Countess Barbara's Baby Kidnap Target

5-10 HEIRESS' LONDON HOME UNDER GUARD

Granting of Secret Court Order to Countess Stirs Rumor of Rift With Nobleman Mate.

LONDON, June 22 — (AP) — A British court's action in granting Countess Barbara Hutton-Haugwitz-Reventlow's request for a legal order presuming safeguarding her two-year-old son Lance tonight gave rise to rumors of a rift with her Danish nobleman husband.

The nature of the court order was not revealed, and the rumors were based on the fact that the count had been absent from London since his precipitate departure two weeks ago.

He was reported to be somewhere on the continent, but friends said they did not know his exact whereabouts.

Attorneys for the countess said a statement could not be made at present because of "legal reasons."

LONDON, June 22 — (AP) — Silent guards watched the stately mansion of Countess Barbara Hutton-Haugwitz-Reventlow from behind locked gates today after reported kidnap threats against the baby son of the five-foot-tall, store heiress who fled the United States because "I'm afraid of American kidnappers."

The countess merely said she had taken "certain precautions" to guard the child, two-year-old Count Lance Haugwitz-Reventlow, London's wealthiest baby, against a reported threat.

She was understood to have remained up until 2 a. m. today.

Her attorney said it was impossible to make a statement at the moment "for legal reasons."

Scotland Yard was said to have posted guards at all ports and airfields to watch for the arrival of the countess.

FEDERAL MARKET EXPERT PASSES ON

LOUIS REMAINS FAVORITE IN BETTING TO KEEP TITLE IN BATTLE WITH SCHMELING

Brown Bomber Enters Ring Tonight With 6-lb. Weight Margin Over German Schlager Who Knocked Him Out Two Years Ago; Challenger Unworried by Ban on One of Seconds; Gate Almost \$1,000,000.

NEW YORK, June 22 — (AP) — Joe Louis weighed 198 pounds today for his 15-round heavyweight title bout against Max Schmeling in the Yankee stadium tonight. Schmeling, the German challenger, scaled 193.

Despite a brief light shower in mid-afternoon, Mike Jacobs made no move toward postponement of the fight.

When the rain stopped, Jacobs said that barring a turn for the worse in weather conditions, the fight would go on tonight as scheduled.

SLAYING OCCURS IN JAIL AT BEND

R. K. Jubb, Memory Expert, Accused of Killing One Man, Wounding 2nd.

BEND, Ore., June 22 — (AP) — Ralph Kenneth Jubb, identified as a Portland memory expert, was held today in connection with the slaying of Delmont Lawrence, 52, police assistant and former jockey, in the Deschutes county jail, and the critical wounding of Mancel Wilburn Bower, a Los Angeles carnival worker.

Jubb, the originator of the Jubb memory system, was arrested by Patrolman Harris Meagher at 5 p. m., a few hours before the alleged attack, and placed in the county jail on a charge of intoxication. The memory expert asserted he had no recollection of the subsequent assault.

Police Chief Rambo said Lawrence was beaten to death with a heavy club. Bower's throat was slashed.

Lawrence, formerly of Walla Walla, Wash., was asleep in his jail quarters when the attack occurred, Charles C. Rohleder, and William Smith, other jail occupants, said.

District Attorney Bert C. Boylan said Jubb apparently struck Lawrence repeatedly for ten minutes and then turned on Bower.

Officer Harris said he had advised Jubb to "sleep it off" when he placed him in a cell.

"If it's just the same to you I will sit up," the prisoner replied. The officer said the double attack occurred soon after he left the jail.

Officers, who said formal charges had not been filed, were unable to explain the outbreak. Jubb conducted a memory school here recently and a number of policemen were among his students.

Lawrence was well-known in Pacific coast racing several years ago.

YACHT WITH TWO YOUTHS MISSING

MARSHFIELD, June 22 — (AP) — The auxiliary ketch-rigged yacht Nomad sailed by two Klamath Falls youths remained unreported here today.

Friends of the boys, Claude Kerns and Wesley Graham, said the vessel left Santa Cruz, Calif., about May 16 and headed toward Coos Bay. Vernon Brock of North Bend, who accompanied the youths on a sail along the Mexican coast, reported Kerns' father had sent him a number of worried inquiries.

Kerns, owner of the 50-foot craft, and Graham cruised off Coos Bay a year ago after crossing from Honolulu.

Brock said the undermanned ship might have met difficulty in rough seas.

CITY'S SEWER WARRANT PLAN RULED LEGAL

Judge Wimberly Sustains Local Ordinance Based on Collections of Delinquent Tax.

A declaratory judgment, upholding the right of the city of Roseburg to issue and sell warrants in the sum of \$2500 to continue construction of an intercepting sewer system, now being built in cooperation with the WPA, was ordered in the circuit court here today by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

The opinion handed down by Judge Wimberly upholds the legality of a recent ordinance, under which the city council authorized the warrants, pledging repayment from delinquent taxes as collections are made.

The opinion held that the ordinance does not offend the state budget law, as the effect of the action authorized is substantially the same as such an expenditure of delinquent taxes after collection. No new tax and no new debt is created, it was stated, and the city's authority was upheld on the strength of the budget law provision permitting transfer of other funds to the emergency fund, subject to the provision they must be returned.

LEHMAN BIDS FOR U. S. SENATE SEAT

Announcement of Governor Disperses Political Fog in New York State.

ALBANY, N. Y., June 22 — (AP) — New York political fog lifted today as Democratic Governor Herbert H. Lehman bid for a vacant United States senate seat on which the major 1938 new deal test will pivot and precipitated a scramble for the governorship.

Immediately, 44-year-old State Attorney General John J. Bennett Jr., tossed his hat into the ring as a democratic aspirant for the state's first four-year governorship as both republican and democratic leaders—long anxious to learn Lehman's plans—began belated discussion of opposing states.

The three-term, 60-year-old governor's self-injection into the national picture made more evident the fact that New York's fall balloting will be watched as a barometer of 1940's national trend, especially in view of the fact he is universally credited with dealing one of the strongest blows at President Roosevelt's court reorganization bill. State voters will also fill a second senatorial seat.

Lehman Disperses Fog
Lehman, a powerful vote-getter once described by the president as "my good right arm," made the first fog-dispersing move last night in a printed 25-word announcement that he would accept the senatorial nomination, if his party desired him, to succeed the late Royal S. Copeland. Less than two hours later, Bennett made known his candidacy.

Lehman's announcement removed the likelihood of his exercising power to appoint a successor to fill the unexpired term of Senator Copeland, who would have served at least until 1941, and was interpreted as definitely removing him from the gubernatorial picture even though he should not run for the senate. His term expires next December 31.

Bennett, first elected attorney general in 1920 and prominent in American Legion circles, rose in the political scale during the last 11 years from a virtually unknown Brooklyn lawyer.

He was a member of the Methodist church and had been a member of the Rebekah lodge since 1872. She also was a member of the Women's Relief Corps until that organization was disbanded.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Thursday at the Roseburg Undertaking company chapel.

TWO PERSONS DIE IN WILLAMETTE

PORTLAND, June 22 — (AP) — Two persons were drowned in the Willamette river yesterday, the first day of summer and one of the hottest of the year.

Thomas A. Clifford, 33, fell from a rowboat. The harbor patrol recovered his body 30 minutes later.

Mrs. W. H. Mills died from a rowboat and failed to come to the surface. Her husband, in the boat with her, was unable to locate the body, the harbor patrol said.

SPEND-LEND AGENCIES GET START SIGNAL

Roosevelt's Pen Launches Pump-Priming Program Involving Sum of \$3,750,000,000.

WASHINGTON, June 22 — (AP) — The public works administration began its 1938 spending-lending program today with allotments of \$41,532,717 in grants and \$9,021,000 of loans for 291 projects.

Howard A. Gray, assistant administrator, said the 291 projects would involve \$2,520,374 of construction. The grants were for 45 per cent of the cost and the loans for 55 per cent. The difference between the total of loans and grants and total of construction cost, Gray said, would be made up by the applicants.

Six grants fell in the million dollar class but the vast majority were from a few thousand to as much as a half million.

Allotments included: Albany, Ore., courthouse, \$163,800; Corvallis, Ore., chemistry building, \$135,000 grant, \$165,000 loans; Reedsport, Ore., school, \$7,413; Vale, Ore., municipal building, \$5,400; Marshfield, Ore., bridge \$41,171.

President Starts Flood

The grants had been approved by President Roosevelt even before he signed the \$3,750,000,000 spending-lending bill late yesterday at Hyde Park, N. Y. His pen strokes were the signal for PWA and all federal spending agencies to swing into action with their programs, details of which have been ready for weeks.

PWA construction work will be allocated daily until 2,000 projects will have been made public Friday night. The bulk is expected to be non-federal projects on which the government will advance grants for 45 per cent of the cost and the applicants will put up the other 55 per cent.

The first group of 2,000 projects will cost about \$600,000,000. After this week, PWA allotments

EDNA BROWN GETS RED CROSS POSITION

The executive board of the Douglas county chapter of the American Red Cross, at a meeting held last night at the Episcopal parish house, approved the appointment of Miss Edna (Sally) Brown to succeed Miss Alice V. Maxwell as the chapter's executive secretary.

Miss Maxwell is to be transferred from Roseburg, but has not yet been notified where she will be placed by the national board.

Miss Brown, a graduate of the Roseburg schools, is a daughter of Mrs. Edna A. Brown and the late Harvey Q. Brown. She has given five years of voluntary service to the American Red Cross as an instructor in swimming and first aid. She will spend the month of July in executive training school at San Francisco and will take over her duties at Roseburg August 1.

The executive board last night discussed the forthcoming swimming campaign, adopted a budget for the ensuing quarter year, and discussed other business matters.

Dr. B. R. Shoemaker, chairman of the committee raising funds for China relief, reported on contributions to date and announced a gift of \$9.43 from the Kiwanis club.

TRAIN CRASH DEAD REACHES TOTAL OF 37

MILES CITY, Mont., June 22 — (AP) — Officials counted 37 known dead today as the search for victims in the crash of the Milwaukee road's "Olympian" neared an end at Custer creek.

Finally gaining access to sleeper B after several rebuffs in attempting to enter the submerged car, workers last night took three bodies from the slat-laden car.

Dean Hanson, Dollar Line steamship official of New York, later identified one of the bodies as his son, Don J. 19.

Roosevelt Sets Radio 'Chat' on U. S. Business

HYDE PARK, N. Y., June 22 — (AP) — President Roosevelt today gave out a new commerce department estimate that the national income—the total income of all those earning money—would be slightly more than \$60,000,000,000 this year, \$5,000,000,000 higher than previous government estimates.

He also announced he would give one of his fireside chats from the white house on Friday at 8:30 p. m. (E. S. T.).

The president said the national radio broadcast would be general in subject. It probably will cover business conditions, relief and how well congress carried out his legislative program.

He gave a hint of a possible item for the broadcast when he said that talk of the recent congress being a \$12,000,000,000 congress was not. That figure, he declared, included measures authorizing future government expenses but not carrying appropriations at this time. Furthermore, he added, a large portion of the money appropriated was for loans to be repaid.

JAPANESE PLANES ATTACK SWATOW

SHANGHAI, June 22 — (AP) — Japanese planes twice bombed Swatow, Kwangtung province today, port 220 miles northeast of Canton, today while ten warships stood by after landing several hundred marines on the nearby island of Namoa under cover of a barrage.

The attack led to the belief that the long-awaited south China offensive to cut Canton off from the central battlefield was under way.

The Japanese technique was the same as was used May 11 in occupation of Amoy, another south China port, 120 miles north of Swatow.

The U. S. gunboat Asheville, standing by at Swatow for emergencies, said fighting had not yet started there. United States Consul Whitney Young last reported 63 American men, women and children residing in the Swatow consular district.

A British destroyer was en route to Swatow from Hongkong as a precautionary measure.

YOUTH DROWNED IN ROGUE RIVER

GRANTS PASS, June 22 — (AP) — Search was under way here this morning for Donald Wimer, 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ashley Wimer. The boy was swept from a salmon pier just below the Cavean Rogue river bridge when he dipped a long-handled net into the swift current. Two youths with him ran for help after he disappeared from sight down the stream.

CREWS ESCAPE IN BOMBINGS OFF VALENCIA

City Also Suffers Heavily, as Does Barcelona, From Attacks by Groups of Warplanes.

VALENCIA, Spain, June 22 — (AP) — Two British ships were sunk just outside Valencia harbor today by a lone sky raider in a continuation of the long series of warplane attacks on foreign shipping in ports of government Spain.

The 2,654-ton Sunion, British ship formerly of Greek registry, struck by incendiary and explosive bombs, burned furiously for six hours and then settled to the bottom.

Previously the 4,789-ton freighter Thorpeness, shattered by an aerial torpedo, had gone down with 7,000 tons of grain.

All the Sunion's crew of 32, including a German observer for the non-intervention committee, were taken off safely.

After torpedoing the Thorpeness, the planes returned and machine-gunned her, splintering the captain's cabin.

Today's attacks brought to 54 the total of airplane attacks on British ships since the Spanish war started—nearly half in the last three months.

The Thorpeness' chief officer, Norman Goulet of Southampton, a son-in-law of Alexander Bailie, Seattle, managed to get away in one boat with 25 members of the crew. The captain, William Kermode, and eight others, jumped into the sea.

Captain Kermode swam a mile in his lifebelt to the Bunka which put out a boat to help rescue some of the Thorpeness' crew.
