CO. D PREPARES TO ENTRAIN FOR CAMP

Roseburg Guardsmen Will Take Part in 2 Weeks' Manuevers Program.

Co. D, 162nd Infantry, Roseburg's unit of the Oregon national guard, will entrain tonight for Camp Clatsop to participate in the two weeks' annual summer encampment of the Oregon military organization.

The company, which has been making preparations for the encampment for several weeks, was assembled at 1:30 p. m. today, at which time equipment was issued, packs prepared, and company property loaded in cars provided at the railroad station.

Final inspection will be held this evening, and the company will entrain at 10:45 p. m.

The troop train from the south will carry companies from Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass. The Oregon city company will join the train tomorrow morning.

The travel schedule provides for a breakfast stop at Portland between 6:30 and 7:45 a. m. in Portland and arrival at Camp Clatsop at 11:30 a. m.
