

OUTPUT OF ROCK CREEK HATCHERY TO BE INCREASED

and a contract was let only recently to E. H. Metzger, local contractor, for a large pond for brood fish and the construction of the new flume. The new work, which is now under way, will cost approximately \$5,250 and will bring the cost of improvements made since 1925 to \$31,250.

The new pond is to be approximately 160 by 150 feet and will have depths ranging from 5 to 8 feet. It will have a dirt bottom with a concrete spillway, and will bring the total of holding ponds to eight, covering several acres.

Utah Rainbow Introduced

Propagation of the Utah rainbow is to be one of the major enterprises of the Rock Creek hatchery, according to Dexter Rice, chairman of the state game commission.

For the past 17 years the U. S. bureau of fisheries has been experimenting with this species of fish, which promises to become in the near future one of the principal game fish of the Umpqua river.

The Utah rainbow, so named because the original stock came from that state, is a rainbow trout which through being landlocked for many years has lost its spawning instinct and remains in fresh water. The U. S. bureau of fisheries, through long years of careful selection, has changed the spawning habits of the fish from spring to fall. Instead of spawning in March or April, as was the case with the original stock, the species as now developed spawns in November.

The fish may be kept in hatcheries until a year old and then released as a time when water conditions are at their best for the release of the fry.

30,000 Put Into Umpqua

The Oregon game commission secured a large number of these fish three years ago and released them in the McKenzie, Deschutes, Umpqua and Klamath rivers. Approximately 30,000 were planted in the Umpqua river, and for the past two years fishermen have reported catching these fish. Catches have been made in each month of the year, indicating that they are remaining in the fresh water and not returning to sea.

They have the habits of the ordinary rainbow trout or the steelhead and grow to about the same size, ranging around six and eight pounds.

The fish are three years old before they spawn the first time, so that those first planted in the river spawned last November. Of the 30,000 released in the river some were seen spawning in Rock creek. From the 1,000 brood fish kept at the hatchery, the first eggs were taken in November and December. These brood fish will be spawned each year for four years, and then will be released, making them seven years old at that time. From the eggs hatched this year, it is planned to release 750,000 in the Umpqua river and its tributaries in September. The fry at that time will be from 2 1/2 to 5 inches in length.

Reports Wanted

Fishermen are requested by the game commission to report catches of these fish in order that a record may be kept of their movements. They may be identified by a white steel stripe on each side, and bright red gill covers. Fish caught lately weighed several pounds.

In addition to the Utah rainbows, the hatchery is making preparations to receive 500,000 rainbow eggs from Diamond Lake in the near future. Fry from this hatch will be released in December.

Steelheads to Be Freed

The hatchery also is holding 550,000 steelheads for fall release. The eggs were taken from the fish captured in the hatchery trap. Between 600 and 700 brood fish were caught and 333 females were spawned. In 1936 the hatchery tagged some of the steelhead brood fish, and during the past season found that several had returned. Coast hatcheries have spawned tagged fish three successive years, it is reported.

The Rock creek hatchery is under the supervision of J. M. Vaughn, superintendent, with Robert Hawley as assistant. Additional help is employed during peak periods.

Mr. Vaughn spent two years with the state fish commission at its North Umpqua salmon hatchery, then transferred to the game commission and was located for eight years at the Spring Lake hatchery on the Deschutes river, being assigned to the Rock Creek hatchery in 1925. He is considered one of the most efficient hatchery men in the employ of the game commission.

Care of the eggs and fry is a task requiring expert attention. The fish are fed ground feeds of liver, fish, eggs, and, curiously, alfalfa. As much as 100 pounds of feed is required daily during the peak of the season. A cold storage plant, with capacity for 10 tons, is used in holding supplies.

Rice Given Credit

Expansion of the Rock Creek trout hatchery is largely due to the efforts of Attorney Dexter Rice, who, following his appointment to the state game commission by Governor Stanley, was elected chairman of that body.

Mr. Rice had one of the first summer homes on Rock creek, and throughout his lifetime has been an ardent sportsman. His personal knowledge of the needs of the Umpqua river and its tributaries has enabled him to direct improvement of the hatchery in a manner to give the utmost efficiency and the greatest prospects for eventual improvement of fishing opportunities.

The current improvement work at the hatchery grounds is providing material for beautification of the property. Fills are being made in low spots, and the grounds will be leveled and landscaped to provide one of the county's leading beauty spots.

The grounds are always open to the public, and persons who have not visited this hatchery in recent

Twenty-two buildings in the port section were destroyed adding to the casualties. The harbor master, however, said most of the bombs fell into the water. Ships in port escaped damage.

Concurrently with these new forays on the eastern seaboard, General Mañá's headquarters at Valencia said two captured Italian airmen had disclosed that there were six groups of Italian-made planes in Spain, entirely staffed by Italians.

FRANCE AROUSED BY PLANE FORAY OVER HER BORDER

PARIS, June 6.—(AP)—Premier Daladier today left by plane for the French-Spanish frontier, accompanied by General De Gaulle, chief of his military staff, immediately after he received word warplanes from Spain had crossed the frontier for the second successive day.

Daladier planned to discuss with commanders of anti-aircraft, aviation and army units in the Toulouse border region all means of protecting the district against further bombardments.

"The next bombing error Spanish planes make over French territory will bring them an unpleasant surprise," one French official commented.

Today's air raiders from Spain, like those of yesterday, were nine unmarked planes. They dropped no bombs and turned back after a 10-minute flight over French territory. They were greeted by warning shots from at least two French anti-aircraft batteries.

Squadrons of French warplanes patrolled near the Spanish frontier under orders to shoot down any air raiders attempting a repetition of such an attack on French soil. The planes roared over the Pyrenees from the direction of Spain and dropped bombs 15 miles inside the French border.

Witnesses told government investigators the planes flew for two hours along the main trans-Pyrenees railroad from Toulouse to Barcelona and penetrated 50 miles to France before retracing their course and bombing in the vicinity of Orthe.

One powerful bomb wrecked electric power lines from the plant at Orthe and another struck near the railroad. Most of the explosives, however, fell in open fields and no casualties were reported.

foreign quarter on Shumoen island. No bombs were dropped in the foreign settlement, but the planes were said to have released numerous bombs over the settlement in order to hit nearby buildings.

A Hongkong dispatch said between 40 and 50 planes took part in two raids today, directing their attack chiefly at government buildings, railway stations and electric power plants.

(Reports from Hongkong said Japanese Consul General Nakamura had informed the British consul at Canton he was forwarding his protest to Tokyo.

(It was said to have assured him that the Japanese aviators had received stringent instructions not to violate British and French territory in Shumoen and that any violation was "an absolute undeliberate act.")

Bombs dropped 200 yards from the French cathedral, causing loss of life among Red Cross workers.

JAPANESE CAPTURE KAIFENG; CHENGCHOW IS NEXT GOAL

SHANGHAI, June 6.—(AP)—Japanese shock troops today began the envelopment of Chengchow, key to Hankow, after having captured Kaifeng, one-time capital of China.

One column, driving westward from Kaifeng in pursuit of retreating Chinese forces, advanced to Chengchow, 23 miles east of the important junction of the Peiping-Hankow and Lunghai railways, while other columns closed in from the south and southeast.

Japanese aerial observers reported large-scale Chinese withdrawal was under way at Changchow.

Some were withdrawing to the west, it was said, where they were forming a defense line against a Japanese advance into Shensi province which would cut off the flow of munitions from Soviet Russia. Others were forming a line 30 miles to the south near Shingchow to prevent the Japanese from severing the Peiping-Hankow line and striking Chengchow from that direction.

The Japanese aim is to capture Chengchow and then advance down the Peiping-Hankow railway to China's provisional capital.

The Chinese were expected to make a stand at Chungkow, a town of 10,000 population in an area of shifting sand ridges, terrain unfavorable for full use of Japanese mechanized equipment.

It was estimated that half of Kaifeng's normal population of 250,000 was evacuated before the city was captured in 24 hours of hand-to-hand fighting.

The resistance, although stubborn, was not as great as the Japanese had expected. Most of the Chinese already had withdrawn to Chengchow, making the defense of Kaifeng only a rear guard action to delay the Japanese advance.

BEAVERS DROP TWO GAMES TO SEATTLE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 6.—(AP)—Freddie Hutchinson, Seattle's 18-year-old hurler, won the first game of a double-header for the Seattle team over Portland yesterday. The score was 5 to 3. In the nightcap the Seattle team, behind the 7-hit pitching of Turpin, blanked the Beavers 7 to 0, to push them into a tie with San Diego for fourth place.

Sacramento's Solons held on to their two game league leadership by taking a pair of close ones from the San Diego Padres, 2 to 1 and 3 to 2 while the second place San Francisco Seals won two from the Los Angeles Angels, 9 to 4 and 3 to 1.

For the 17th time this season, the Oakland Acons lost a game by a one-run margin as the Hollywood Stars nipped them out 4 to 3. In the first game of a double-header, Joyce paced the Oaks to a 5 to 0 win in the nightcap to give them their second victory in the seven game series with the Stars.
