JEAN STRAWN WRITES ESSAY ON CAMP FIRE FOR TORCH BEARER'S RANK

The following essay was written by Miss Jean Strawn, member of the Roseburg Pottawatomie Camp Fire group, for her Torch Bearer Craftsman in Literature.

CAMP FIRE

"In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth." Genesis 1:1.

"And God saw everything that He had made, and, behold, it was very good." Genesis 1:31.

The Camp Fire idea had its beginning in 1911 when Dr. and Mrs. Luther Gulick had a summer camp in Maine where their three girls and one boy shared the pleasures and duties of the camp. They loved music, games and dramatics and also knew the joy of making beautiful things. All this they brought to their camp fire, and others made their special contributions.

Among those contributing were Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Thompson Seton, Miss Lina Beard and Mrs. Mary Shenck Woolman. Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Thompson Seton started the Woodcraft League, Miss Lina Beard, sister of Dan Beard, helped with Camp Craft. Mrs. Mary Shenck Woolman, director of the Manhattan trade school for girls, helped with home and hand craft and with the writing of the first manual. Mrs. Charles Farnsworth of Horace Mann school in New York, also helped with the first manual. Mr. John Collier, later commissioner of Indian affairs under President Franklin D. Roosevelt, wrote the Fire Makers' Desires.

In March, 1912, the new organization known as the Camp Fire Girls was started and since then over two million girls have enjoyed the pleasures of the organization.

The manual has been revised with the addition of many new and interesting honors to be earned. There are now in the neighborhood of 1,214 honors in the manual outside of the five special swimming honors—the pollwog, frog, fish, diving fish, and dolphin—and the three camp honors—the fogot finder, trail maker and gypsy.

Every year there is a special "birthday project" for the month of March. If won, this brings the girls another special honor. These many honors should keep any girl happy and busy!

More girls are coming in contact with the Camp Fire activities each year and are learning to do many different things. The children nowadays have such an advantage over the girls of the eighteen hundreds because they have so many more things to work with.
