NEW U. S. ROAD AID TO OREGON STATED

SALEM, June 9.—(AP)—The federal government will spend about \$3,369,000 on Oregon roads in fiscal year 1940 and \$4,145,000 in 1941, the state highway department said today.

The state highway department will spend \$2,169,000 in federal money in 1940, compared with \$3,191,334 each in 1938 and 1939.

The 1940 federal road appropriations for the state include \$1,631,000 for regular federal aid, \$245,000 for secondary highways, \$240,000 for railroad grade separations, and \$67,000 for public lands highways. The government will spend itself \$1,200,000 for forest roads and undetermined smaller amounts for national park roads, national parkways and Indian roads.

In fiscal year 1941 the government will give the state \$1,876,000 in regular federal aid, \$245,000 for secondary highways, \$240,000 for railroad grade separations, and \$184,000 for public lands highways. The government will spend directly \$1,550,000 for forest roads in the state, and small sums for national park roads, national parkways and Indian roads.

The government has spent \$44,000,000 on Oregon roads in the past 21 years.

The 1940 federal road bill provides expenditure of \$188,500,000, while \$181,000,000 will be spent in 1941. The 1938 and 1939 bills appropriated about \$238,000,000.

Fiscal year 1940 begins July 1, 1939.
