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Not Long Ago

It is not actually so very long ago that the young men of the United States were fighting bloody battles on Civil War battlefields—actually killing each other in vast numbers. That is hard to realize. We have moved forward so rapidly that now the Civil War seems very ancient history indeed.

A news story like the one yesterday about C. C. (Cap) Boone, a Civil War veteran who will attend the rally of Civil War veterans in Pennsylvania, serves as a forceful reminder that it was not so long ago that this nation was torn by internal strife.

What happened then, you may say, could never happen again—we are too enlightened now. Let us hope that is true. It is a fact that the events which precipitated that conflict cannot again be duplicated. But the basic fact, which was that people of this country became so violently partisan that they were willing to endure four years of organized murder to uphold their beliefs, could happen again some time.

If the 25,000 veterans of both Civil War armies who will gather next week could live always and could advise us, there would never again be strife. But new generations bring new ideas, new leaders, new alignments and new hates and fears. We seem to profit but little from experience.

A school district with a population of nearly 7,000, Roseburg school district number four, has only 39 ballots cast in an election. The conclusion cannot be drawn that there is lack of interest in the schools—there is no part of our daily lives that holds more public interest. The only reasonable conclusion concerning the light vote cast must be that the people of the district are well satisfied with the operation of the schools and with the present board of directors. Any time there is dissatisfaction there will be a large vote.

TOWNSENDITES GET POPULATION DATA

Proportion of Old People to Increase for Long Time, Expert Says.

LOS ANGELES, June 21.—(AP)—Townsend old age pension advocates heard at their third national convention today that population studies indicate a greatly increased proportion of elderly persons in the next several decades—an increase that may stimulate further efforts toward publicly-supported old age security.

In his long-range analysis, Dr. Warren S. Thompson, population expert of Miami university, Oxford, Ohio, took 65 as retirement age. On the basis of decreasing birth rate since 1910, the 65 and over group by 1980 will number more than four times the 1930 census figure, Dr. Thompson told the convention. The 1930 retirement eligibility group, he said, numbered 6.6 million, constituting 5.4 per cent, or one-nineteenth of the population, while the 1980 group will total 22.1 million, or one-seventh of the expected population then.

"It is not surprising," said Dr. Thompson, "that there is a growing demand that adequate care of the aged be recognized as a public function. Nor can there be any doubt that the insistence of this demand will become greater as the proportion of the population 65 and over grows."

The expected increase of the elderly group was only one item in Dr. Thompson's exhaustive analysis of this country's population trend.

Other Extremes To Decline
For instance, he said the proportion of the population under 15 would decline from 36.8 million in 1930 to 29.3 million in 1980. A middle result would be increasing proportions of persons from 45 to 65 years of age, involving new problems of placing this age range in jobs. He called this "a major deservicing of much attention."

Dr. Thompson said the population, which previously had nearly one child, dropped to less than one-sixth in the decades from 1910 to 1930 and the figure for 1930-40 may fall short of one-twelfth.

He predicted the 1940 census would show a population of about 132 million, the 1960 census an increase of 12 to 15 millions and that 1980 is a statistically stationary figure of 150 to 155 millions.

"Thereafter it will begin to decline," he estimated.

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GLENDALE MILL WILL SHUT DOWN

GLENDALE, June 22.—More than fifty men will join the ranks of the unemployed when the Glendale mill and sawmill of the Ingham Lumber company shut down July 1st. Fallers and buckers finished their part the 15th, and the loading and hauling crews will be through this week. C. W. Ingham, president and manager, stated the shut down is due to general market conditions and is for an indefinite period of time, resumption of operations not being considered until conditions are considerably improved. However, the planing mill and shipping departments will be kept going to take care of present business.

This is the first shut down the present management has made since commencing operations in July, 1923, except for the time that was necessary to rebuild after a disastrous fire August 20, 1927.

DIVISION SEEKERS ATTACKED BY GILL

Continuation of Friendly Farm-Labor Link Urged by Grange Master.

TILLAMOOK, June 21.—(AP)—Ray W. Gill, state grange master, attacked "divisionists" today for attempting to create a sharp division between agricultural and labor interests.

Gill addressed the convention of the state federation of labor, where yesterday resolutions were introduced condemning the Associated Farmers of Oregon.

"During recent years," Gill said, "certain groups of selfish or politically minded persons have schemed to create a feeling of distrust between farmers and laborers."

"They have sought to drive the wedge of hate between these two great groups. From the farmers' side they have failed largely because the grange believes that problems that exist between the farmers and the laborers can be settled around the council table."

Cooperation Appreciated
"The grange appreciates the fine spirit of cooperation that has been manifested in the joint farm-labor relations committee as set up from members of your organization and members of our organization, acting as a joint committee."

"It is important that we maintain this friendly approach to each other and those forces that have tried to disturb such approaches have failed."

"I am glad to report to you that the Oregon grange session just closed went on record by a decisive vote in favor of continuing the policies that have been established in recent years regarding our labor relations and proposed legislation that would effect such relations."

The convention adopted a resolution pledging cooperation with the grange.

Action at the business session included:

Uniform state inspection for food handlers with the cost to be borne by the state; opposition to tax exempt bonds; income taxes for state and federal employees; rejection of Townsend plan endorsement.

SWIM SCHOOL TO

OPEN HERE JUNE 27

Tentative Schedule Drawn for Annual Course at Umpqua Park.

The opening date for the annual "Learn to Swim" school, sponsored by the Douglas county chapter of the American Red Cross, has definitely been set for Monday, June 27, and will continue for 10 days, ending on Friday, July 8. Due to the fact that these dates will include a double holiday, July 3 and 4, no classes will be conducted on those days.

All classes will be held at Umpqua park as in the past and the campaign will be under the supervision of Maynard Bell and Robert Kidder, A. R. C. life saving examiners and experienced instructors. All those desiring instruction are requested to register at the office of Dr. H. C. Church, life saving chairman for the local chapter. A small registration fee of 25 cents for non-swimmers, beginners and advanced swimmers and 50 cents for those taking life saving, payable at the time of registration, will be charged. This small fee is the only charge made for the entire 10-day campaign.

The final two days of the swim school will be given over to examination of efficiency and progress and all those successfully passing the tests will be awarded A. R. C. emblems.

Schedule Arranged

The tentative schedule has arranged for three classes of non-swimmers during the morning hours and three for the afternoon session. Advanced swimmers will go through their paces at 11:30 in the morning. Those turning out for junior and senior life saving will find two daily workouts scheduled, the first coming from 9 to 10:30 o'clock in the morning and again in the afternoon, 3:30 to 5. Two classes are necessary because 10 full hours of practice and instruction must be given before one can take either test. An adult class for both non-swimmers and advanced swimmers has been arranged for 5:30 to 6:30 p. m.

The schedule, subject to change, is as follows:

9 to 10:30 — Life saving, junior and senior.
10:30 to 11 — Non-swimmers, boys and girls.
11 to 11:30 — Non-swimmers, boys and girls.
11:30 to 12 — Non-swimmers, boys and girls.
11:30 to 12 — Advanced swimmers.

Afternoon

2 to 3:30 — Non-swimmers, boys and girls.
3:30 to 5 — Life saving, junior and senior.
5:30 to 6:30 — Non-swimmers, boys and girls.
6:30 to 7:30 — Life saving, junior and senior.

Monday they again fired similar problems. Tuesday the unit participated in a battalion problem south of camp. This will give the men of this company practice in selecting and occupying positions with the machine guns.

Friday afternoon has been set aside for a field meet and Saturday will be the big review and demonstration. It is expected that a large number of visitors will be in camp for these latter events.

CAMP CLATSOP, Ore., June 22.—Roseburg's national guard company has completed its first week of field training with every man in good health and enjoying the encampment. Saturday morning the company participated in the brigade field inspection and was commended by Major General George White for its fine appearance. General White then inspected the kitchen and told Mess Sergeant Stewart M. Karlinger that he had a "very good looking kitchen."

Company D arose at 6 Wednesday morning and, after pulling the company area, 15 minutes of physical drill and breakfast, they started in on the first day's drill schedule. This schedule consisted of close order drill, extended order drill, care and cleaning of weapons. At 3:30 p. m. the military training period was terminated for the day and baseball and other games occupied their time until retreat ceremony at 5:30.

Weather Comfortable

For recreation in the evening picture shows are provided at the camp theatre and a new swimming pool is being well patronized. Saturday afternoon and Sunday morn'g men visited the beach about a mile west of camp. Except for some rainy nights and a few showers one day, the weather has been excellent, cool enough to be comfortable when working.

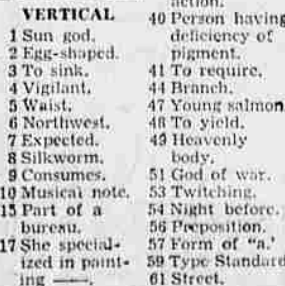
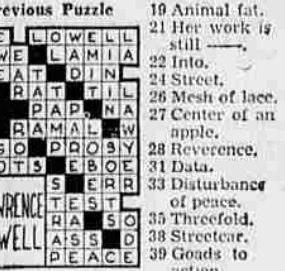

NORRIS THANKED BY HESS FOR "RESCUE"

ROCKAWAY, Ore., June 22.—(AP)—Henry L. Hess, the democratic nominee for governor, thanked Senator George W. Norris, Nebraska independent and new deal leader, last night for coming "to my rescue" in his primary campaign against Governor Charles Martin.

The candidate spoke before a number of state federation of labor delegates who visited the resort from Tillamook.

"I have always been a fighter for what is commonly known as organized minorities," he said. "This is the reason I earned the support of labor, the leaders of the Oregon grange and that splendid man that came to my rescue, the Hon. George W. Norris, the great republican senator from Nebraska, who has fought side by side with President Roosevelt and those who have been fighting for the laboring people in the United States against special privilege wherever it may be found."

Hess said the general election campaign would be the "liberal forces as against the vested interests of this state."

Norris, the sponsor of major public power legislation, criticized Governor Martin's philosophy for the distribution of Bonneville dam energy and urged Oregon farmers to vote for Hess.
