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RED CROSS TO AID CHINA'S DESTITUTE

Chapter in Douglas County Assigned \$60 Quota in \$1,000,000 Goal.

The Douglas county chapter of the America Red Cross has been assigned a quota of \$60 as its share of the million-dollar fund for relief of civilians in war-torn districts of China. Dr. B. R. Shoemaker, disaster relief chairman of the local chapter, reported today.

Efforts will be made to complete the China relief fund by June 15. Recent reports to Red Cross headquarters, Dr. Shoemaker states, estimate that 20,000,000 persons are homeless in areas accessible to foreign surveys alone, and that an equally large number will be found in interior provinces. In that same territory one million homeless orphans or children separated from their families, are wandering over the devastated countryside, shelterless and foodless. The number of persons in all parts of China who face starvation may reach the appalling figure of 60,000,000 before September, the report states.

Money received by the American Red Cross is being allocated to existing relief agencies in China.

Persons desiring to contribute to the fund being raised locally are asked to leave contributions at the Red Cross office in the courthouse, at the chamber of commerce office, or with Dr. Shoemaker personally.
