

## SACRAMENTO WINS AT HEAVY PRICE

Fielder Adams Breaks Leg After Smashing Homer With Bases Loaded.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 25.—(AP)—Sacramento's coast league-leading Solons were victorious again today but at a heavy price.

Center Fielder Buster Adams, whose homer with the bases loaded was the mildly awful in the Solons' 6 to 2 victory over Oakland last night, lay in a hospital with a broken leg.

Adams' right leg crumpled and the bone was broken above the knee as he slid into home while stretching his right field hit into a four-bagger in the second inning.

San Francisco's Solons, clinging to their second place, five games behind Sacramento, when they beat Los Angeles 3 to 2. As usual, Halton, the Solons' old reliable relief pitcher, finished the game on the mound. Stutz, who hurled the first eight innings, got credit for the win, however. Thomas weakened after holding the Solons to two hits for seven innings.

Turpin loses 1 to 0. Chaplin, allowing only four hits, pitched a shut-out for San Diego's Padres as they defeated Seattle 1 to 0. The Padres' run came in the first frame when Niemie singled off Turpin after Dallesandro had walked and stolen second.

Four errors by the Hollywood Stars contributed to their 4-to-2 defeat at the hands of Portland, which revived after losing three straight to the southerners. Douglas kept Hollywood's 7 hits fairly well scattered as his mates, while taking advantage of the Stars' errors, collected 8 safeties off Tost.

## SWIM SCHOOL TO OPEN HERE JUNE 27

The annual swim school, sponsored by the Douglas county chapter of the American Red Cross, is scheduled to start Monday morning, June 27, at Umpqua park, and will continue for 10 days. No classes will be held on Sunday and Monday, July 3 and 4, because of the double holiday.

Increased interest in this year's campaign over the one conducted last year is already in evidence with nearly 100 already registered in the various classes. Last year's swim school reached a new high in attendance when 239 students enrolled but if the advance registration for this season's school is any indication, that mark may be exceeded.

Instructors for the school will be Maynard Bell and Robert Kidder, A. R. C. life saving examiners, and experienced swimmers and teachers. A full program for the non-swimmer, advanced swimmer and life saver has been arranged. Classes will begin at 9 in the morning and will continue until 6:30 p. m. A raft, for use of the advanced swimming and life saving classes, was constructed this morning and will be in readiness for the opening of the school.

Those who have not registered for the classes at the office of Dr. H. C. Church, life saving chairman, may do so at the beach at Umpqua park. Registration fee is 25 cents for non-swimmers and advanced swimmers and 50 cents for life savers.

All junior and senior life savers who would like to assist in the instruction of the non-swimmers and advanced swimming and life saving classes are urged to leave their names at Dr. Church's office or contact either of the instructors at the beach.

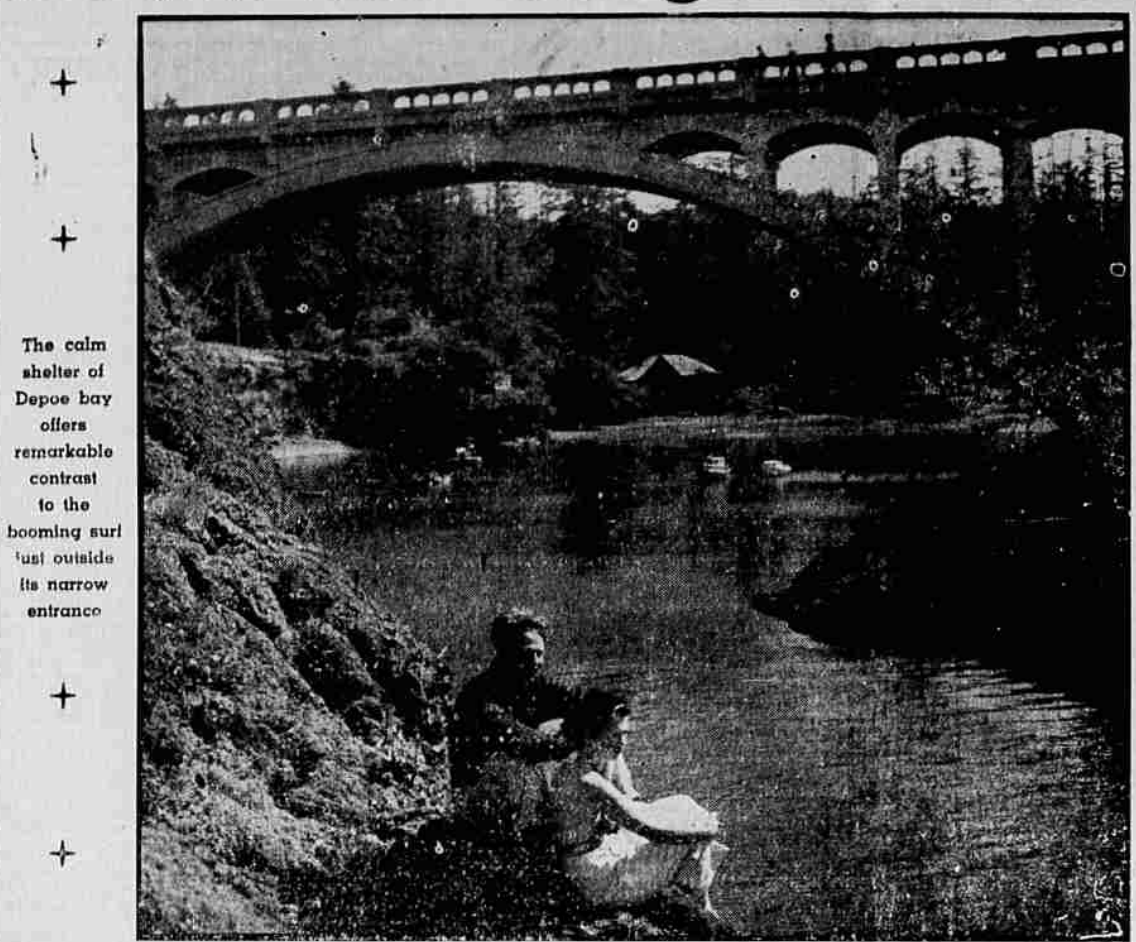

# Down the Oregon Coast

The story of a trip down the Oregon coast highway from Astoria to California line.

It's a dozer motorlog rolled into one. For along the 395-mile extent of Oregon's coast line are enough attractions to provide recreation and entertainment not only for the week-end motorist and short-term vacationist but even for the more fortunate who may be able to spend several weeks or the entire summer exploring and visiting the lesser known as well as the more famous places.

Of course, the route may be negotiated either from south to north or vice versa. Since we are starting from Portland, we'll go to Astoria, then turn The Oregonian-Oregon State Motor Association travel car southward with the long expanse of ocean-bordered highway before us. Before leaving Astoria, though, let's spend a few minutes in this city of so much historical and industrial significance.

Headed south about this time of year, it's difficult to miss the Golden trail, a section of the main coast highway with dazzling borders of Scotch broom. Rolling on to Seaside, Oregon's most famous bathing beach, where the main street leads straight for the ocean. For diversion, park the car and take a walk along the two-mile concrete promenade along the ocean front.

Thirteen miles down U. S. 101 you'll reach the Necanicum fish hatchery, a splendid opportunity to find out how science helps nature keep up with the minnows. Operated by the state, the hatchery is open to the public, and attendants may be asked to explain the technique of raising baby fish to adulthood.

You've heard of Tillamook, of course. It's the hub of "a kind of trees, cheese and ocean breeze" but probably few motorists have taken time to find out about the cheese. That's made the city famous. At the south city limits there is a large yellow building—a cheese factory easy to reach where visitors are welcome.

here, as well as at Depoe bay, Reedsport and Coos bay, lend a touch of color that should not be overlooked. In Newport, too, is a natatorium, and the cottages and summer homes of a typical beach resort city.

Farther south, is Seal Rock state park, another section of the Oregon coast adopted by the state because of its restful beauty. Off the shore may be seen Seal rocks, where formerly keen eyes could detect the sea mammals and where now may be seen the rookeries of marine wildfowl.

Cape Perpetua, one notch farther in this motorlog, affords another chance for a scenic view. But perhaps you should move on to Sea Lion cove, where Brigham brings his fur-clad wives. Unique is the term for these fascinating caves, chiseled from Sea Lion point by the battering waves of centuries. Accessible by an easy trail and spectacular stairways, upon payment of a small fee, the caves may reveal a herd of sea lions playing, splashing and loafing. Here is the only known sea lion rookery on the mainland, and yearly "Old Brigham" herd bull brings back his congregation for the summer season.

Next, en route south, you reach a series of fresh-water lakes, strung to the left of the highway with the ocean on the right. It affords a relief that you may need from the sight of the sea. In this area from Florence to Coos bay you may even imagine that you are high in the mountains of central Oregon. Wakulla, Siltcoos, Tahkenitch and Pomale lakes—all could be called ideal recreation spots. With outlets to the sea, fish life is replenished from the ocean. Furthermore, they are stocked with bass, crappie, calico bass and perch, and resorts can provide virtually every form of entertainment desired.

Back to the ocean, Coos bay, the site of North Bend and Marshfield, is an important lumbering, manufacturing, fishing and shipping center, with a multitude of points for the travel agenda.

## Jews PICTURED AS ENEMIES OF U. S.

Bund "Fuehrer" Heard at Probe; Says Nation to Adopt Nazi Salute.

NEW YORK, June 24.—(AP)—The German-American Bund was out in the open today in its opposition to Jews in America, on the word of its "Fuehrer," Fritz Kuhn. "All the Jews are enemies of the United States," Kuhn told a state legislative committee inquiry yesterday.

Then he calmly retorted for Senator John J. McNaboe, chairman, a list of charges against American Jews that closely resemble the charges of the Nazi government against the German Jews.

Kuhn outlined the growth of his bund and its spread to 94 cities in the United States. He charged that Jews were the master minds behind the communist party; that Rothschilds, through Kuhn, Loeb & Co., and the Warburgs control the democratic and republican parties; that the family of J. P. Morgan has "Jewish blood"; that the anti-Nazi boycott was dictated to Samuel Untermyer of Moscow; and predicted the Nazi salute is "the coming sal-

In 1930, of course, you read about the Bandon fire that nearly swept this rugged coast city off the map. At the site of the famous holocaust, 37 miles south of Coos bay, you will find a new city rising.

Forty-six miles south of Bandon is a place of considerable geographic importance, and one involved somewhat in a controversy of scientists. It is Cape Blanco, westernmost point in Oregon, and claimed by some to reach farther west than any other point in the United States.

Just below Cape Blanco is another geographic feature, an ex-novo park by Oregon, it is Humboldt mountain, interesting not only because of improved picnic facilities but because of its historic background.

Southward, beyond Gold Beach and the mouth of the famous Helling stream, Rogue river, remains one more opportunity for spectacular view. On top of Pistol River mountain, at Carpenterville, is the highest point on the Oregon coast highway. From this 1700-foot lookout you may view California's Mount Shasta, and in another direction look 150 miles out to sea.

Brookings, seven miles north of the California line, is the last item on this motorlog of Oregon's 401-mile marine drive.

Eight miles from Brookings you will find the only accessible grove of big redwood trees in Oregon—60 acres of them. En route and adjoining you also will see some of the world's biggest myrtle trees, an exclusive product of southwestern Oregon and prized by makers of wood novelties.

With this you've completed a thorough trip of a great recreational highway. Of course, there were the beautiful coast highway bridges, completed in 1936 at a cost of well over \$5,000,000. Then, too, there were dozens of spots that might have been visited, but they must serve as a reason for another drive and another day.

## MARKET REPORTS

WOOL  
BOSTON, June 25.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "There is a definite turn for the better in the wool market. It is not pronounced, amounting on actual wool to about two cents a pound basis. It is more apparent in the west, where prices had sunk to a basis about on parity with the wool loan."

"The top futures market, moreover, has been exceedingly active and strong, although the situation in the piecegoods, yarns and tops market do not seem to warrant the activity in futures. This doubtless is largely speculative."

"In the west and southwest, prices today are on a level basis, graded Boston, of about 57-58 cents for average fine and fine medium wools which were costing about 55 cents. Wools in the bright wool states are one half to 1 cent higher in the grease."

"Foreign markets are irregular. Australia is generally firm in the closing sales, while the continental markets are still soft and subject to forced sales at prices under replacement costs."
