The Cleveland Indians must be about ready to admit the Babe was right. The Tribe still holds the American league lead, but they wound up their eastern tour by dropping two straight to the Yanks and are only a game and a half ahead as they return home to face the eastern clubs again.

A sign of what may happen when the Yanks get going as a team was seen in their 7-6 victory over the Indians and Bob Feller yesterday.

The Tribe got off to a four-run lead against Ruffing in the second, but Rufus the Red nullified that himself by belting a homer in the same inning. Then he went on in a duel with Allen until Allen was luffed for Feller as the Yanks threatened his one-run lead.

Gordon's Homer Wins. Going into the eighth, Dickey drew a pass and Joe (Flash) Gordon, the rookie second-sacker who has been one of the "bitless" Yanks most of the season, smacked one into the stands for a game-winning home run.

The victory gave the Yanks a record of seven won and five lost against western opposition while the league leaders showed five victories and six defeats for their tour. The only western club in the American league to come out ahead was Detroit, which walloped Washington, 18-12, in yesterday's "frank" game to sweep the series and finish with a 7-6 record.

In the National league the New York Giants, who dropped to second place and then regained the lead, broken even with six wins, six losses and a tie by splitting yesterday's twin bill at St. Louis. The Giants sailed through to an 8-5 victory; then went down 4-1 as Welland pitched a six-inning shutout.

Home With Bags Loaded. Meanwhile Brooklyn broke even with Chicago and thus compiled the best record of any touring eastern club, 7 victories and 3 defeats. A nine-run rally that blasted Van Mungo in the eighth gave the Cubs a 9-3 opening victory, but Fitzsimmons replied with a four-to-1. Six runs scored in the eighth inning and Camilli's homer with bases full helped win, 6-4.

Another four-run homer started the Athletics off to a double triumph over the St. Louis Browns, 8-3 and 1-0. Johnson hit it in the first inning, then produced another to drive in seven runs. In the five-inning nightcap, Thomas gave the Browns only one hit.

Mace Brown of the Pirates earned his eighth victory of the year in a relief role as the Buccs rallied to beat the Phillies, 11-4, added by Rizzo's homer with the corners crammed. The Sunday curfew law stopped the second game in the second inning.

Adding to the home run roll of honor, York and Gehring contributed to Detroit's ten-run rally against Washington that just tied the score; Gee Walker's ninth-inning four-bagger enabled the Chicago White Sox to beat the Boston Red Sox 4-3, after losing the first game, 9-2; and Goodman's 14th of the season helped the Cincinnati Reds take a 7-4 nightcap victory from the Boston Bees after going down, 6-5, in the ten-inning opener.

Seattle started the week in third place and wound up in seventh. They eliminated a very unpleasant week at Los Angeles by dropping a twin bill to the Angels, 5 to 4 and 1 to 0, to make it seven straight losses.

Sunday was a red letter day for Ohio, veteran Oakland Aeron pitcher. He won his first game of the season when he limited the San Diego Padres to nine scattered hits in the first game of a twin bill. The score was 3 to 1. In the nightcap the Padres evaded the count when Salvo, reigning strikeout king of the league, added five more victims to his total to bring it to 31 for the season, and win his eleventh game of the year, 6 to 2.

Braddock and Gould Think Schmeling Won't Last Over 8 Rounds.

Y., June 13—(AP)—Maybe it was the turn of Jim Braddock and Joe Gould, who piloted Braddock to the heavy weight title, to "see something" when they watched Max Schmeling work out yesterday for his June 22 shot at Joe Louis' crown. Anyway they were just as definite in their predictions as Max was about what he saw before he fought Louis the first time.

Braddock said he didn't think Max, despite his good condition, could hold off Louis more than seven rounds, while Gould predicted the champion would score a knockout in "about eight rounds."

Schmeling looked as good as usual in his eight rounds of boxing against four training partners, punching them hard. But Braddock said the quartet of spartanates was not nearly as tough as the kind Louis has been facing.

Joe responded by putting on one of the best exhibitions since he began training here. He pummeled three tough spartanates during his six rounds of boxing.
