**LAMB-WOOL SHOW PLANS BEING MADE**

**List of Premiums Extended for Both Open Classes and 4-H Exhibitors.**

Plans for the seventh annual Fat Lamb and Wool show to be held Saturday, June 25, are rapidly being completed. H. A. Lindgren, extension animal husbandman, will judge the show and spend several days in the county on livestock work.

Owners of sheep planning on making entries are requested to file entry blanks before the evening of June 26th to give those in charge of the show sufficient time to arrange for all the pens that will be needed.

The premium list has been extended for both open classes and the 4-H club class. Premiums offered are as follows: Class I—Market fat lambs, pen of five: first, \$20, second \$15, third \$12, fourth \$10, fifth \$8, sixth \$5, seventh \$7, eighth \$8, ninth \$5, tenth \$5, eleventh \$5, twelfth \$5, thirteenth \$5 and fourteenth \$5.

Class II: 4-H fat lamb (single fat lamb): first \$5, second \$4, third \$3, fourth \$2, fifth \$1, sixth \$1, and seventh \$1.

Class III: wool—Lot 1 medium, first \$3, second \$2, and third \$1. Lot II—Fine wool, first \$2.50, second \$1.50 and third \$1. Lot III—Coarse, first \$2.50, second \$1.50 and third \$1.00.

Special exhibit pens will be provided for breeders of purebred sheep for exhibit purposes only. No premiums are being offered for purebred breeding stock, but as for the past several years breeders having purebred rams or ewes for sale will be given free exhibit space.

**EGGS SELL HIGHER ON LOWER OUTPUT**

Eggs are one of the few farm commodities currently rising in price. Reason is the reduced production which has lessened shipments to market and to cold storage plants. The bureau of agricultural economics expects prices to trend seasonally upward for the next six months.

Supplies of eggs during this period are expected to be less than in 1937. Storage stocks are not accumulating so rapidly as a year ago, and a substantial reduction from 1937 is considered likely in August 1 holdings of both shell and frozen eggs.

But prices of chickens are expected by the bureau to decline during the remainder of this year, even though supplies of poultry, both in storage and on farms, are rather low. The larger hatch expected this year and the smaller consumer incomes are price-depressing factors.

The bureau points to the favorable feed situation and the present small numbers of layers on farms as major factors tending toward a larger hatch in 1938 than in 1937.

Hens have been laying heavily this spring. But because of the smaller number of layers on farms the production of eggs per flock on May 1 was 6 per cent below that of a year earlier.

**COQUILLE**, June 13.—(AP)—Author Lois Nichols wanted to get local color from the cab of a logging truck, so she prevailed on a driver to let her accompany him over a hazardous road.
