

JOE LOUIS FAVORED 11-5 TO BEAT MAX

Negro, Allowed Own Kind
of Gloves, More Tape, Says
He'll Win Quickly.

NEW YORK, June 16.—(AP)—The professional gamblers, impressed by a number of things, have jumped their odds from 8-to-5 to a juicy 11-to-5 that Joe Louis will retain his heavyweight championship in his 15-round fight with Max Schmeling next Wednesday night at Yankee stadium.

That is somewhat disconcerting to those of us who already are well out on the Schmeling limb, even though the odds-layers lately have been dead wrong more often than right.

The previous odds of 7-to-5 and 8-to-5 were no more than the customary "feeler" quotations offered in almost any champion's favor, but this 11-to-5 money means that Louis will enter the ring a pronounced choice of the wise boys, maybe as high as 3-to-1.

Louis' Words Count

What caused the firming of the figures mostly was the fact that Louis finally opened his mouth the other day and said on his very own initiative that he intended to knock Schmeling out quick, perhaps in two rounds.

"That's enough to suit me," said one of the big bookmakers. "All I wanted to know was how Louis really felt about it. They've finally got that boy mad. That's the one thing he needed."

Another factor that the bookies have taken into consideration is the argument going on over the gloves to be used in the big brawl, with the prospect that Louis, as the champion, will get what he wants.

Joe has abnormally long thumbs, and he is determined to clout Schmeling with what is known as the "Chicago" type of mitten, which affords better protection to the thumb than the model which is standard in New York. There are some who think this will worry Max, though the German says not.

More Tape Allowed

It has been discovered, too, that the rules of the New York state athletic commission now permit the use of about twice the amount of bandage and tape they did when Max and Joe fought two summers ago.

On that occasion, it will be recalled, there was a violent commotion in Louis' dressing room before the fight when Joe Jacobs, Schmeling's semi-manager, discovered that the negro's dukes were encased in armor-plating fashion. Louis was divested of about two pounds of "difference" before they entered the ring, and this was supposed to have robbed him of some of his shocking power.

Now, it comes out, this grievous handicap has been removed, and Louis will go into battle equipped in the manner befitting a champion of the world. Schmeling, of course, will enjoy the same privilege, but Max has naturally strong hands that require little protection.

The advance sale is booming along at a rate of about \$45,000 a day and Promoter Mike Jacobs seems assured a gate crowding \$1,000,000. He says it will top that figure.

Through last night Mike had banked slightly over \$500,000, and this didn't count several large blocks of reservations for which checks had not yet been received.

VANDER MEER AGAIN HURLS O-HIT, O-RUN

Baseball History Written
by Two Performances of
Its King in Row.

Associated Press Sports Writer. Johnny Vander Meer moved into baseball's hall of fame last Saturday. Now he owns it.

The Cincinnati Reds' 23-year-old southpaw fastballer, in his first full year in the major leagues, reached a new all-time pitching high last night in Brooklyn by hurling his second no-hit, no-run game in a row.

That's something not even the Mathewsons, the Johnsons, the Youngs ever did.

In all baseball history, only ten pitchers ever have turned in two no-hit games over their entire careers. None ever had come through with two in one season.

And now, along comes young Johnny, who started his baseball in a church league near his home in Midland Park, N. J., and then was given the go-by from three big league clubs, to toss two no-hitters, in two consecutive appearances—all in the space of four days.

Last Saturday, pitching against the Boston Bees, he hurled the first nine-inning National league no-hitter since Duffy Daan turned the trick in 1914. Last night, he repeated against the Brooklyn Dodgers, 6-0, before a sellout crowd of 38,748 which packed Ebbets field to see major league night ball inaugurated in the metropolitan area.

Eight Walks Issued

Eight men reached base, all on walks, as his mates fielded perfectly, but Johnny pitched his way right out of every pluck. Even in the ninth, when, with one out, he loaded the bases on consecutive walks to Babe Phelps, Cookie Lavagetto and Dolph Camilli, the Dodgers' "murderers' row," he got hold of his control again to finish the job. In that spot, he forced a runner at the plate for the second out and got Jimmy Leo Durocher to fly to center on a two-and-two pitch to end the game.

Except for that one inning, only one other Brooklyn runner got as far as second base against the six-foot, 190-pounder and his fireball, as he posted his seventh win of the year against two defeats.

Parents in Grandstand As early as the fourth, Johnny had a hunch he might repeat his no-hit job. There must have been something in the way the Brooklyn were swinging, or possibly it was because his father and mother were in the stands, and "pop" was seeing his first big league game.

His classy performance, which was made easier when McCormick's three-run homer put the finishing touches on a four-run game winning rally in the third inning, completely overshadowed two other first-rate pitching jobs on yesterday's program. Tobin, the Pittsburgh Pirates' young right-hander, hurled a five-hitter in whitewashing the New York Giants, 2-0.

The defeat, however, didn't cut the Giants' league lead any, since Macyston duplicated Tobin's trick against the second-place Chicago Cubs to give the Boston Bees a 2-0 victory. Not a man passed first base against Danny.

Over in the American league, the Cleveland Indians retained their half-game lead over the New York Yankees when both came from behind to score victories. The tribe snapped a five-game losing streak to top the Senators, 6-1. The Yanks stretched their winning streak to five straight with a 6-1 decision over the Chicago White Sox.

Chapman hit his seventh homer as the Athletics made it two straight over the Tigers, 7-6. Foxs walloped No. 19 to pace the Boston Red Sox to a 7-4 victory over the St. Louis Browns.

The Cardinals collected 16 hits to win a 9-7 slugfest from the Phillies.

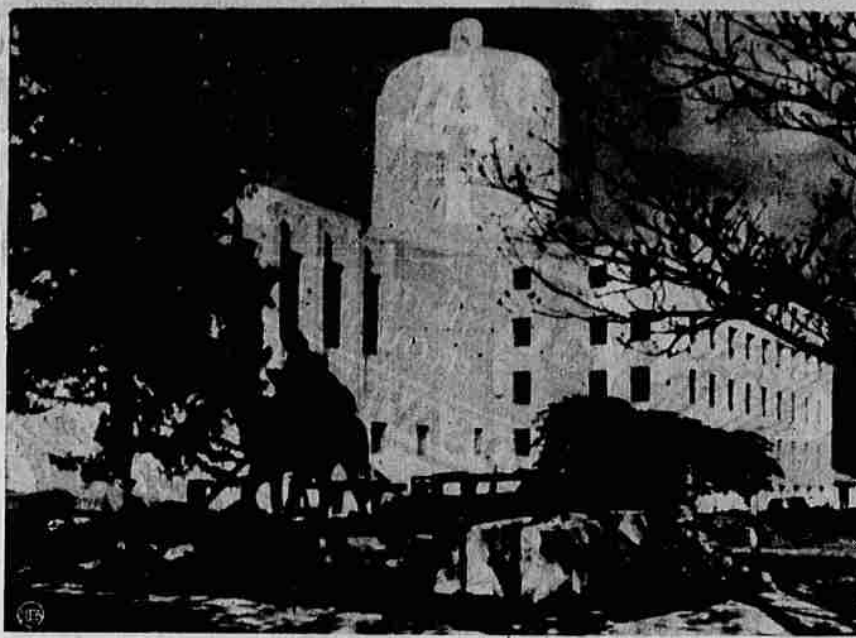

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—(AP)—The Pacific Coast Baseball league presented the Hollywood Stars in "a comedy of errors" last night.

KLAMATH BASIN'S INCOME DECREASED

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 16.—(AP)—Klamath basin agriculture produced an income of \$7,234,000 during 1937, final estimates released by County Agent C. A. Henderson disclosed today. Of the total \$3,855,300 was derived from crops and the rest from livestock.

The 1937 figure was more than \$3,500,000 under 1936's record \$40,890,000, the decrease being charged mainly to poor market prices for crops combined with crop-damaging wet weather in late spring and frosts in midsummer. A heavy increase in livestock income kept the general decline from being even more pronounced.
