

9 NAMED TO STUDY BRITISH LABOR ACT

Roosevelt Desires Report on Status of Industry in Foreign Lands.

HYDE PARK, N. Y., June 22.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today announced appointment of seven men and two women as members of a commission to study the British labor disputes act, and said the commission's work would be broadened to include Swedish labor relations.

Members of the commission are: Gerard Swope, president of General Electric company.

Charles R. Hook, president of the American Rolling Mill company.

Lloyd K. Garrison, dean of the University of Wisconsin law school.

Henry I. Harriman, former president of the U. S. chamber of commerce.

Robert Watt, of the international labor office at Geneva, Switzerland, representing the American Federation of Labor.

William H. Davis, New York City lawyer.

Mrs. Anna M. Rosenberg, regional director of the social security board in New York.

Miss Marion Dickerman, principal of the Toddhunter school.

William Ellison Chalmers, assistant U. S. labor commissioner at Geneva.

Some members of the group already are in Europe and while house executives said Swope would call today from New York. Others, they said, would go abroad within a few days.

Need of Report Stated

The president wrote members of the commission that he felt there was "a definite need for an impartial report which will adequately portray the real situation that prevails in British industry."

Mr. Roosevelt said "many comments" had come to his attention regarding British labor relations.

"I trust," he added, "that through conferring with British government officials, industrial leaders, and labor officials, you will be in a position to report to the Secretary (Frances Perkins) not only on the exact status of labor-employer relations in England, but also on the evolution of the established and accepted procedures that account for the current state of industrial relations in that country."

At a recent press conference, the president declared that the commission inquiry was not a preliminary to revamping this country's national labor relations act but was for the purpose of informing the country just how similar relations were handled in England. The broadening of the scope of the investigation is expected to supply similar reports on Sweden.

**U. S. SPY CHARGES
DENIED BY FOUR**

NEW YORK, June 22.—(AP)—Three men and a woman indicted on federal charges of espionage in a widespread probe of alleged spy activities in this country today pleaded innocent. They were held in \$25,000 bail each.

Federal District Judge Liebelle ordered bench warrants issued for the fourteen other persons indicted, most of whom are believed to be in Germany. These include two men described as German war ministry officers.

Innocent pleas were made by: Johanna Hofmann, 26-year-old hairdresser on the German liner Europa.

Guenther Gustave Rurich, former sergeant in the United States army.

Erich Glaser, U. S. army private stationed at Mitchell field, important aviation post.

Otto H. Voss, airplane mechanic.

Voss is named in a general conspiracy indictment with the 17 other persons, and also in a substantive indictment charging he transmitted to Germany information relating to the defense of the United States.

**FAMED LITTLE HIGH
SCHOOL PASSES ON**

CORVALLIS, June 21.—(AP)—The school district taxpayers saved Oregon high school basketball teams considerable worry today by voting to discontinue Little Belknap high school.

Belknap, a school with but 23 students, won the state hoop tournament in 1937. It was the first time the title had been captured by a "D" division entry.

The district was abandoned by a 27-16 vote. Bus service will transport the students to either Corvallis or Monroe.

State educational authorities had informed the district considerable expenditure would be necessary to maintain school standards and erect a new building.

Belknap was one of the oldest high schools in the county. It started with about the same number of students 30 years ago and has operated continuously.

TATTOO REUNITES DIVORCED COUPLE

LOGANSPOUT, Ind., June 21.—(AP)—The words "Nellie and Harry," tattooed on Harry Bowles' left arm, led to a reunion today with his former wife and a 23-year-old son, Everett, whom he had never seen.

The elder Bowles, who is 54, was brought to St. Joseph hospital here with knife wounds suffered in a brawl. Unconscious for several days, his identity was not determined until Mrs. Nellie Mahila read newspaper reports of the tattoo and came to the hospital.

Mrs. Mahila married Bowles in 1914. He left home to seek work and did not return. After the birth of her son, Mrs. Mahila was granted a divorce from Bowles and married Charles Mahila, a Star City farmer near here.

Bowles, now recovering, said he would visit his former wife at Star City when released from the hospital.

MOSQUITO HORDE HARRIES PORTLAND

PORTLAND, June 22.—(AP)—Portland citizens who spent their evenings slapping at a winged hell in the darkness and appeared the next day with angry, itching welts complained today that the mosquitoes were the largest and the most aggressive in years.

The hungry insects have hatched along the river banks by the millions, disturbing the mental and physical comfort of golfers, swimmers and playing children. Many families have been driven indoors from a summer evening on the front porch.

In recent years the city and the WPA cooperated in controlling the pests. The WPA withdrew from the project last spring.

CROP INSURANCE CHANGE APPROVED

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(AP)—President Roosevelt has approved an amendment to the federal crop insurance act to permit farmers to pay several years' premiums at one time.

The crop insurance act permits payment of premiums and losses in wheat instead of in cash. Senator Pope (D., Idaho) said the amendment will permit growers to pay several years' premiums in advance from a good crop and should aid in reducing possible market surpluses.

SUMMER MEETINGS SUSPENDED BY POST

Members of Umpqua post, American Legion, voted to suspend meetings during the summer until August 15 at their regular meeting Tuesday night. The next meeting will be held previous to the state convention at Pendleton, and delegates will be instructed at that time as to the wishes of the post on matters to be presented. Travel allowance was voted for the delegates. A discussion was held on the Beaver Boys' State and a committee, composed of F. L. Crittenden, George McBea and George Trapalls, was appointed to work on sponsorship of boys from this area.

The matter of relief of veterans was discussed at length but no change from present plan of operations was authorized. Membership was reported at 286, with 13 needed to complete the quota. The post went on record as supporting Dr. E. J. Corcoran of Reedsport post for the office of commander of district four for the ensuing year. Other posts in the district are being contacted and urged to support his candidacy at the Pendleton convention.

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LINN COUNTY VOTES NEW COURTHOUSE

ALBANY, June 22.—(AP)—The county court was authorized in a special election yesterday to divert a \$238,000 general fund surplus to construction of a new courthouse.

Linn county voters approved the measure nearly three to one. Eleven precincts, including three in Lebanon, which had fought the proposal, voted against the plan.
