indicated acceptance of a plan proposed by Senator Thomas (D., Utah), chairman of the senate labor committee.
House conferees, meeting separately, were considering a somewhat similar proposal.
Chairman Norton (D., N. J.) of the house group expressed the opinion it would accept the Thomas plan if provision were made for a minimum wage of 40 cents an hour by some definite date.
25 Cents as Starter
Under the Thomas proposal a minimum wage of 25 cents an hour would become effective in all interstate industries 120 days after the bill becomes law. One year later, the minimum wage would be advanced to 27 cents an hour. The next year, this minimum would go up to 30 cents.
When this point had been reached, the president would be empowered to appoint boards for industries which contended that further advances in the minimum wage would cause reduced employment. These boards would be composed of representatives of employers,

Carolina Senator Defeats Opponent



RALEIGH, N. C., June 6.—(AP)—Tardy returns liked the majority of Senator Robert R. Reynolds for renomination close to 100,000 today.
Unofficial tabulations from 1,581 of 1,862 precincts in Saturday's democratic primary gave Reynolds 275,402 votes, and his opponent, Rep. Frank W. Hancock, Jr., 181,514.
The nomination is equivalent to election.
Both Reynolds and Hancock ran as New Deal supporters. Hancock criticized Reynolds for traveling a great deal in foreign countries and called him a "playboy," who neglected legislative duties.
Reynolds ignored his opponent in his campaign speeches.

PLANES DEAL DEATH, RUIN TO ALICANTE

Spain's Insurgent Bombers Also Fire British Boat; Flights Over France Bring Warning.

MADRID, June 6.—(AP)—Insurgent warplanes left 21 persons dead, 50 wounded and another British ship ablaze in a fierce today over Alicante, 75 miles south of Valencia on the eastern Mediterranean coast.
The dead included three British members of the crew of the British freighter St. Winifred, which was damaged in an earlier bombing of Alicante May 21. Others killed were nine women, a child and two Alicante stevedores.
After setting the St. Winifred afire, the planes bombed sections of the city near the harbor and 12 buildings were wrecked.
German Planes Used
This and other new raids along the coast followed a week in which more than 400 persons died in aerial bombardments and in which new protests came from neutral nations.
Five German-made Junker planes carried out the assault on Alicante. Several houses in the center of the city were shattered. The bodies of the nine women and the child were taken from those ruins.
Only Saturday the British tanker Maryad was bombed near Alicante by a seaplane and a government communiqué from Barcelona said four of the crew were killed.
Other Places Bombed
Valencia, former provisional capital of the government, suburban towns and Sagunto, another port to its north, also were bombed today.
The raiders attacked Valencia's waterfront sector, killing an entire

Rebels in Discord Over Alien Heads; Firing Squad Busy

GIBRALTAR, June 6.—(AP)—Week-end executions and hurried burials at La Linea, just north of Gibraltar, and strict military vigilance throughout southern insurgent Spain were reported today by travelers reaching Gibraltar.
Townsmen said executions took place over the weekend but they were unable, or afraid to say, how many went before the firing squad.
The hurried burials were taken as confirmation of guarded stories of stringent repressive measures following an outbreak of Spanish insurgent sentiment against Italian and German officers in Generalissimo Franco's service.
It was reported Saturday that thousands of leaflets inscribed, "Down with fascism" and "Long live the republic!" had been scattered in La Linea and slogans in similar vein scrawled in charcoal on walls.

MORE THAN 100 BOMBS FALL IN CITY

Destruction Dealt to 1,000 Buildings; Invading Land Army Hammers at Key to Hankow.

CANTON, China, June 6.—(AP)—Japanese warplanes rained bombs on this terrorized city in two punishing raids today and Chinese officials estimated the toll of dead or wounded at 1,500.
Over 100 bombs were dropped in two raids, at 8:30 and 10:30 a. m., and according to official estimates at least 1,000 buildings were destroyed.
One bomb scored a direct hit on the French-owned Doumer hospital, killing two Chinese patients and wounding a French surgeon and many Chinese. One side of the building was blown out. (The French ambassador at Tokyo protested the bombing.)
The new raids lifted the 8,000 authoritative estimates of dead and wounded since May 28, when Japan began a crushing series of raids on this South China metropolis, through which a large part of China's war supplies from abroad enter. It was the tenth successive day Canton or its environs had been bombed.

DRIVE DEDICATION LARGELY ATTENDED

Patriotic Program Held at Memorial of Trees on Garden Valley Road.

An impressive ceremony marked the dedication Sunday of Memorial drive, a tribute to deceased veterans completed under sponsorship of the auxiliary to Upsilon chapter of the American Legion. The program was attended by a large audience, representing patriotic, civic and fraternal organizations of the city, as well as hundreds of interested individuals.
A long procession proceeded from the armory to the entrance to the drive, which is located along the Garden Valley road from the Pacific highway to the veterans facility, and there joined uniformed groups which had taken positions in advance.
Among the uniformed bodies were the Roseburg Municipal band, Umpqua post drum corps; Junior drum corps, national guard, reserve officers, Eagles drill team and others.
The dedicatory program was introduced by "The Star Spangled Banner," played by the band; invocation by Rev. S. Raynor Smith, and a brief history of Memorial drive by Harris Ellsworth.

VOLCANIC ERUPTION ROUTS FILIPINOS

MANILA, June 6.—(AP)—The Mayon volcano rumbled like thunder today, sending sheets of flame and smoke spouting from its crater and terrorizing the people of Albay province as ash began falling throughout the region.
The volcano, 200 miles southeast of Manila, continued to throw rocks skyward which began Friday night. Rivers of lava poured down the mountain's sheer sides.
People of nearby towns are fleeing, seeking places of safety, the crater was active every three hours.
In 1814 an eruption of the volcano buried a village, killing 1,200 people. It has erupted a score of times in the past 177 years.

Annual County Lamb-Wool Show Will Be Held in Roseburg June 25

The seventh Douglas county Fat Lamb and Wool show will be held in Roseburg Saturday, June 25, according to J. Roland Parker, county agricultural agent. The Douglas County Livestock association is sponsoring the show as a means of encouraging the use of better breeding stock and the marketing of more fat lambs and fewer feeder lambs.
Premiums being offered amount to \$150 for pens of five fat lambs, single fat lambs, open only to 4-H club members, and wool fleeces. Special exhibit pens will be provided for breeders of purebred sheep to exhibit rams and other breeding stock which may be for sale.
Exhibitors interested in showing pens of five fat lambs or fleeces are requested to contact the county agent's office for entry blanks. All entries for the different classes will be closed on Thursday, June 23, to give officials time to prepare a sufficient number of exhibit pens for all entries.
Fat lamb shows are becoming exceedingly popular in Oregon since sheepmen of Douglas county held their first show in 1932. Most counties are now holding fat lamb shows and report a keen interest being shown not only in the show but in practices to market more and better fat lambs.
The site of the show will be at formerly, in the vacant lot at the rear of Wharton Bros. farm implement establishment and portions of the abutting streets.

NORMAN THOMAS ROUTING QUIZZED

NEWARK, N. J., June 6.—(AP)—Essex County Prosecutor William A. Wachenfeld today ordered an investigation by three members of his detective staff of the routing of Social Leader Norman Thomas from mid-city military park Saturday.
He said his inquiry would be independent of that ordered by Newark's public safety director.
Thomas was bombarded with eggs and vegetables, and a wooden platform was smashed from under him as a contingent of about 100 men, led by a band, disrupted the socialist rally.
Jersey City police put Thomas on a New York ferry boat when he tried to speak there several weeks ago.
Thomas was slightly cut, one man was sent to the hospital and four persons were arrested for disorderly conduct in the disturbances which Thomas charged was "obviously instigated from Jersey City with the help of active friendship or incompetency of Newark police."
Mayor Hague commented that "such a charge is, of course, ridiculous. It is merely just another attempt on the part of Norman Thomas to keep his name in the newspapers."
A parade supporting Hague's stand will be held in Jersey City tonight.

BOLT, FIRE KILL 20 AT WEDDING PARTY

MANILA, June 6.—(AP)—More than twenty persons were burned to death today when lightning struck two houses in which a wedding party was in progress in the village of Malabon, La Union province.
Identification of the bodies was difficult, all being badly charred.
One survivor said the flimsily constructed houses were quickly engulfed in flames after the bolt struck. Many celebrators were knocked unconscious by the lightning, but recovered in time to save themselves, though many were injured.
The fate of the bride and bridegroom was undetermined.

CASH KIDNAPING SUSPECTS FREED

PRINCETON, Fla., June 6.—(AP)—M. F. Braxton and his son, James, held by federal agents since last Wednesday in connection with the kidnaping of James Bailey Cash, Jr., were released today.
Both declined to make any statements about the case. As far as was known, no witnesses or suspects were held at the Miami headquarters after their release.
Meanwhile, Cash reopened his filling station and lunchroom for the first time since his five-year-old son was abducted for \$10,000 ransom. He said he had heard nothing new.

EIGHTY OFF FOR SUMMER SCHOOL

Douglas County 4-H Club Group Will Receive 12 Days' Instruction.

Eighty Douglas county boys and girls left this morning for Corvallis, where they will attend the 4-H club summer school for a period of 12 days. Accompanying the group are Mrs. J. A. Rhoads of Days Creek, Miss Dora Braughton of Roseburg, Miss Mary Leigh of Roseburg and Miss Vivian Bartley of Roseburg, who will chaperon the girls, and County Club Agent E. A. Britton, who will be responsible for the boys.
Classes begin tomorrow morning. Boys' groups will be divided into sections according to age. This is also done with the girls' groups. These sections are organized for the length of the summer school. All of the Douglas county girls will be housed in the Alpha Chi Omega sorority house, which will be in charge of Miss Janet Hinkle, whom most of the girls know from last year.
The boys will be living in different halls and fraternity houses scattered over the campus. Aside from three members from Sardinia and Booth, all will go and return by school busses. These busses are of the new type and made entirely of steel. One is being furnished by Jack Pfister and the other by Ray White of Days Creek. Earl Agee of Roseburg is donating the truck for use in taking the baggage. The busses and truck will be locked up in the armory on the campus during summer school. The group will arrive home about noon Friday, June 17.

CYCLIST KILLED IN CRASH WITH AUTO

OREGON CITY, June 6.—(AP)—Franklin Conrow, 17, of Mulino, was fatally injured last night when his motorcycle collided with an automobile operated by William C. Bock, 21, of Portland.
State Officer Richard Seganti said the crash occurred on the Siletz-Molalla highway when the motorcycle swung out to pass another car and struck the Bock auto. The youth's leg was amputated and his skull fractured.
Bock's car careened 100 feet into a field, the officer reported.

NEW TRIAL DENIED TO MRS. LEDFORD

ST. HELENS, June 6.—(AP)—Circuit Judge Zimmerman denied Mrs. Arnes Lefford, convicted of murdering a stepdaughter, a motion for a new trial today.
She will be brought here from the Multnomah county jail at Portland for sentencing.
Mrs. Lefford was indicted separately in connection with the poisoning deaths of two stepdaughters. She was tried on one count.

FIRE DESTROYS TWO TACOMA FACTORIES

TACOMA, June 6.—(AP)—Two Tacoma factories were burned and a trestle bridge damaged Sunday night in a fire that taxed the city's fire-fighting forces and did damage estimated at more than \$200,000.
The flames leveled the Tacoma Sash and Door company plant and spread to the Pioneer Sand and Gravel company and leaked at the approaches of the newly constructed 15th street bridge over main line railroad tracks.
Ashes, sparks and burning material were scattered over a large area in the south end of the city, some of it falling three miles away. Hose lines and fire equipment jammed Pacific avenue, the city's main traffic artery, tying downtown automobile traffic and railroad movements into knots for most of the evening.
One fireman, S. S. Calkins, received painful facial burns, a fire host threw unslacked lime over him from a pile in the sand and gravel company's building.

SISKIYOU ROAD JOB COMPLETION URGED

MEDFORD, June 6.—(AP)—The Southern Oregon Chambers of Commerce association, representing Ashland, Grants Pass, Medford, Canyonville, Gold Hill and Yreka, Calif., met with the Oregon state highway commission during the weekend to urge early completion of the Siskiyou highway route.
In two resolutions they asked that the work be started before July 1, requested that \$320,000 be allotted to SRA to start the work and asked appropriations for a survey of the Pacific highway between Roseburg and Grants Pass.
The highway commission would make no commitment to advance the completion date of the completion date of the Siskiyou work ahead of June 1, 1941, the time approved at its Portland meeting last week.

FOREST FIRE IN CLATSOP IN HAND

One Fighter Killed, 2,000 Acres Swept; Firebug Evidence Found.

ASTORIA, June 6.—(AP)—A slackening wind gave 400 fighters relief today from a raging forest fire which killed one man and destroyed 2,000 acres in the Crosssett Western Lumber company holdings.
Curtailed crews of loggers and CCC workers continued the four-day struggle, extinguishing dwindling flames and standing by in the event of a dreaded east wind. A falling barometer held out promises of cooler weather.
Fire and lumber company officials watched the weather at the Big creek camp, hopeful it might shift the breeze from the northwest to the south and bring rain. Fire wardens, however, said there was a freshening northeast wind and rising humidity.
The Crosssett-Western management estimated the fire had burned more than 4,000,000 board feet of felled and bucked timber in addition to a quantity of cold-decked logs.
The flames gutted one side of Clatsop county's largest operation and killed Hogan Erickson and injured Vernon Hoy Hogan was struck by a cable while attempting to save a donkey engine.
Major fires were belayed under control today. More than 300 men had battled the Big creek blaze since Thursday when it started, wardens helped from a gasoline water pump backfire.
The fire was largely confined to felled timber, later spreading through logging company operations to destroy a quantity of equipment. Fire wardens said danger of further spread will last as long as humidity remains low.

TOWNSEND SAYS NATION MUST SPEND

PORTLAND, June 6.—(AP)—Dr. F. E. Townsend welcomed Mayor Joseph E. Carson before an audience of 2,000 Townsendites, heard the oldsters cheer the mayor when he declared "there is not any way of sharing wealth except through the production of new wealth through the industry of our people."
They appeared to take his remarks as indorsement of the Townsend theory expressed by the doctor a few minutes later.
The doctor amended Carson's statement by saying, "There isn't anything which creates new wealth except the expenditure of money."
He further declared that "saying is the wrong concept. We will have to spend ourselves into prosperity." He told his audience he saw no reason why monthly pensions, under his plan, could not be raised ultimately to \$500 or more.
It was the doctor's second Oregon talk during the week-end. On Saturday he told 5000 listeners at the Lebanon Strawberry festival to be prepared to organize their own party in the general election campaign if they find existing congressional candidates unsympathetic to Townsendism.
He attacked President Roosevelt, saying, "His ears are stuffed with cotton unless he wants to believe in" something he wants to believe in."
