JAP POACHING OFF ALASKA EVIDENCE

WARREN, Alaska, June 23.—(AP)—Capt. Emil Jackson of the motorship Clevedon, reported to day his ship, entering Bristol bay, passed within 500 feet of a Japanese crab fishing vessel and that salmon were hung up in the vessel's rigging to dry. Captain Jackson is from Bellingham.

Salmon nets were also seen hanging on the ship, he said. The vessel had 10 large tenders, each manned by 11 men, he said.

The tenders stopped discharging on the approach of the Clevedon. Captain Jackson placed the ship's location at 28 miles off the shore of Bear river.

The Clevedon, formerly the Italian motorship Feltre which sank in the Columbia river last year after a collision and was raised, was carrying cannery workers and supplies to Bristol bay.
