

JUNIOR BASEBALL PRACTICE STARTED

More Than 60 Boys Listed
Here for First Unit of
Recreation Program.

An excellent start has been made on Legion Junior baseball, with more than 60 boys already enrolled and at least as many expected to join immediately, according to Bob Kidder, recently employed by the school district to direct a program of supervised recreation during the summer period.

Baseball is the first activity to be adopted, due to the fact that the preliminary organization had been taken care of by the local Legion post.

Three Units As Before
Three divisions are to be conducted this year as have been done in past seasons. The Midgets, composed of boys from 8 to 12 years of age, will meet for practice each Monday, Wednesday and Friday, at 9 a. m. Intermediates, boys 12 to 15 years of age, will practice at 1 p. m. on each of the three days, while the Juniors, 15 to 17 years of age, will meet at 3:30 p. m. on the same days of the week, and will add Saturday to make a four-day training schedule each week. The team to represent Douglas county in the state Legion baseball series will be selected from the Junior squad.

Warren Hodges and Andy Matthews, both experienced baseball players, have been named to assist Mr. Kidder with the baseball program.

Pete Franco also has been named as an assistant in baseball and will aid also in organizing and directing boxing competition.

Plans are being formulated for a tennis tournament, and, if possible, if sufficient interest is shown, that a girls' softball league will be formed.

PITCHERS WIN OWN GAMES WITH BATS

SAN FRANCISCO, June 9.—(AP)—Pitchers batted their way into the headlines in the Pacific coast baseball league today.

The league leading Sacramento Solons nosed out the Hollywood Stars 3 to 2 when Pitcher Phippen stepped to the plate in the ninth inning with the bases loaded and two out and smacked a hard single to give himself his 11th victory of the season.

In San Francisco, Koussal, considered one of the best in the league, but whose pitching to date has not been up to Hoyle, pitched and hit the San Francisco Seals to a 6-to-3 win over the Portland Beavers. It was his third win in eight starts.

He limited the Beavers to eight hits while he and his teammates collected 12 from the offerings of Hilleber. Two of those hits were collected by Koussal.

Although hit freely, Salvo pitched his 10th win of the season as San Diego measured the Oakland A's 9 to 4 for their second straight victory. The Padres moved into third place in the standings.

Five runs on five hits in the fifth inning went a long way in giving the Los Angeles Angels their second straight win over Seattle by a 10 to 2 score.

OLYMPIC GAMES IN JAPAN PROTESTED

Wm. J. Bingham, Harvard
Athletic Head, Quits
Participation Plan.

BOSTON, June 9.—(AP)—William J. Bingham, Harvard athletic director, has withdrawn from the 1940 Olympic games in protest against the games being held in Japan.

Bingham, who was chairman of the 1936 U. S. Olympic track and field team at Berlin, announced his action last night at a Y. M. C. A. sports dinner.

"How can we ask the American people in 1940 to support a team going to a country standing for what Japan represents today?" he said. "I could not ask the American people to support the Japanese games nor could I seek the support of my university."

"I deplore Hitler and all he represents, but he was not in power when the 1936 Olympics were awarded to Berlin. The situation in regard to the choice of Japan was entirely different. The international Olympic committee knew that Japan had already invaded Manchuria when it awarded it the 1940 games."

"I had been hoping that they would have been awarded to Finland or England or some other peaceful country. We are dispirited an ideal in letting the Olympics get into the control, not of athletes, but of those who would use youth for their own purposes."

KLAMATH PREPARES FOR STATE GRANGE

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 8.—(AP)—The first convention in the 65-year history of the Oregon State grange ever to be held in southeastern Oregon will open here next Monday.

More than 1500 officials, delegates and other grangers from all parts of the state, as well as the California and Washington State grange masters and other outside officials, are expected to attend the five-day meeting.

GIANTS AGAIN TOP NATIONAL LEAGUE

Cubs Beaten in Twin Bill
of Big Series; Yankees
Also Drop 2 Games.

A doubleheader victory for the New York Giants yesterday boosted the team to first place in the National League. In the opener, Ott exploded his 12th homer of the season in the tenth inning to break up the game for a 4-2 Giant win. Then Hubbell went out in the nightcap and took care of the rest of the job. Only five Cubs passed second base, and six fanned as he turned in his usual classic, posting his seventh win of the year by a 4-1 margin. Larry French was the losing pitcher of the Cubs in the first game.

The double victory left the Giants in first place by half a game, with everything riding on today's series finale.

Meantime, the Yankees are finding it anything but easy in the American league wars. They were rudely clubbed around in both ends of a doubleheader by the Chicago White Sox yesterday, and dropped into a tie for second place. Gerry Walker's homer in the ninth and single in the 13th gave the Sox the opener, 11-10, and Dietrich's pitching through the first seven frames was enough for a 19-6 Chicago victory in the nightcap.

Cleveland Beaten
This double defeat gave Boston's Red Sox a chance to pull up to a second place tie, and they made the most of it. Fox's whacked a pair of homers and drove in four runs as Boston knocked off the Cleveland Indians, 7-6. Feller lasted less than seven innings.

Brooklyn's Dodgers continued their amazing western invasion with a 7-6 decision over the St. Louis Cardinals on the strength of a four-run ninth inning rally. The equally unpredictable St. Louis Browns made it two straight over Washington by an 11-5 margin, clubbing Wes Ferrell out.

Klinger's six-hitter gave the Pirates a 4-1 win over the Boston Bees. Bridges turned in a five-hitter to pitch the Braves to a 5-1 victory over the Athletics. The Cincinnati Reds romped off with a 7-5 win over the Phillies in a night encounter.

WALKER, BABICH TOP COAST HURLERS

LOS ANGELES, June 9.—(AP)—Lefty Bill Walker of Sacramento and Johnny Babich of Hollywood continue to rank as the most consistent pitchers in the Pacific coast league, according to figures released today.

While Win Ballou and Oscar of San Francisco have won all four games hurled, Walker has won nine games and lost two for an average of .875, and Babich has won nine and lost three for .738.

Mannuel Salvo, San Diego, ran his strike-out figures to 70, one more than Gene Lillard of Los Angeles.
