SWEDEN FETES HER KING'S BIRTHDAY

STOCKHOLM, June 16.—(AP)—Sweden today gave her monarch, 80-year-old Gustaf the Fifth, a birthday gift of 5,000,000 kronor (\$1,250,000) to help fight infantile paralysis in the nation.

More than 100,000 persons flocked to the flag-decorated capital for the anniversary and cheered the monarch as he rode in an open carriage this afternoon to Stockholm stadium where he accepted "citizen homage."

A short felicitation speech by Crown Prince Gustaf Adolf, who sails tomorrow with Crown Princess Louise and a party to the new Sweden jubilee celebrations in Wilmington, Del., started off a strenuous day's schedule for the monarch.

WASHINGTON, June 16.—(AP)—President Roosevelt cabled today his best wishes to King Gustaf V of Sweden who is celebrating his 80th birthday.

west of Castellon de la Plana, caught the full impact of insurgent artillery which spanned the broad but shallow Mijares river with its fire.

Besides the Mijares river, two coastal Sierras made up the principal natural barriers to the insurgent push toward Valencia. The second of those ridges protects Sagunto about 15 miles north of Valencia while the first lies about six miles behind the government's Mijares river line.

HEROIC "LOST DIVISION" DRIVEN ACROSS BORDER

HENDAYE, France (at the Spanish Frontier), June 16.—(AP)—Spanish insurgents sprang a carefully set trap on the government's last-ditch defenders in the Pyrenees mountain passes today, forcing the government's "lost" forty-third division to flee across the frontier into France.

More than 2,000 wounded men of the "lost" division, clothed only in rags, straggled into France during the night and early morning darkness while heroic comrades covered their flight down the Pyrenees' steep slopes.

day if he has his way farmers who put up wheat as collateral for forthcoming wheat loans will have to foot the storage bill.

The government, he said, should not be required to pay for such storage. Agriculture department officials said the customary charge for storage of grain in commercial elevators was a cent a bushel a month.

Storage of 100,000,000 bushels of grain in such elevators would cost about \$12,000,000 a year, they said. Whether farmers or the government will pay the storage is a question to be determined by the agriculture department, President Roosevelt, and the commodity credit corporation, agency which would make the loans.

Agriculture department officials recalled storage of cotton put up as collateral for loans since 1934 had cost the commodity credit corporation \$4,265,697 up to March 31.

Officials believed much of the loan wheat will be stored on farms to avoid charges.

OREGON HIGHWAY BONDS PURCHASED

PORTLAND, June 16.—(AP)—The state highway commission accepted the bid of the United States National bank of Portland yesterday for \$750,000 of short-term highway bonds.

The firm offered .37 of 1 per cent.

BROADCAST SET BY LUTHERAN LEADER

A special coast-to-coast network of 56 stations including KRNK, Roseburg, will carry an address June 19 by Dr. John W. Behnken, president of the Lutheran synod of Missouri and other states, when Lutheran clergy, educators and laymen from many parts of the United States and Canada will be gathered in St. Louis for the centennial observance of the establishment of the Lutheran church in America.

Thousands of Lutherans will be in St. Louis June 15 to 25 for the triennial conference of the synod, and the centennial activities constitute an important highlight in the ten days' program. St. Louis was the landing place of the Saxon immigrants who brought Lutheranism to the United States, and the centennial program will dramatize the experiences of these pioneers there and in Perry county, Missouri, birthplace of Concordia seminary and of the present extensive Lutheran educational system.

Dr. Behnken will speak from 3:30 to 4 p. m. from the huge new municipal auditorium and a mass jubilee chorus of 1,000 voices will participate in the centennial program.

IDENTITY OF AUTO THIEF ESTABLISHED

State police headquarters at Salem reported today that the identification of the fugitive auto thief who committed suicide here last Sunday while being pursued by officers is believed to be definite. The police from fingerprints and photographs have established identification of the man as Paul Joseph Pierce, whose fingerprints were taken in Seattle in 1934 when he was charged with assault upon an elderly man. Efforts still are in progress to learn if he had recently been engaged in law violations. A check is being made with Canadian authorities, as evidence indicated he recently had been in Canada.

threatened yesterday, was at the white house.

Action on the \$2,753,000,000 spending-lending bill was almost completed when the senate approved a formula, previously passed by the house, for distribution of \$212,000,000 of farm benefit payments carried by the measure.

Subsequently the senate agreed to a \$700,000 compromise of the rural electrification authority and administrative allocation, also contained in the bill, and this was sent to the house for action.

Assessment Suspended
The house passed a bill today to suspend for another year the requirement that \$100 of assessment work be done on mining claims held by location.

The measure went to the senate for action on an amendment to extend the suspension to Alaskan claims. Representative Murdock (D-Ariz.) called the bill up unexpectedly. It had not received the approval of the house mining committee. Last year the committee had approved a suspension bill, but announced that would be the last time it would do so.

The senate yesterday passed the railroad unemployment measure bill and sent it to the white house. The measure would establish a separate unemployment compensation system for railroad workers.

At present they are covered by the laws of the states in which they work.

SLASH BURNING WARNING ISSUED

SALEM, June 16.—(AP)—A warning against burning slashings resulting from land clearing activities without obtaining a fire permit, was given today by State Forester J. W. Ferguson, who pointed out that Ira J. Helms, Portland police official, was fined \$25 and costs at St. Helens for this offense.

Ferguson said Helms instructed an employee to burn slashings without a permit.

CHINESE DOWN SIX JAP WAR PLANES

had sent 30 French-made planes to the Canton area since the present series of Japanese bombing began May 28.

YELLOW RIVER ADDING TO DEATH-DESTRUCTION TOLL
SHANGHAI, June 16.—(AP)—The Yellow river flood, fed by a steady downpour of rain, unrolled a ribbon of death and disaster 10 to 20 miles wide and 90 miles long across the flat plains of Honan province today. Chinese and Japanese armies locked in combat on the Peking-Hankow front fled before the torrent which Japanese now estimate will take a toll of 50,000 lives.

Advices from Hankow, the provisional Chinese capital, said the relentless flood surging south-eastward from torn dikes had penetrated beyond Fokow, 10 miles south of Kaileng on the Lunghai railway and 90 miles south of the Yellow river.

Sweeping over thousands of acres of farmland, driving peasants and armies before it, the flood was declared by Japanese war dispatches to have affected 2,000 villages with an aggregate population of 500,000.

Japanese bombing planes, temporarily diverted from their death-dealing activities, dropped thousands of empty bags, ordinarily used for trenches and machine-gun nests, into the flood area for use by Japan's army engineers in repairing breached dikes.

Food and tools also were being dropped to isolated Japanese troops fighting the new enemy.

School Requests Listed

An interim committee to investigate methods of lowering public school textbook costs was favored and the group urged that the state assume a larger share in support of education, that public school teachers take first aid course, and that each school be provided with first aid kits.

Stream purification measures, the Willamette valley project and uniform legislation for all western states relative to truck load weights were supported. A proposal to establish a Umatilla county producers' and consumers' co-operative market was opposed. Resolutions asked congress to issue advance bulletins on dietetics, pass legislation to prevent spread of spotted fever ticks, and the legislature to adopt a clearer definition of forest land in Oregon fire laws and establish a surplus crop laboratory at Pendleton.

Dr. Albert Slaughter, Portland, veteran member of the executive committee, was defeated in a runoff election by W. A. Johnson, Grants Pass. Also elected in runoff voting were Roscoe Robertson, Wheeler county, steward; Henry Gustafson, assistant steward; I. Rona Slack, Klamath county, Flora, and Dorothy Perkins, lady assistant steward.
