

GILLETTE VICTORY ELATES LOCAL MAN

The victory of Senator Guy M. Gillette in Iowa brought a thrill to one Roseburg resident who has telegraphed his congratulations to the victorious candidate.

The local friend of the senator is J. E. McClintock, who was associated with Mr. Gillette both in political and fraternal circles in Iowa.

"For two terms when I was candidate for treasurer of Cherokee county," said Mr. McClintock, "Mr. Gillette was my campaign manager, and he succeeded in bringing about my election, although I was a democratic candidate in an overwhelmingly republican county. The third time I ran for the office he was not available as manager and I lost the election.

Mr. McClintock declared Senator Gillette to be a "real American and a true democrat."

Fraternally they were members of the Knights of Pythias Lodge. Mr. McClintock was captain of the military unit of his lodge and Senator Gillette was his first lieutenant.

of about 1,000,000 had fled. About one-third of its residences have been vacated.

No accurate list of dead and injured could be compiled because many bodies still were buried in the debris of wrecked buildings with rescue squads unable to keep pace with the destruction.

A direct hit on Canton's power station cut off electric power, disabling the city's air alarm system and crippling hospital services.

Police dashed from house to house ringing doorbells to warn inhabitants as the Japanese planes came over, first before daybreak and later in mid-morning.

Hospitals lacked current for refrigerators to preserve serum and operate X-ray apparatus, and the work of caring for thousands of the injured was handicapped.

The city's telephone system was silenced, making more difficult the work of relief and public safety.

Besides the power station and railroad terminal, which still was burning hours after the second raid, the Japanese explosive and incendiary bombs caused heaviest damage to a cement works and a Utah-owned water works.

Government buildings, the Sun Yat-Sen memorial hall, commemorating the founder of China's republic, and several schools and universities were damaged.

Three bombs, dropped from 31 raiding planes, struck Lingham university, which is attended by several exchange students from the United States.

The university is about a mile and a half from the nearest military objective, an anti-aircraft battery on Honan island in the Pearl river.

Thirty-one Americans, three Britons and one German are members of the faculty.

Flight from the congested, panic-stricken city was hastened by fear the attacks might be the signal for a general Japanese offensive in south China. Officials ordered women and children to leave and transportation facilities could not cope with the rush.

Swatow Warned

Alarm was increased by pamphlets from Japanese warplanes yesterday on Swatow, 170 miles northeast of Canton, warning that the war zone now was extended to south China. Officials ordered women and children to leave and transportation facilities could not cope with the rush.

They warned "retreating Chinese armies would occasion bloodshed, although Japanese forces are anxious to protect lives."

WAR CASUALTIES TO DATE

FIGURED AT 1,302,000 SHANGHAI, June 8.—(AP)—Casualties in recent fighting in central China have raised the Japanese total to well past 300,000 and the Chinese to more than 1,000,000, foreign military authorities estimated today.

On the central China front Japanese were driving rapidly to occupation of Chengchow, junction of the Lanchow and Peking-Hankow railways, preparatory to an advance southward to Hankow, one of China's provisional capitals, 300 miles away.

Japanese were within 10 miles of the junction and were preparing for the final assault. Chinese troops spread out as a protective buffer before the admittedly doomed city.

Their greatest concentrations were reported at Chongchiao, 90 miles southeast of that town protecting the Peking-Hankow railway.

While the flat, sandy terrain about Chengchow made defense difficult, Chinese troop movements indicated a delaying stand would be made at Hanchang, 20 miles south of Chengchow. Hanchang, a town of 50,000 population, is a tobacco-growing center.

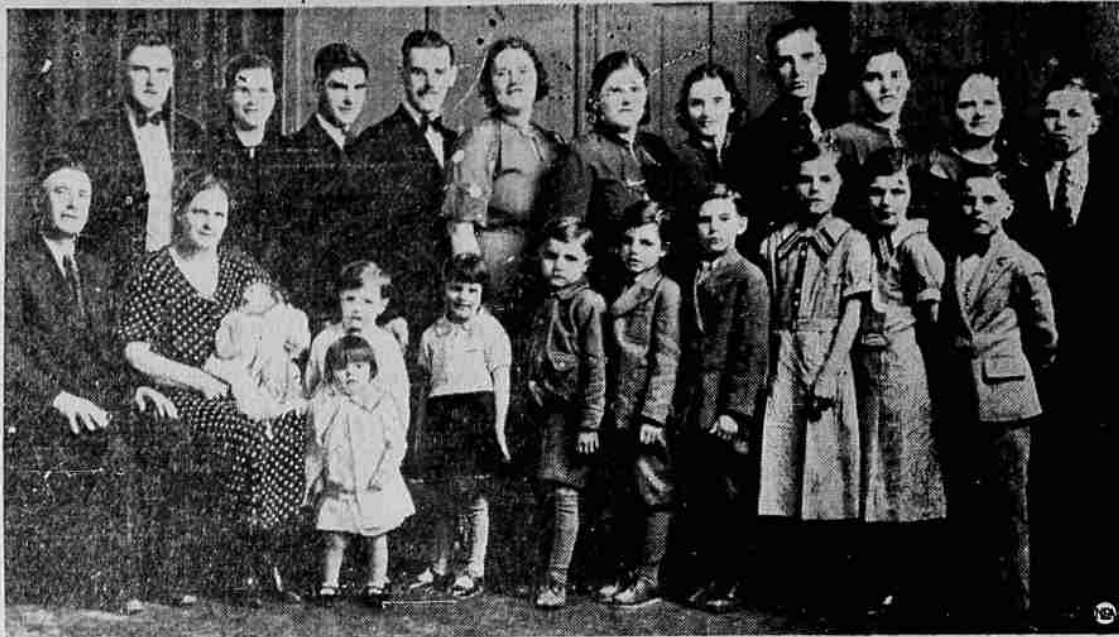

MASS MEETING WHEN MASSE FAMILY GATHERS

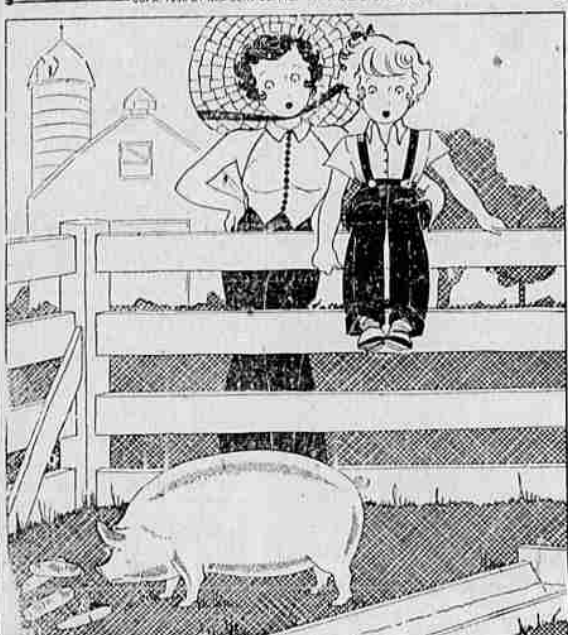

Hoping to revolutionize speedboat racing, Edward Spurr, in collaboration with the late Col. T. E. the great undertakings of the kind in recent years," Mr. Carlson declared today. "It is admitted that a project can be submitted in which the greatest beneficence in the federal government itself. This, however, is one of the greatest stunts of undetached timber in the United States—a stand that has been placed on a perpetual plan—timber toward which operators are looking as the next exciting resource.

"If water transportation is provided in connection with the cutting of this timber, the stumpage value will be increased sufficiently to pay the cost of canalization three times over."

No Serious Obstacles

The physical aspect of canalization offers no difficult problems, Mr. Carlson asserts, stating that many rivers now difficult to canalize have been made navigable.

The previous reports of the army engineers, it is pointed out, show no obstacles to canalization, but merely hold that the expense is not

justified by possible benefits. The local interests, however, now contend that changing conditions in lumbering, increases in farm products and methods of farm marketing, availability of petroleum products, farm machinery, etc., for imports, and numerous other benefits now make canalization desirable and of benefit to all interests concerned.

eriy. "The sole aim," he declared, "was to destroy the port, which British capital established 50 years ago. Incendiary bombs destroyed one warehouse and damaged another. The dredger had three holes below the water line and is lost."

"I picked up machine-gun bullets all over the harbor. The harbor was never used for anything except legitimate shipping, mainly fruit and vegetables."

(A Madrid dispatch, however, said Gandia had been used for about two weeks as a port of call for British destroyers and cruisers, owing to the frequent air raids on Valencia. Raids in Gandia were clearly marked with British colors.)

**REBEL BOMBING PLANES
RAIN DEATH IN FIGUERAS**

PERPIGNAN, France (at the Spanish Frontier), June 8.—(AP)—A squadron of Spanish insurgent bombing planes today bombed Figueras, junction of the main seaboard railway and the motor highway from France about 20 miles inside Spanish government territory.

Dispatches from Barcelona said 40 persons were killed and 60 wounded and 30 houses destroyed at Figueras.

Bombs apparently aimed at the railway hit a hospital, the city hall and other buildings in the heart of the city.

Spanish government anti-aircraft batteries opened fire on the raiders but the planes apparently escaped damage.

**F. R. WARNS U. S. FLIERS
FIGHTING FOR REBELS**

WASHINGTON, June 8.—(AP)—President Roosevelt warned American fliers yesterday their licenses would be revoked if they fought on foreign soil on the side of revolutionists against existing governments.

Without naming any particular country, the president told a press conference that American aviators were participating actively and passively in revolts by flying planes or working as mechanics.

He added while the United States could not arrest these aviators, it could revoke their pilots' licenses. He said participation in revolutions was contrary to American policy.

In response to questioning he said the new policy would not apply to men fighting on the side of accredited governments.

BANDITS LOOT TWO SOUTHERN BANKS

SHREVEPORT, La., June 8.—(AP)—Bandits operating along the Arkansas-Louisiana border section today robbed the second bank in two days, the Minden Bank and Trust company at Minden, La., and escaped with between \$20,000 and \$25,000.

Three men held up the Bank of Bradley, Ark., yesterday and robbed it of \$685. James Meek, cashier of the Bradley bank, identified two of the men as Floyd Hamilton and Ted Walters. Captain Atkinson of the Arkansas state police said Hamilton is a brother of the notorious Raymond Hamilton, executed two years ago at the Huntsville, Texas, prison for a long list of crimes.

The gang that robbed the Minden bank accented themselves inside the building before opening time and tied up employees, and the president, J. E. Harper, with wire as each entered.

In all seven persons were tied up and placed out of sight while the robbers, numbering three or four persons, forced Louis Scruggs, assistant cashier, to get the money for them at the time of opening the vault.

ly curtail employment in the industry.

This latter concession was made to southerners who have been fighting for a wage differential.

Senator Pepper (D., Fla.), announced that with this proviso he would support the compromise.

Senator Ellender (D., La.), told Chairman Thomas (D., Utah), angrily he would not support it. Ellender was the sole senate conferee voting against the compromise.

Representative Hartley (R., N. J.), of the house conferees also cast a "yes" vote.

Chairman Thomas said the committee would take up discussion of hour maxima at a meeting this afternoon.

Under the compromise, administration of the act would be under the labor department. An administrator appointed by the president and confirmed by the senate would have direct charge.

Decisions of the administrator would be final, except for appeals to the courts.

He would appoint the industrial boards which would be set up after two years of operation of the act. These boards would be selected on a "voluntary" basis insofar as possible, giving rise to the expression by one conferee that "the NRA blue eagle flies again."

When the boards made their investigations and recommended a minimum wage to the administrator, he either would accept the recommendation, or discharge the board and appoint a new one. He would have no power to alter the wage suggested.

Industries probably will be lumped into major classifications, one conferee said. Thus this labor industry would include not only logging and saw mill operations, but all industries allied with lumber.

The bill would authorize payments of from \$1.75 to \$3 daily to be financed by a 3 per cent payroll tax the employers would pay. Workers would not be taxed.
